## City Hall Landscaping Is Continuing Project

Initial landscaping of the Munday City Hall lawn was begun recently with the planting of five live oak trees and 32 dwarf yaupon shrubs by members of the Munday Sesquicentennial committee, Phillis Urbanczyk, Paula Schur and Gail Ramirez. The trees were planted in the pattern designed by Larry Sweatt of Wichita Falls, whose landscaping ideas won a savings bond from the Sesquicentennial committee.

and the planting was done by the committee members along with Diana Moore, Walter Hertel, Jimmy Urbanczyk, Bobby Hutchinson, Perry Kuehler and Pat Smith, with some help by Nicole Urbanczyk. Volunteers are needed for further landscaping jobs, and anyone who would like to help should call Mrs. Urbanczyk at 422-4368. This is a good opportunity for persons with the proverbial "green thumb" to show off their skill in a way that will be enjoyed by local citizens for years to come.

The committee is reminding everyone that memorial donations to the landscaping project are being accepted. A plaque in the City Hall will list those citizens who contribute to the project as a personal or memorial donation. A price list for the planned trees and shrubs includes live oak trees, \$40; pine trees, \$70; yaupon trees, \$70; pecan trees, \$10; and dwarf yaupon shrubs, \$5.

The local Brownie troop, led by Mary Huffman, Vickie Claburn and Mickie Hutchinson, donated \$25 to the Sesquicentennial committee for purchasing five yaupon shrubs. This type of donation is useful and greatly appreciated, as it speeds up the landscaping process and helps make the City Hall grounds an attractive part of our town.

The committee is looking into the possibility of installing an automatic sprinkler system at City Hall for added maintenance ease. The price of such a system will be approximately \$3,000, and would include both drip irrigation for some spots and pop-up sprinkler heads. Several offers of volunteer labor have been made, so the price of the system itself is all that will have to be considered.

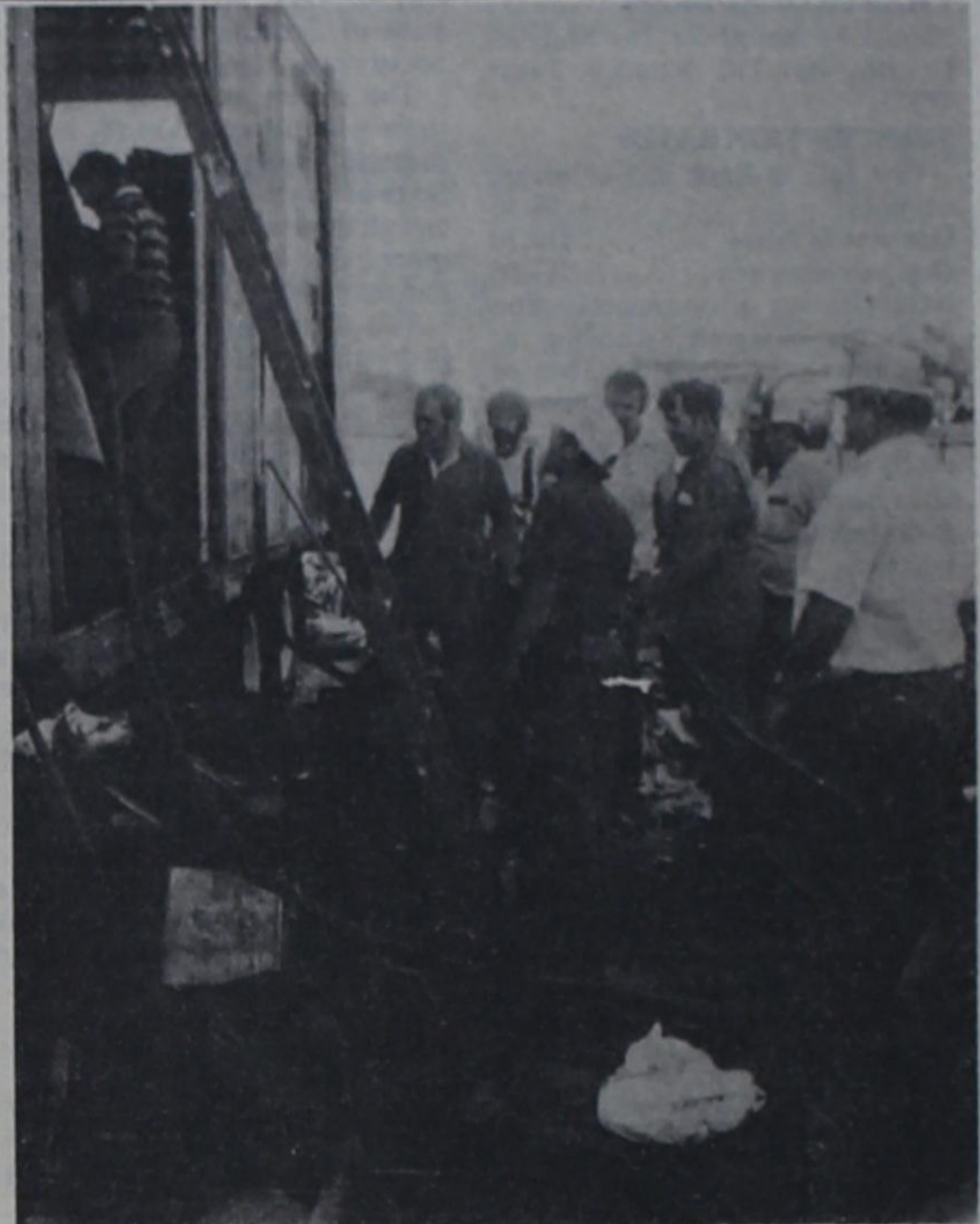
Father Clement served as pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland from 1968 to 1970.

