for patients' rights, Knox County Hospital District has adhered to establish policies and mechanisms to safeguard patients' confidential healthcare information," according to Stephen Kuchler, Knox County Hospital District adminis trator. A recent Texaslaw clarifies
that confidential healthcare information may be released only upon written authorization of the pative or if a specific legal exception
Senator Frank Madla (D-San Antonio) was the author of the legislation which establishes pa-
rameters for all Texas hospitals to follow when relcasing patient healthcare information. Senate Bill 667, passed in May by the Texas
Legislature, defines patients' rights Legislature, definespatients' rights
concerning releasc of their healthcare information, including healthcare information, including
assuring patients access to own medical records. "The law requires hospitals to obtain the written authorization of a patient information relating to the patient's medical history, trearment, diagnosis or prognosis," Kuehler said
"The patient's decision will fect how visitors, deliveries, tele phone calls and request for infor mation from family, friends and mation from family, friends and
others are handled, "Kuehler continued. The law allows unatho tinued. The law allows unautho rized disclosure of healthcare in formation to specified people o the patient, to third-party pay for forpurposes of hospital reimburse orpurposes of hospital reimburse ment to governmental agencies as authorized by law and to a court, As long standing advocate for As long standing advocate for patient's rights, Knox County Hospital District has readily enacted the new state requirements. "We are always eager to find new and innovative ways to give our pa-
tients the utmost power in making tients the utmost power in making decision about their healthcare," Kuchler said. "The new changes
will have a noticeable effect will have a noticeable effect at the hospita," Kuehlercontinued. "The hospital will be able to acknowl-
edge an adult patient's presence, unless otherwise requested by the patient, but will only be able to

tatus report, without prior patien he decision, in most instances, as o what information, if any, will be disclosed and to whom the disclosure is made," Kuehler said Under the new law, all patient information, including that related to public figures and those involved in matters of public record is treated equally. "The hospital will continue to withhold all informa tion regarding incidence such as rape, sexual abuse, child orelderly abuse, chemical dependency, at empted suicide, and any informaion with regard to inmates in the Texas Department of Crimina Justice or those in protective tody," Kuehler continued.
