## City Council reports on March meeting

The City Council of the City of Munday met in regular session at the Munday City Hall on March 11.

All members were present. The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor Tidwell and previous meeting minutes were approved as read.

The monthly police report was briefed by Chief Tejeda.

The monthly financial report was heard.

The maintenance status of facilities and equipment was discussed. Priorities for removing dilapidated structures on Highway 277 were considered. Legal questions vary from property to property and must be answered prior to demolition. The will proceed as clearances are received.

Winters Mathews was appointed election judge on a Bowen motion and a White second. Motion carried.

The Investment Policy of the City of Munday, required by the Public Funds Investment Act, was reviewed. Approval/disapproval was tabled until the next meeting, until more data could be compiled.

The FY 1997/1998 proposed budget was discussed at length. A Public Hearing has been advertised and will be held on March 21, 1997.

The monthly bills were reviewed and approved, on a Bowen motion, Owens second, with all for.

White moved the meeting be adjourned at 8:45 p.m. Bowen seconded and the meeting adjourned.

The foregoing minutes have neither been approved or accepted by the Munday City Council.

## Board of Trustees meets to discuss personnel contract

The Munday ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session on Thursday, March 20, 1997 at 7:00 p.m. in the Administration Building. The major item on the agenda was extension of contracts to professional personnel of the district.

Also approved were three local updates to the policy manual, a resolution opposing private school vouchers, and the use of the Professional Development Appraisal System for teacher appraisal in 1997-98. Reports were given on the building project and the investments of the school district.

In personnel items, all personnel were rehired for the 1997-98 school year. Cathy Harper was hired as a teacher for the Chapter I math program. This program will give students having difficulty in math additional time to improve their math skills. In other personnel matters Curtis Goforth was reassigned and will not serve as the Girls Basketball coach.

The local policy manual was updated by the approval of Local Update 54, Local Update on Section E, and Update #09-97. These updates continue to bring local policy in line with recent legisla-

tion as well as update people responsible for Title IX and Section 504.

The board also approved a resolution opposing private school vouchers. There is a movement to take public tax dollars and use that to pay tuition to private schools if a students wishes to attend that private school. That would take the limited funds of public schools and give it to private schools.

Also approved was the use of the Professional Development Appraisal System for use in appraising teachers in 1997-98. This system takes some of the present system used in Texas and adds three domains. These domains evaluate teachers on professional development, student achievement, and compliance with rules and operating procedures.

The next board meeting will be April 10th at 8:00.

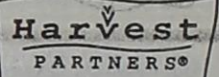

# Knox County Hospital Trauma Committee meets during March

The Knox County Hospital Trauma Committee met in regular session on Friday, March 7, at a luncheon in the hospital cafeteria. New member, Reverend David White, Pastor of the First Baptist Church was introduced to the other committee members. Reverend White will serve as the ministerial alliance representative. Appreciation was expressed by the committee to Ms. Eileen Rolo, President of the hospital Pink Ladies Auxiliary for the many contributions her organization has made to the medical community.

Plans were discussed in seeking Level 4 Trauma designation for the hospital. Trauma survey date has been set for April 18. Ms. Jori Klein, RN, of Parkland Hospital in Dallas will conduct the survey of the emergency room facilities and staff, EMS personnel, 9-1-1 facilities and overall capabilities of the hospital trauma team in the event of a mass disaster.

The first hour following a life threatening injury is known as "the golden hour". If critically injured patients have access to the necessary medical treatment within that hour, chances of survival are much greater. The trauma team consists of many well trained and dedicated

people to insure that patients receive the extensive treatment necessary for recovery.

When EMS or law enforcement officers arrive on a scene that warrants such treatment, a code is given to the 9-1-1 dispatcher. The dispatcher immediately notifies hospital personnel and the trauma team is activated. Many emergencies can be treated in the Knox County Hospital emergency room, but if the doctor decides treatment in a larger facility is needed, the patient is transferred, either by ambulance or medical helicopter.

The trauma committee will have articles published, periodically concerning first aid, health and preventative issues that may be of interest to Knox County citizens.

# Local ladies enjoy "Spring in the South" bus tour

On Tuesday the group left for the John C. Stennis Space Center in Mississippi. This is a NASA test center where main engines used to boost the Space Shuttle into orbit are certified.

The tour then visited in Biloxi, Mississippi and set sail on the "Sailfish." Upon leaving the harbor a shrimping net was set out after the captain made a brief explanation. Thirty minutes later he drew the nets in and identified the catch prior to returning to shore.

Another interesting visit was made to the Doll House, where over 500 dolls of every description, plus stuffed animals and two doll houses were on display.

"Beauvoir", the last home of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States of America was also on the tour list. There the group ventured through the house, which was built in 1853 and furnished mostly with original Davis pieces, and two museums.

On Wednesday the tour group visited the beautiful Bellingrath Gardens - the 900 acre estate of Walter Bellingrath, a pioneer in the Coca Cola bottling industry. Here 65 acres are charmingly landscaped around the mansion. Camellias, daffodils, tulips,

hyacinths and many azaleas were in full bloom.

Next came a tour of the city of Mobile. There they visited the Spanish Plaza and Historic district, Admiral Sterrnes Monument, Church Street Cemetery and Alabama State Docks. The beautiful windows of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception were also viewed by the group.

## Department of Human Services releases 1996 report on Knox County

The state spent a total of \$2,524,862 last year for major welfare programs in Knox County, according to David Maberry, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$500,046 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$104,638. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$1,656,539 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$211,523 for Medicaid related services and \$52,116 for non-Medicaid related services," Maberry said.

The 'Via Delorosa' is the way to

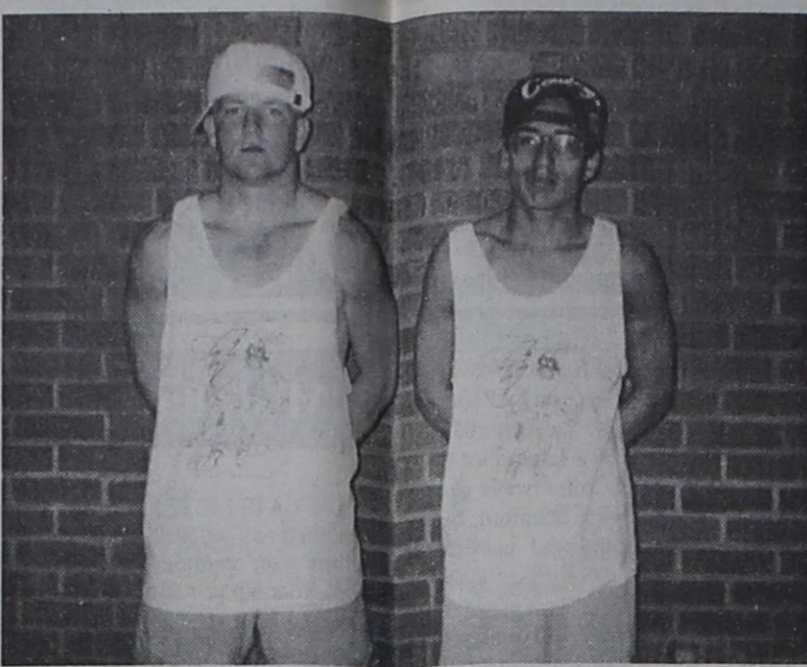