## WTU Hopes To Refund Fuel Costs To Customers

West Texas Utilities Company recently filed a petition with the Public Utility Commission of Texas asking permission to refund \$13.7 million in fuel costs savings and interest to its retail customers.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available economy power from other companies. As a result, WTU has actually been able to spend less for power plant fuel than was anticipated when the fuel factors were established by the PUC.

The savings have accumulated since August 1984, when the fuel recovery account was last reconciled by the Commission. The total available for refunding includes \$12.6 million in actual savings, plus an estimated \$1.1 million in interest.

"We want to pass these savings on to our customers as quickly as possible in order to bring some relief during the season of hot weather and high utility bills," Churchill said. "While we are not yet due for a reconciliation, we are voluntarily asking permission to make refunds now."

Since 1983, electric customers in Texas have been charged for fuel according to fixed fuel factors set by the PUC. This method of fuel cost recovery was ordered by the PUC to replace the automatic monthly fuel adjustment which matched fuel billings to fuel expense immediately and under which utilities had been operated for many years.

Under present rules, a reconciliation of the fuel costs may be required a year after the factors are fixed, but adjustments are possible sooner if actual fuel costs are substantially above or below the amount being charged.

"Over the past several months, the company has made considerable savings by purchasing surplus power from other companies cheaper than WTU could generate it, and by

taking advantage of a softer natural gas market," Churchill said.

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating revenues.

Much of the economy power being bought from other companies now comes through a new high voltage, direct current interconnection completed last December near Vernon. This facility allows WTU to import electricity from outside the state of Texas.

WTU proposes to make the refunds to existing customers through a one-time credit to their bills, commencing immediately after Commission approval. Refunding through bill credits would be more timely, efficient and cost effective than attempting to send customers checks, Churchill said.

The credit would be calculated on an individual customer basis using each customer's monthly kilowatt-hour consumption during the period involved. Refund amounts will vary with the amount of the customer's usage. The average residential customer is expected to receive about \$32.

The petition filed is for an exception to PUC rules requiring a formal reconciliation procedure. A full fuel cost reconciliation for WTU is not due for several months.

Experience has shown that reconciliation proceedings are quite lengthy, delaying refunds reaching the customers. For this reason, the company is asking the Commission to make an exception to its rules so that refunds can be made immediately during the hot summer season.

**Watering Lawns**

Now that the spring rains are well past us it's time to think of that yearly chore of keeping the lawn green during the hot, dry summer. Just to have a green lawn is not the only reason to water the lawn.

