## 204 teams enter Munday's 1st Team Roping Festival

There were 204 teams entered in the contest held Saturday, June 18. The Brazos Valley Roping Arena was a busy place, as the cowboys warmed up their horses and their arms, waiting for their time to ride.

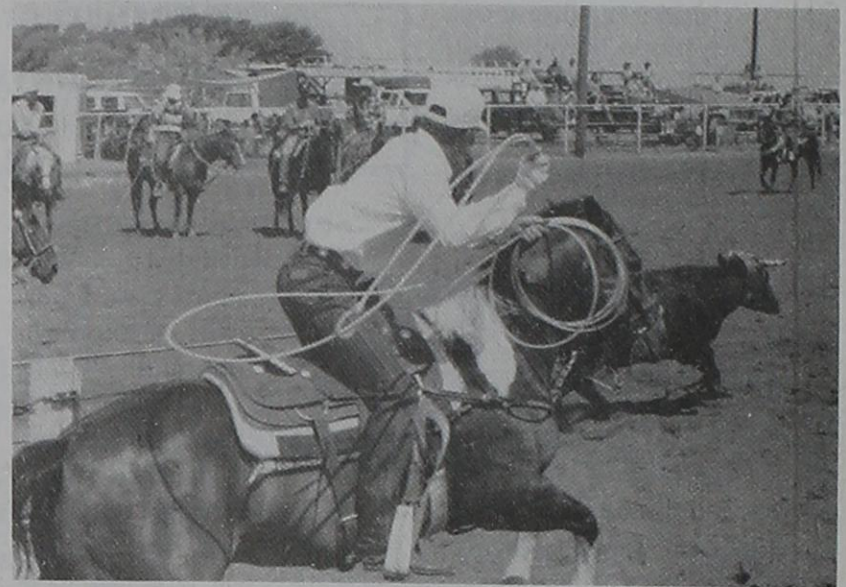
This event was a #4 novice four-head roping, meaning you had to make it through four go-rounds without missing your steer in order to have a chance at the top prizes. You also had to have the lowest combined time of all four rounds.

Cash prizes were awarded to the top three places in the first go-round. Larry and Todd Thompson of Munday won \$367.50 each with a time of 7.61; Brad McGuire of Seymour and Cecil Tinney of Megargel placed second with 7.93 and won \$220 each; and the team of Bob Miller of Quanah and James Gholson of Guthrie took home \$147 each for their third place time of 8.10.

By 3:00 that afternoon, the winners were announced and awarded their prizes. Ronnie Davis of Mangum, Oklahoma, and Gary Jacobs of Vernon had the lowest combined time of 40.34. They each won a two-horse trailer plus \$764 in cash.

Winning the Double J saddles for second place were James Gholson of Guthrie and Guy Elkins of Abilene with their time of 45.59. They also received \$646 each. Adding this win with the 3rd place finish in the first round, Mr. Gholson won a total of \$793 cash plus his new saddle.

Third place winners were Brad McGuire of Seymour and Bobby Simmons of Eastland. They had a time of 46.84, and received breast collars and \$528.50 each. Brad teamed up with Cecil Tinney of Megargel to place fourth in the running with a time of 47.59. They each received a belt buckle and \$411.50 in cash. 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## Oklahoma official wants to upgrade Texas Highway 277

One Oklahoma road official wants to give Texas \$10 million to upgrade U.S. Highway 277 between Abilene and Wichita Falls to interstate standards.

