Warrant issued for former resident in Quanah homicide

Hardeman County Sheriff's Department issued a murder warrant for 19-year-old Ana Mendiola on Monday, January 22. Ms. Mendiola is wanted in connection with the January 7 death of Catalina Delgado Lopez whose charred body was found smoldering under a bridge near Quanah. Ana Mendiola was residing in Crowell at the time of the murder but has been a resident of Munday at various times in the past. She has not been seen since the time of the murder and remains at large.

Another suspect, Joey Coronado of Crowell, Texas, was apprehended and arrested in Homestead, Florida, and a third suspect is still being sought. A nineteen year old Quanah woman, Rose Mary Martinez, is the third suspect for whom a warrant has been issued. All three suspects disappeared from the area on January 8, one day after the murder was committed.

The victim, Catalina Delgado

Lopez, was stabbed to death in his home and had knife wounds to his chest, throat and stomach.

After he died, someone loaded Lopez' body into the bed of a pickup, then doused his body with some kind of accelerant and set the body on fire underneath a bridge on a county road. A hunter discovered the remains when he saw smoke and fire under the bridge.

A pickup truck purchased by Coronado's family has been seized by authorities and tests revealed blood and "drag marks" where it appears that a body had been pulled from the bed of the truck.

Lopez' 1991 Oldsmobile Cutlass Calais was found in City Lake just outside of the golf course in Munday three days after he was killed. Due to the remoteness of the lake it had been speculated that someone with knowledge of the area had placed the auto in that location. Authorities were able to identify the vehicle as belonging to Lopez but all other trace evidence had been wiped free of the car.

All three suspects in the case, Coronado, Martinez and Mendiola, were apparently good friends who walked out on their jobs at the Crowell cap factory about one week before Lopez died, a plant supervisor said.

Open burning prohibited in Knox County

Knox County Judge David N. Perdue declared that a state of emergency exists in Knox County due to the extreme potential for large and destructive wildfires.

Judge Perdue issued his second emergency order within two months, effective immediately, which prohibits any open burning in the unincorporated areas of Knox County except the burning of combustible material in approved enclosures, such as trash barrels and charcoal grills which are designed to contain all flames and embers.

Dry conditions, and the lack of significant rainfall still exist. Local fire department officials, the National Weather Service and Texas Forest Service personnel advise that there is no present forecast for improving conditions.

The order signed by Judge Perdue provides that repeated or flagrant violations of the order shall constitute a misdemeanor, and that any peace officer of the State of Texas may enforce the order in the venue of Knox County.

This will go into effect immediately and will be in effect for the next ten days, and then will stay in effect until significant moisture occurs.

County Sheriff voices concerns after accident

Sometimes a picture is worth a thousand words, sometimes one or two words will do, let's try STUPID! There were five young kids in this vehicle, all drinking alcohol, all hurt, and apparently none of the parents knew where their kids were. Every time something like this happens, there comes next, a long list of complaints and excuses. I know that some kids are going to drink regardless of how close their parents try to watch over and protect them, but when a peace officer, realizing this, takes one of the "experimenters" home and the parent(s) jump all over the officer for "allowing" this kind of activity in our community, the same answer applies: STUPID! We all know that I'm not referring to just the kids who wind up in an accident, or taken to jail or worse. I get more complaints about young kids (10 and 12 years old) drinking beer while out at the Rhineland dances than I do about my Deputies enforcing traffic laws. Is it our fault, as law enforcement officers, that this happens? Is it the fault of those hosting the dances? Is our job to accept this and play parent to these kids? If your answer is yes, the same applies: STUPID! Some parents have actually told me, face to face, that they know their kids are drinking, but it is okay because they know where they are! STUPID! Others have told me that they can't control their child, some are being raised in single-parent homes or by other family members such as grandparents, aunts, cousins, etc. The bottom line is that the child is the parent's or guardian's responsibility, not the Cop's, not the school teacher's, not the church official's.

If you feel that as a parent or guardian of a "problem" child, that you can't discipline your child for fear of being "turned into CPS", then call the Child Protective Services yourself. I'm not the perfect parent, no one is, but my kids are my responsibility. I don't blame anyone else for any problems I may have. Child Protective Services deal with problems of abuse and/or neglect, parents deal with raising the child. Who has not at

sometime allowed a child to drive a vehicle before the child is licensed? Something as innocent, and sometimes necessary in our farming communities, as that has led to "joy riders" -or sneaking the car out at night for "just a spin". Then we get complaints that we, the law enforcement, are the ones letting these kids drive around with out a license! STUPID! This is just my opinion. Parents better wake up to the fact that more and more laws are including the parent being responsible. Does it take writing the parent a citation for allowing an unlicensed driver to operate a motor vehicle before a parent starts to wake up? What happens when a child causes an accident and the parent gets sued? We all know how Law-Suit-Happy our society is becoming! Being written a citation seems to have more impact on a parent than the child getting hurt does! STUPID! Law enforcement personnel, don't "allow" kids to drink, or drive with out a license, and the reputation hanging over the Rhineland dance is not caused by those hosting the dance! Problems are caused by irresponsible parents who either don't know or don't care what their kids are doing or with whom they do it with.