In many parts of Knox County the clay soils develop rather impressive cracks. Some of these may be several inches across and even a few feet deep. The presence of these cracks will not have any serious effect on the grass plants themselves but may turn what started as a neighborhood football or baseball game into a medical emergency if a child steps into a crack and is injured. These same soils with their shrinkable clay can also do a great deal of damage to a home's foundation. A good irrigation program can help prevent these problems.

In watering a lawn the "rule of thumb" is to water long enough so that soil is soaked to a depth of about five or six inches. This may sound fairly simple but it takes some work. There are a lot of different sprinklers available, some fit on the end of a hose and some are in the ground. Some are a lot more efficient than others and spray water in an even pattern. Probably a well designed ground system is the most efficient.

What ever the choice for a sprinkler the success of its operation is entirely up to the operator. Ideally a sprinkler should only put out water at the same rate that the water will drain into the soil. The most practical problem associated with sprinkler operation is simply that sprinklers put out water faster than some of our soils can take it in or to put

another way some of our soils are so heavy water can run in them as fast as a sprinkler puts out water, even the slowest of the sprinklers.

In running a sprinkler the absolute first step is to find out how much water the sprinkler puts out in a given period of time. This information should be available from the manufacturer or the installer, or if not, just set out some old coffee cans and run it for an hour and measure the amount.

In most of our high clay soils, it takes about an inch or so of water to wet the soil deep enough. If a soil is high in sand as little as 1/2 inch of water will do the job.

It is very likely that the lawn will start to puddle or water will run off the lawn before the desired amount is applied. This means the sprinkler should stop operating just before either puddling or run off occurs. Experience will identify this period. After the recently applied water is allowed to soak in for a period of time, the sprinkler is again operated. These on-off cycles must be developed through experience. There are few lawns that are the same. Variables such as soil differences, the slope of the lawn, the high of the lawn, may all effect the infiltration rate of water.

If water is moving at an extremely slow rate there are two possibilities that might speed things up. First, there is a machine called an

"aerifier" that punches small holes up to about three inches deep in the soil. Many rental stores have these. Another possible help is by using a chemical called a wetting agent. This chemical, like soap, makes water wetter and then it moves into the soil faster.

After getting the lawn soaked five or six inches deep, just let it alone till it dries out again. Most of the time that will be about five to seven days. One of the worst things you can do to a lawn is to water it every day. That will lead to a shallow root system and the strong possibility of a disease.