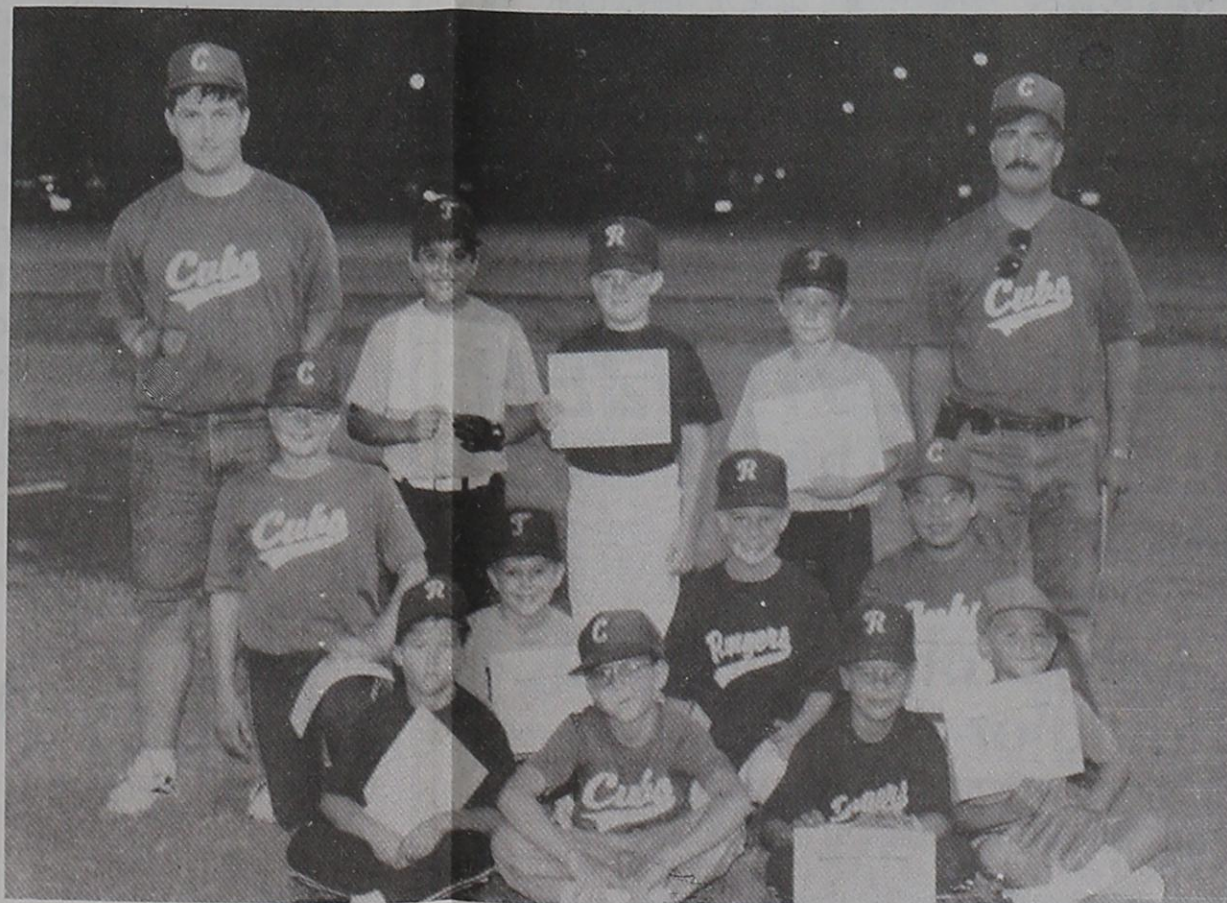
Gib Gibson, secretary treasurer of the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority, believes upgrading the highway from Abilene to Wichita Falls would lead traffic to Oklahoma turnpikes. "It would increase (Turnpike Authority) revenue \$10 million a year," Gibson said.

A state transportation official says that helping Texas upgrade one of its highways would help Oklahoma as well.

A survey recently revealed that over half of Munday residents prefer traveling to Abilene instead of Wichita Falls, due to the better highway heading south. This was not the case before the double lane highway was constructed.

Hopefully Mr. Gibson will make the other Oklahoma Turnpike Authority officials see his point of view.

Any child age one to eighteen is eligible for meals at no cost during these hours at the elementary cafeteria during the above hours.

