

Cotton field day at Chillicothe to be September 22

Techniques and technology to help Rolling Plains cotton farmers cope with contentious growing conditions will be showcased September 22 at the cotton field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Chillico-

The program begins with registration at 8:30 a.m. It includes lunch and participants can obtain up to three continuing education units needed for pesticide applicator certification.

To reach the research facility, go south from Chillicothe on FM 91 until it intersects with FM 392. Continue south for another mile.

David Bordovsky, research scientist with the Experiment Station at Vernon-Chillicothe, is chairman of the field day. He said exhibits and stops on the tour will feature what the scientists are learning about new methods, new materials and new cotton varieties.

Four field stops are planned: 1. Entomologists will report on cotton aphid studies and discuss latest steps in insect management;

2. Work with cotton breeding nurseries will be explained;

3. Findings will be revealed on research on use of cover crops in

cropping systems; 4. A look at studies on effects of cotton row spacing, cotton varieties most suitable to areas of the Rolling Plains, and effects of salinity.

Two indoor presentations will discuss weed control and the production of naturally colored cot-

The luncheon speaker will be Woody Anderson, farmer and state chairman of the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation, discussing the boll weevil eradication program.

The Munday Moguls bounced back from last week's loss to roll past the Petrolia Pirates 32 to 7.

The Moguls defense worked in the first quarter to push the Pirates back to their own19. Munday forced a short punt out of bounds at the Pirate 29. Bronco Flye ran the ball on the next two plays on runs of 27 and 2 for the Mogul touchdown. The PAT failed and Munday was on top 6-0.

Petrolia received the kick-off and then moved the ball up to their 43 and then was forced to punt. Munday received the ball and a penalty pushed them back to their own 38. On the next play with great blocking by the offense, Bronco Flye worked through the defense and then sprinted 62 yards as the clock ran out for the first quarter. The PAT by Junior Perez increased the Munday lead 13-0. Only 15 seconds ticked away in the second before the Moguls scored again. On the first play of Petrolia's next drive, Bronco Flye intercepted a Pirate pass at midfield. Flye then returned it 48 yards for the touchdown. The score was now 19 to 0 and would remain there until the end of the

Petrolia came out ready in the third. The Moguls received the kick-off but soon were forced to punt at their own 15. The punt rush by the Pirates blocked the kick and Petrolia took over at the Mogul 3 yard line. Eric Grover then punched in for the Pirate touchdown with 9:39 left in the third. Cody Cope kicked the PAT and the score becamed 19 to 7.

After trading a punt with the Pirates, Munday took over at their own 36. Averaging 8.5 yards a carry, the Moguls marched down the field to the Pirate 9. Jason Hise then ran in for the touchdown. A two point conversion failed but the