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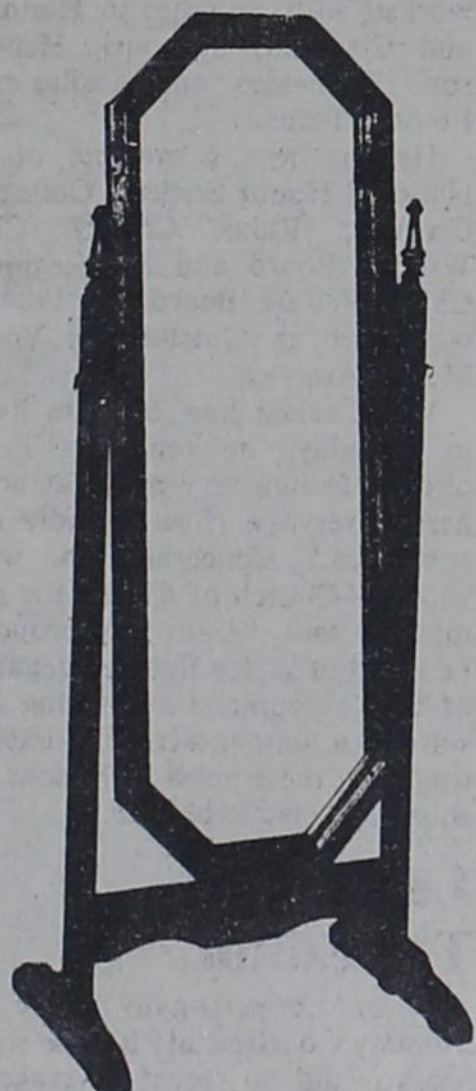
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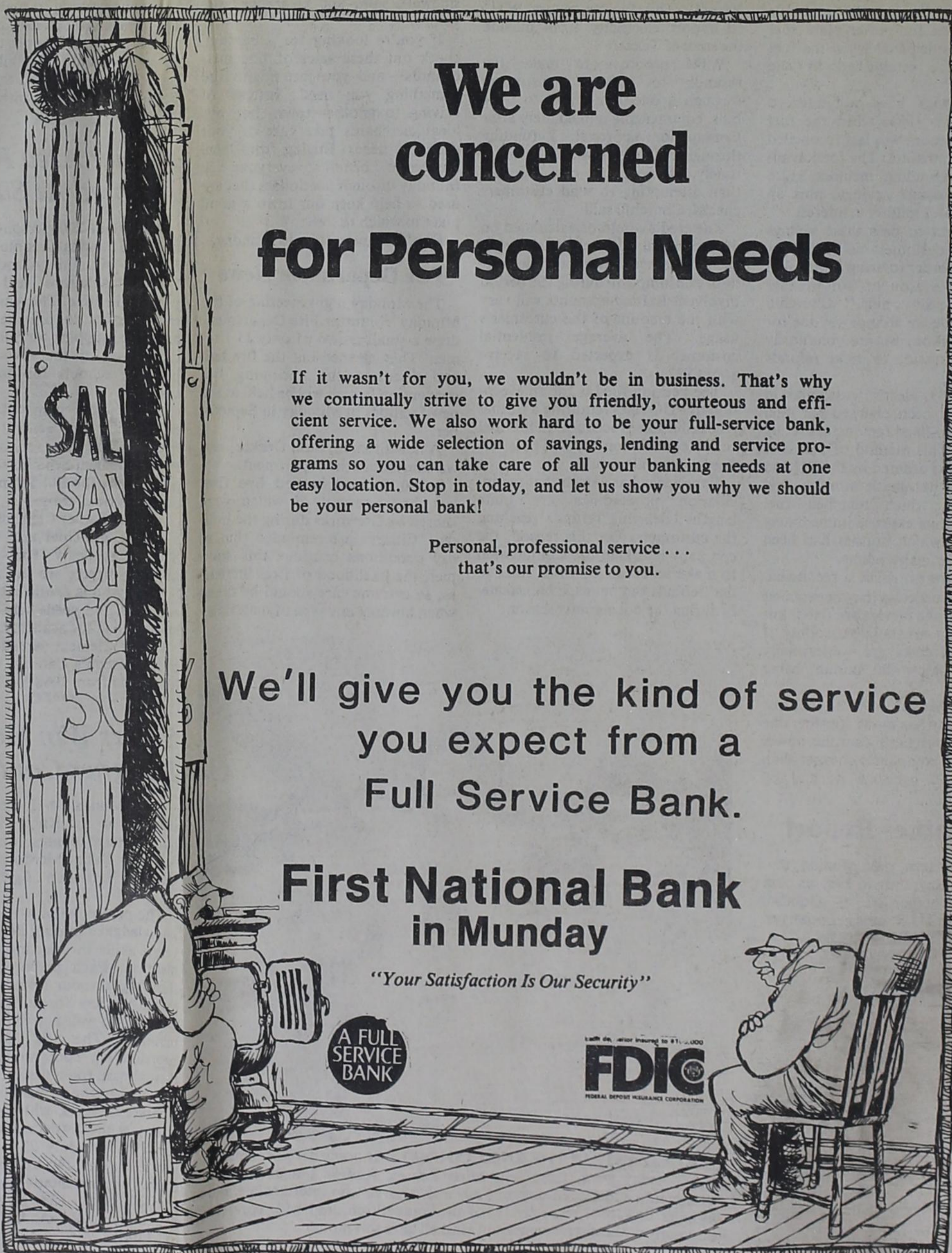

**Simplifies Budgeting -  
The Four 25's**

The New Mexico Cooperative Extension Service and the Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Albuquerque, Inc., share the following budget plan that divides your take home pay into four equal parts.