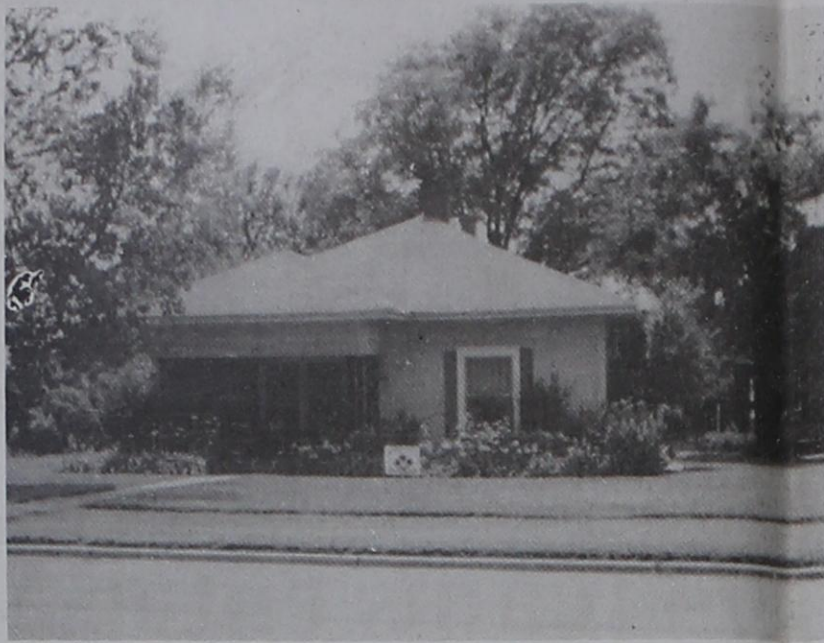

**Summer thunderstorms may  
 produce dangerous lightning**

A typical summer day begins with clear and sunny skies. By late afternoon a rapidly developing thunderstorm approaches. Electrical storms may be fascinating to watch, but they also can be extremely dangerous.

West Texas Utilities Company and the National Safety Council recommend the following important safety measures to follow when encountering lightning during severe thunderstorms.

\* The most dangerous place to be during a storm is in an open area - a field, a golf course, on a boat or in the water.

Whether you are swimming or in a boat, you are surrounded by water, which is a very good conductor. Get out of and away from all water when a storm is approaching.

During storms (or even when the skies look threatening, since lightning often strikes during the calm before a storm) stay off hill-tops and out of open fields. Golf courses and baseball fields are extremely dangerous places to be in a storm.

\* When seeking refuge, choose it carefully - bad shelters can be worse than no shelter at all. Seeking shelter under a tree might seem like a good idea, but it's not. Trees are tall and attract lightning.

Since dry wood is not a good conductor, an electrical current may jump from a tree to a nearby person before reaching the ground.

\* When caught in a storm, get rid of all metal objects such as golf clubs, fishing rods and tennis

rackets. Get off golf carts and bicycles. Stay away from conductors of electricity such as wire fences, power lines, clothes lines, metal pipes and railroad tracks.

\* A large, grounded or steel-framed building is the best place to be in an electrical storm. A metal top car or truck with closed windows is also safe because the vehicle's frame will deflect the lightning charge to the ground.

\* A common misconception people have is that you are safe from lightning once inside the home. The home is full of objects that act as conductors. Keep away from windows, fireplaces, stoves,

sinks, bathtubs and plugged-in electrical appliances.

\* If you are caught out in a field or golf course far from adequate shelter and you hair begins to stand on end, you may be about to be struck by lightning. Immediately drop to your knees, bend forward and place your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat. This position, although providing a higher profile than lying flat, has the advantage of minimum contact with the earth.

Lightning is one of nature's spectacular showcases, but it is unpredictable and can pose a serious threat to our safety. Respect the dangers of lightning and always take precautionary measures during a thunderstorm.

