



Jeff Scott, a retired cowboy, who for twelve years had been a cowboy on the Pitchfork Ranch in King County, conceived the idea of a Cowboys' Reunion in 1896. He proposed such contests and diversions as would vividly recall old scenes and old associates. Thus, the first reunion was organized and held on July 22, 23 and 24, 1896, complete with baseball games and a Grand Ball at the Opera House.

Seymour will kick-off the Centennial event on Thursday, July 11, with a noon meal catered by Valley View Mini Mart. Old Settlers will converge on the Seymour City Park at 9 a.m. to renew old friendships and enjoy entertainment provided by square dancers, fiddlers and The Jay Michaels Band.

The Arts and Crafts Show will be held at the Baylor County Extension Building during the three day event from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A downtown parade will begin at 4 p.m. featuring riding clubs, clowns, floats and, of course, cow-

T-N-T Rodeo Company will provide the stock for the T.C.R.A. approved Rodeo on Thursday and Friday night, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the Seymour Rodeo Grounds. A dance on Thursday will be sponsored by the Old Settlers Committee featuring The Jay Michaels Band from 9 p.m. to 12. The Jay Michaels Band will once again take the stage on Friday night for a dance sponsored by the Seymour Rodeo Association from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

Saturday morning's events will begin with the Old Timer Tie Down Calf Roping (age 55 and older) and

the Old Timer Breakaway (age 65 and older). Champion calf roper will receive a hand-tooled saddle commemorating the 100th celebration and breakaway winner will receive a buckle.

New to the celebration this year will be an Open Chuck Wagon Saturday. Meat, Beans, Dessert and Bread will be judged with three places to be awarded in each respective category. The public is invited to enjoy a taste of the old West, at the cost of \$7.00 per meal ticket.

A Rodeo Matinee will begin at 2 p.m., Saturday afternoon.

Former Seymourite Jay Michaels will open the dance on Saturday night, beginning at 9 p.m. The Jay Michaels Band will perform original songs written by Jay Michaels as well as other country favorites.

Wade Hayes will be the featured performer on Saturday night for a concert/dance from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. in the rodeo arena. Tickets are \$10 each, with advance tickets available at Tenner's Western Outfitters in Wichita Falls, T.J.'s Stockman's Store in Seymour and the Banner Publishing Company in Seymour.

TxDOT allows selected roadside mowing and baling

Due to the continuing drought, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is making some of its right-of-way available for ranchers for mowing and baling of roadside grasses. Under authority granted by the Texas Legislature in 1977, TxDOT can allow ranchbum "Old Enough To Know Bet- ers to mow and bale vegetation along the department's 77,000 miles of highway.

Written permission from the appropriate TxDOT district engineer is required before any mowing and baling take place. Owners of propvices on Sunday morning at the erty adjacent to the right-of-way have the right of first refusal before Breakfast will be served at 7 a.m., others are allowed to mow or bale. The district engineer has the authority to den any request.

Persons granted permission to mow or bale must not receive compensation for performance of these operations but may use or dispose of the hay or other materials produced. Mowing and baling will be limited to appropriate rural roadways.

"When disaster strikes, we do everything we can to help," said Bill Burnett, TxDOT executive director. "If ranchers can make use of the grass without endangering the public or harming the road system, we will do our best to be accommodating."



Wheat harvest '96 ends in good shape

Only three harvest crews remained in the area after the welcomed rains of the past several weeks. The other harvesters were able to come in, cut, and leave in rapid fashion to finish work else where.

Corey Moore, spokesperson for Farmer's Grain, reported that 937,000 bushels of wheat were harvested this year, as in comparison to the 700,000 that was originally expected. Last year Farmer's Grain took in almost 800,000 bushels of wheat. Most of the harvest was reported to number one grade - an improvement over the number two grade that was initially harvested. This year Farmer's Grain shipped out 800 truck loads of the commodity, an improvement over last year when they shipped out 400 truck loads with additional rail cars making up some of the difference.

The price of the wheat fell after harvest began with the low price being \$5.16 per bushel, a vast difference from the \$6.50 at the beginning of the season.

There is a temporary lull inactivity at Farmer's Grain which gives employees a little breathing room until the mile harvest begins in four to six weeks.