1. Housing - 25% (one week's net pay). Never exceed one week's take-home pay, after all payroll deductions, withholdings, Social Security, taxes, credit union, purchases, etc... of paycheck. Include utilities and taxes on home, if possible.

2. Food - 25% (one week's net pay). Covers milk, groceries, meat, children's lunches and other lunches. (Not eating out - see miscellaneous.)

3. Monthly Payments - 25% (one week's net pay). Includes payments for car, furniture, appliances, home improvements, loans and any conditional sales purchase contracts.

4. Miscellaneous - 25% (one week's net pay). Includes insurance, life and other, savings or investments, further education, medical bills, children's allowances, clothing, promotion of family welfare, hobbies, shows, eating out, purchase of records, books, magazines, utilities (if cannot be included in housing), car operations, school tuition, laundry and cleaning costs, club or union expense, haircut and beauty shops, smokes, liquor, entertaining, child support, house repairs, gifts, garden needs, babysitting and dona-

tion to church or charity. (Not necessarily in order of importance).

Percentage must be flexible to meet the needs of the individual family. Housing often requires 30-35% of net income; in that case, one or more of the other categories would have to be reduced. Monthly payments should be closely watched because abuses in that area can cause real needs not to be met. Deficit spendings or even bankruptcy are more serious consequences.

A typical family of four washes about a ton of laundry each year. This means that in many households, eight loads of laundry are done every week, with an average load weight of 6-7 pounds. These washable items represent a major investment. Mistakes in daily care and in laundering can be costly.