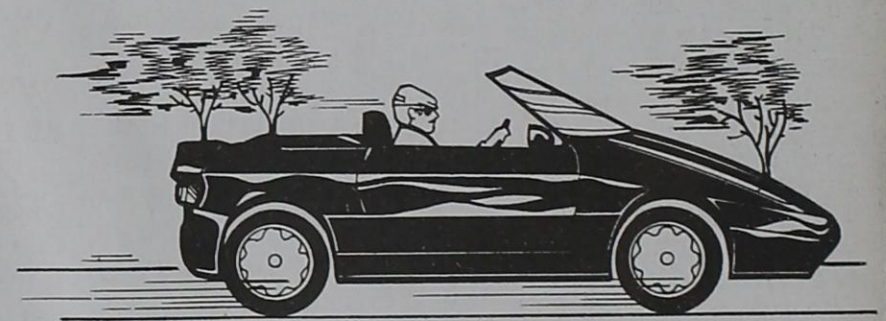
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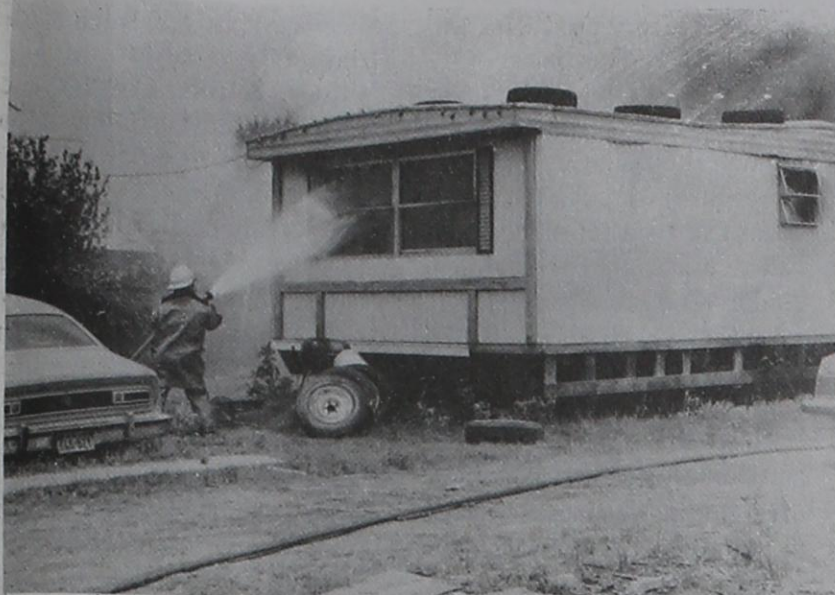

## Hot summer weather may drive some people to drink

*Drink water, that is*

"The body loses a large amount of fluids during hard physical activity, particularly if the weather is hot and humid," said Dr. Jim Pivamik, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "It is important to replenish them. The best way, as obvious as it sounds, is to drink plenty of water."

Whether working construction, running, or merely spending a day at the beach, the heat can sap the body of precious fluids, leading to dehydration.

The simple rule, according to Pivamik, is to pay attention to urine color. People who have adequate amount of body water content normally have pale-colored urine. A darker yellow color indicates that the kidneys are forced to concentrate urine.

Not drinking enough fluids can affect exercise performance, and can lead to heat illness, which can be fatal, Pivamik says.

Signs of water depletion include extreme thirst, dry lips and tongue. In severe cases, there can be an increase in heart rate and breath-

ing, dizziness, confusion, and eventual coma. The skin can appear dry and nonelastic while the sufferer may feel lethargic, and have headaches, cramps and a pale complexion.

Don't wait until there are symptoms to take precautions warns Pivamik.

"Thirst is not a good indicator by itself since by the time you are thirsty, the body's water reserves have already decreased to unhealthy levels," he said.

Pivamik suggests drinking water continuously to keep the body hydrated.

"Take a drink every time you pass a water fountain, and keep a water bottle at your work area and sip on it through the day."

He advises spreading water consumption throughout the day rather than trying to make up for low levels in large gulps. A minimum of one pint of water per hour is a good starting point.

