

## REV. FREEMAN GIVES BUFFALO HEAD TO McMURRY MUSEUM

A unique spot on the McMurry campus is the museum. From the outside, it looks like an ordinary little frame building. But the interior is far from that. It is arranged in such a way as to represent an old West Texas cabin. The walls are covered with sacks. Near the door is an immense buffalo head brought from Wichita Falls by Rev. R. B. Freeman. There is a rude fire place constructed of rock and cement by Ovid Lee Donaldson, a senior of '27 who was killed a few days after the completion of the work. In the fireplace hangs an old iron pot and kettle. The head of a deer is hanging above.

There are many things in this room to remind one of the early American Indian. There is a part of a jaw bone and a petrified knee cap thought to have belonged to Indians. There is an altar stone possibly 1000 years old from a Pueblo temple, and the stone face of an Aztec Indian god. There are several rocks which the Indians used in grinding meal. One may also see the hammer and anvil used by the Indians in curing meat. They would pound the meat dry and would often mix it with berries to make a dish known as pemmican. There is an Indian saddle horn made from a mesquite stump, and a spear head found in an Aztec Indian village near Cordoba, and there is every indication that it was left by Cortez in the conquest of Mexico. The spear was used in killing buffalo.

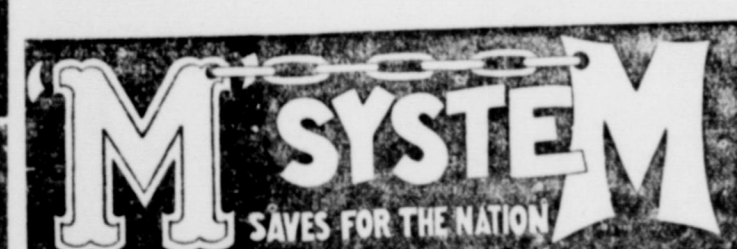

## INCREASE IN COTTON ACREAGE MEANS DISASTER

(Continued from first page) a gradual change rather than an immediate change. Just so should a diversified program be adopted. But just as sure as there occurs a heavy over-production in cotton due to excess acreage, there will be a heavy demand from all corners of Texas for relief through legislation or some other source.

We could call attention to a number of other advantages that will accrue to the farmers by making a reduction in cotton acreage, among which is the conservation of the soil, a reduction in the cost of gathering, a better stand and more cotton per acre because of more intense cultivation, and a greater independence for the farmer who produces his living on his farm and is compelled to ask no man for the necessities of life with which to make another crop or pay a land note, so, let every

farmer adopt the plan of diversifying his fancy, and above all, bring about a substantial reduction in cotton acreage, and we'll all be less concerned about farm relief legislation, which after all would more than likely have the relief left off.

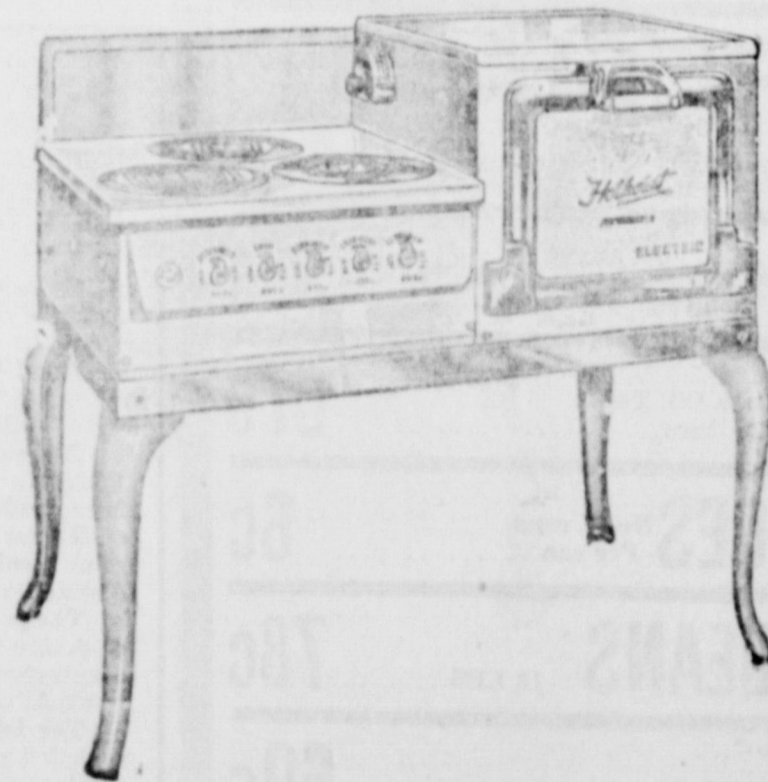