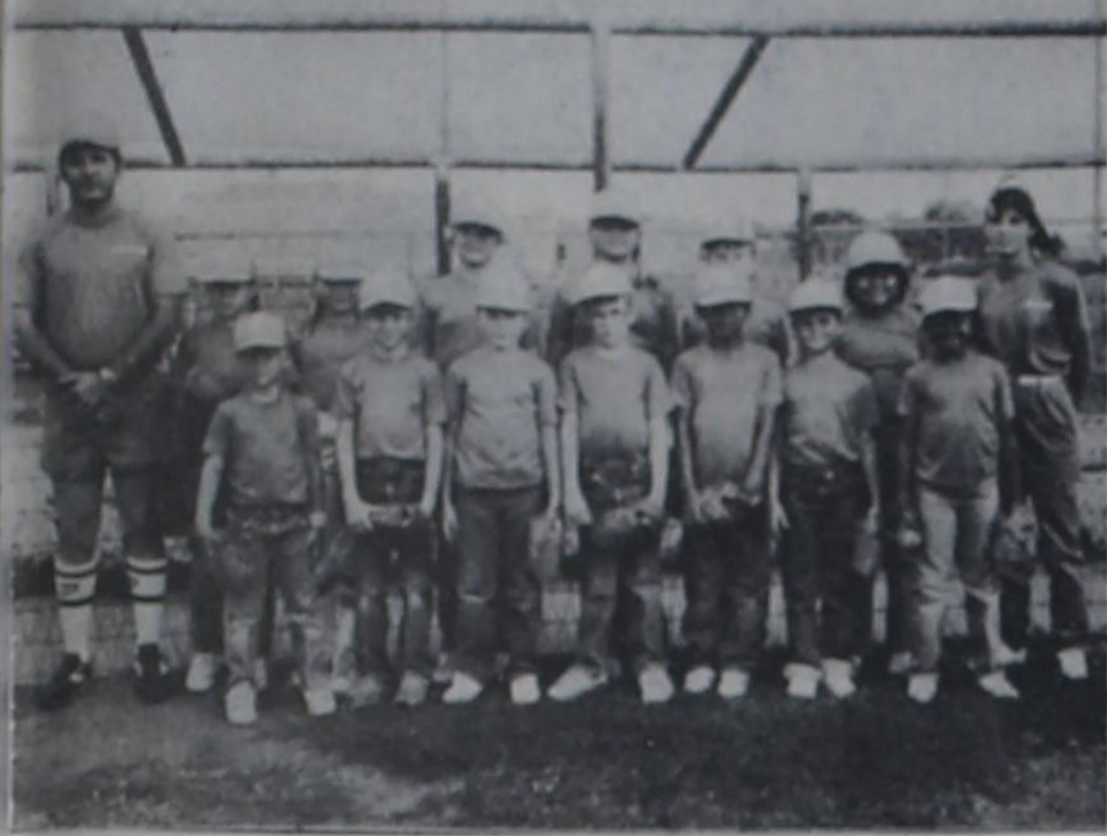

## Venezuela, Colombia Expand Purchase Of U.S. Sorghum

A grain sorghum promotion team recently returned from South America with assurance that more Texas grain will be going to that continent this year. Venezuelan livestock producers will be importing up to 100,000 metric tons of U.S. sorghum between now and September, more than twice as much as they purchased in all of last year. Colombian feeders have just completed a contract for 20,000 metric tons for delivery this month.

The sorghum team spent the last two weeks of June working with livestock producers, feed manufacturers and government officials in Venezuela, Colombia and Peru. They conducted seminars with poultry and swine producers in all three countries. The mission was a sorghum promotion project of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (TGSPB).

Members of the team were Weldon Shelton, a Lamesa farmer and TGSPB director; Elbert Harp, executive director of National Grain Sorghum Producers Association; Dr. Tom Sullivan, poultry nutritionist at the University of Nebraska; and Erick Erickson, Latin American Director for U.S. Feed Grains Council. Arrangements were made by Erickson and Manuel Rodriguez, USFGC Country Director

for South America with offices in Caracas.

Livestock feeders in Venezuela are well aware of U.S. sorghum's superior value but feeders in Peru think all sorghum is the same low quality as that grown in their country. Peru has not imported sorghum for about 12 years and Peruvian feeders use sorghum only when they are required to. When the team told Peruvian poultry and swine producers of the high value of U.S. sorghum and its price advantage, the feeders asked to see it demonstrated. Plans are being developed for demonstration trials this fall.

"Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board is creating demand for Texas sorghum through market development projects like these," Shelton said. "Many people think the grain traders sell our grain but the fact is, the traders fill orders after we have convinced the foreign livestock feeders that our grain is a good buy."

"Sorghum producers of the Texas High Plains finance this work through TGSPB's uniform checkoff on their grain," Shelton explained. "Our program is voluntary because any producer who does not wish to participate has his money refunded."