During exercise or strenuous outdoor activity, Pivamik says to drink approximately 8 ounces of water every 15 minutes. Although the body can sweat two quarts of fluid in one hour during hot summer weather, it can only absorb about one quart, making it crucial to be "stocked up" before, during, and after those summertime activities.

## "On A Wizer Note"

Flourishing turfgrass and monetary savings are not two thoughts that necessarily go hand in hand, especially during hot, summer months. There are ways that nearly everyone can enjoy a beautiful lawn this summer and save monetary and natural resources as well.

Water conservation and proper fertilizer rates do not mean you cannot have an acceptable lawn. Water, pesticides and fertilizer are generally expensive, and not always necessary. First of all, an integrated pest management (IPM) approach to taking care of pests -- this may include weeds or insects -- is quite helpful. Become a little more tolerant of weeds and insects, and do not always look for something to spray.

Diagnosing a problem carefully is important. Trying one product after another seldom solves the problem and adds extra pesticides to the environment. Dr. Richard Duple, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in College Station suggests that regular mowing and hand weeding, though tedious, may solve many problems.

Knowing when to expect problems may help in attacking the problem at the right time. Equipment should be calibrated so that the right amounts of pesticide and fertilizer are applied.

Water conservation is another way to save money and a precious natural resource. The idea is to have proper application of water at the right rate at the right time. With automatic sprinklers, the tendency is to water whether the turfgrass needs it or not. Studies have shown that people could probably water about half as much as they do and still have vigorous lawns.

About 50 to 60 percent of the water used in the home is used on landscapes during the summer months. Over-watering not only leads to spending extra money, but could lead to runoff and leaching of fertilizers and pesticides. Plus, it does not improve anything.

One way to assure that your water is being conserved is by leaving your grass clippings on the lawn. Many say "The dead clippings makes the lawn look bad." The idea behind the "Don't Bag It!" program is to get home owners used to mowing the lawn on a more regular basis. This in turn produces less clippings and makes mowing much easier.

Over-fertilization, again is a practice that has completely negative results. Too much fertilizer results in more mowing, pest problems and clippings. Additionally, it may increase water use by as much as 40 percent since rapidly growing turfgrass requires more water.

Once again, by leaving your clippings on the lawn you can save money in fertilizer bills. The clippings will return many nutrients, used by the grass, to the soil. This will also increase the amount of organic matter in the soil profile and will aid in water absorption and aeration.

This extra fertilizer may be fine if you are trying to produce hay. That is probably not true for many lawns.

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry today said that students enrolled in FFA are the best human resources for agriculture and for the future of Texas.

ens of other occupations which serve the farmer or the total agricultural industry," Perry said.

Speaking at the Nacogdoches FFA chapter banquet, Perry asked the students to consider a career in agriculture when they think about their future and career options.

"Today's agricultural industry is more than 200 rewarding and challenging careers. These are promising jobs that offer plenty of opportunity for financial gain as well as personal growth and satisfaction," Perry said.

Perry said that students participating in organizations like the FFA are getting millions of dollars worth of experience they will be able to use later.

"And with the right skills, the right training and the right education and experience, agriculture can open a whole new world of possibilities for you," Perry said. "And you can open some new possibilities for the world."

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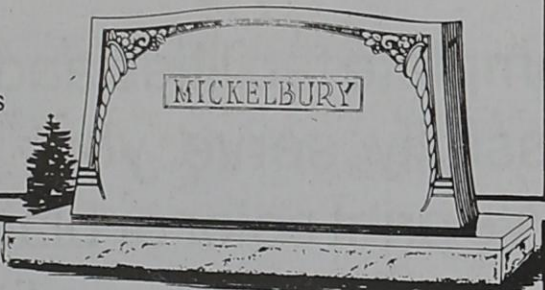

## Wilma Hogan attends Republican Convention

Tired and glad to be home, Wilma Hogan, candidate for State Representative, returned home from the Republican State Convention held in Fort Worth June 9 through 11.