"Texas sorghum farmers will vote between July 20 and August 15 in a

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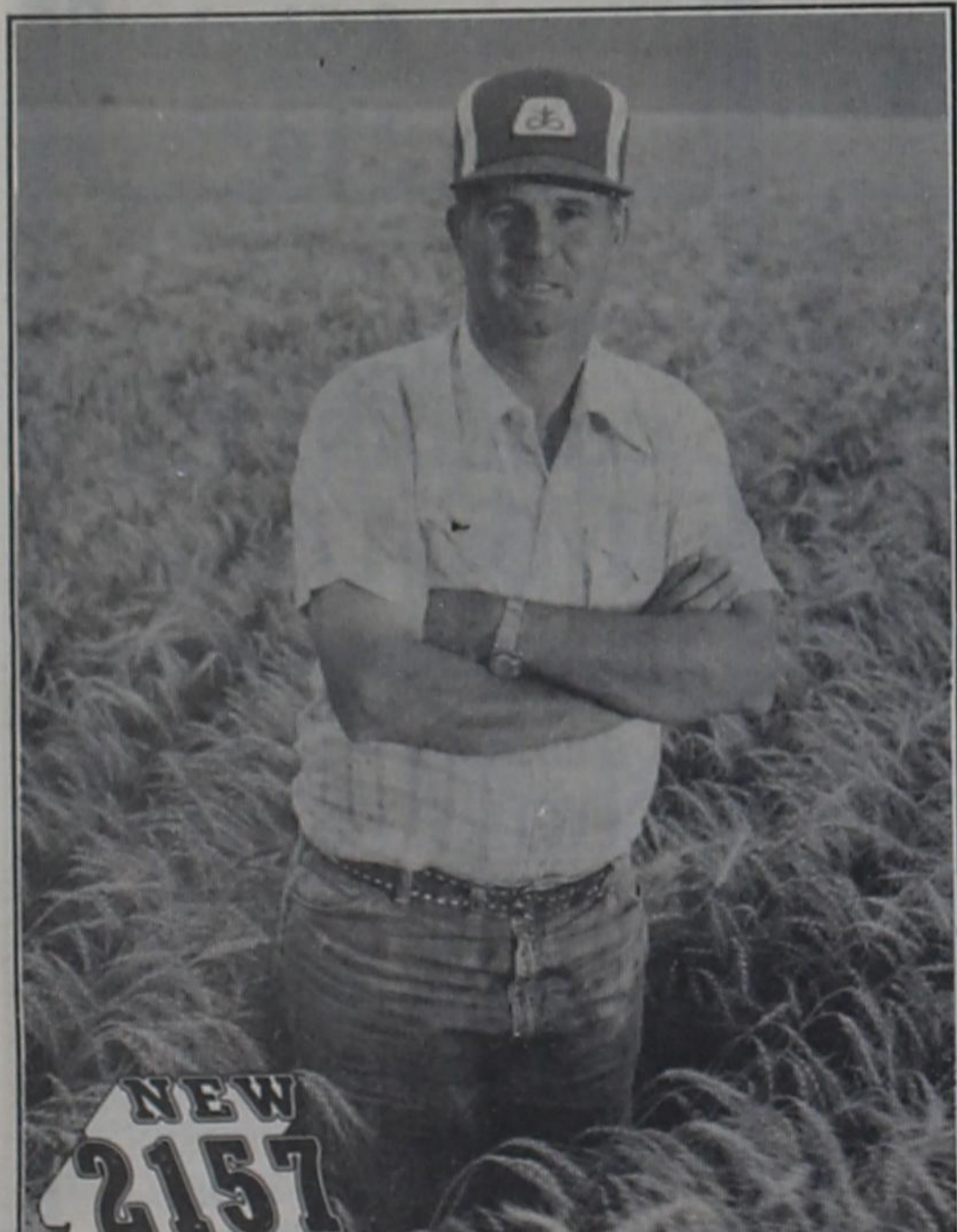
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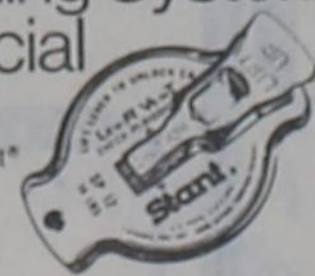


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## Rhineland Couple Exchanges Vows In Afternoon Wedding

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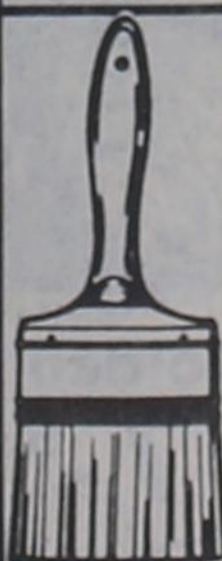

### NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

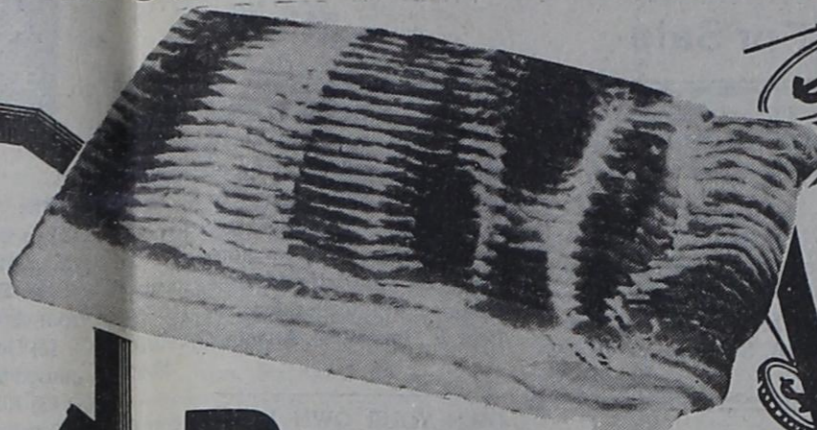