"I'd gone looking for a fight to happen. With all of the media priming us for a battle, I thought I would see fireworks. Governor Richards had called us mean spirited and mongers of hate, so I went expecting trouble," Hogan said. But to her surprise, the convention went smooth from day one. "All I found were people trying to work through some political differences, all the while laughing and having a good time."

"There was a sense of unity in the Republican party. We all want change. The inner battle that I'd expected never occurred. People from all over the state met to pull together and work towards getting Republicans elected in November."

In the keynote address Saturday, gubernatorial candidate George W. Bush stirred the delegates to their feet when he called for the abolishing of the regulatory powers of the Texas Educa-

tion Agency. "We've tried one-size-fits-all education and it doesn't work," he stated. Bush supports a plan in which voters "declare their independence from the TEA's dictates."

The battle for State Party chairman was at the center of the supposed controversy. Tom Pauken, Dallas attorney who was backed by Christian Coalition, was up against Joe Barton, U.S. Representative from Ennis and Dolly Madison McKenna, a candidate chosen by the moderates in the party. But after a preliminary vote of caucusing delegates, Barton and McKenna withdrew from the race.

Barton and McKenna both asked delegates for their unanimous support of Pauken in their concession speeches. Pauken pledged a grassroots campaign on behalf of George Bush as well as the other GOP candidates. In his speech, he stated, "We are going to take our state back, block by block, neighborhood by neighborhood, county by county, district by district, led by a volunteer army of committed Republicans who know how high the stakes are."

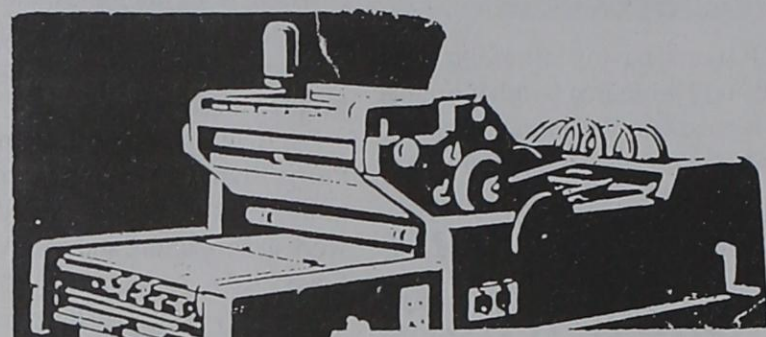
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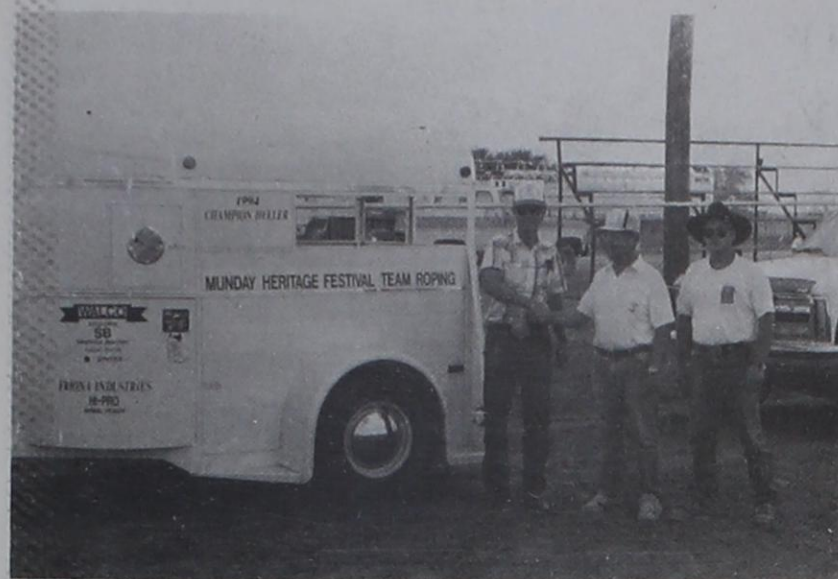