I know what I am saying will make some people upset. Good! Great! Maybe you'll get mad enough to try and prove me wrong! Good, get after it! Get angry enough to know where your kids are! Get angry enough to take control of the few problem ones that do get in trouble! Get angry enough to think about it!

In the Texas Criminal and Vehicle Handbook, Chapter 12 describes The Parent-Child Relationship.

Section 12.04 Rights, privileges, duties and powers of parent.

Except as otherwise provided by judicial order or by an affidavit or relinquishment of parental rights executed under Section 15.03 of this code, the parent of a child has the following rights, privileges, duties and powers:

(2) the duty to care, control, protection, and reasonable discipline of the child;

The Texas Department of Health in Stamford holds regularly scheduled immunization clinics to ensure that all children in Haskell and surrounding counties are protected from vaccine preventable diseases. Children who receive their vaccinations on a timely basis benefit from the protection these vaccinations provide and contribute to the well-being of everyone.

Fees for these immunizations are based on household size and income. In most cases there is little or no cost. Please bring you child's shot record, social security number, and medicaid number if receiving medicaid. Our next regularly scheduled clinic for February will be held at the following locations; Haskell American Legion Hall, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on February 15; Knox City Community Center from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on February 20.

If your child needs to begin or continue his immunizations and you are unable to attend one of these clinics, you may call (915) 773-5681 and arrange a time and date for immunizations to be administered.

John Weeks settles in as new City Manager

Munday seems to have made a fine choice in hiring its new City Manager, Mr. John Weeks. He is already on the job and going at break neck speed after having settled the family into their new home and school situation.

Mr. Weeks is emphatic about how nice the citizens of Munday have been to help him get settled in and adjusted to his new job. He states, "We feel really fortunate to have such a great staff around us and to have such wonderful people helping us out as we moved into town. Everyone has been super nice to my family and we really appreciate it." He also adds that he has met many people in and around town but that if he hasn't met you then you are welcomed to come by and have a cup of coffee with him.

Mr. Weeks wants to have an "open door" type policy on his office. If you have a complaint or an objection on a subject that should concern the City Manager then he invites you to call or come by his office. If he does not have an answer to your situation readily available then he will endeavor to get an answer to you, even though it may not be the specific answer you're hoping for. The old saying "You can't fight City Hall" is true because Mr. Week's says he will not fight but he is readily accessible for genuine discussions.

Mr. Weeks is concerned with several issues that affect the quality of life in Munday and will be addressing these problems in the near future.

One of the problem areas that concerns him the most is the volume of decaying and dilapidated

buildings in the town. City Hall is currently seeking legal advice on how to improve the looks of some of the areas around town and how to go about enforcing the City Ordinances against such properties. He says that the City will try to work with the owners of the properties in question but hopes that the owners will voluntarily clean up the buildings and lots that are in need of such attention since notices will be mailed out to owners of said properties in the near future.

Paving of streets that are in need is another area of concern to the new City Manager. He welcomes your input but can't promise any specific actions on these streets until he gets the proper authority. Many people have already requested that the paving of B Street beside the Elementary School be at the top of this list.

Stray dogs on the run are another problem that citizen's have complained about and Mr. Weeks would truly like to remedy the situation before a child gets needlessly hurt. He realizes that there is no quick fix and he welcomes ideas to help solve the problem.

Once you talk to John Weeks you realize that he truly has Munday's concerns at heart and that he is adjusting to our town quite well. He is already saying "ya'll" and has purchased a pickup truck so he is fitting in just fine.

He also adds that his wife would love to purchase a horse so if you have one for sale please don't tell her. The Week's children, Colter, a fourth grader in Mrs. Hall's class, and Cody, a Kindergarten student of Mrs. Pankhurst, have been enjoying school and are anxious to become more involved in sports and church activities. Little Cody accompanied his dad to the Stock Show and has decided that he would like a pet pig - over Mom's objections, of course.

Be sure to get to know our new City Manager. He is anxious to serve.

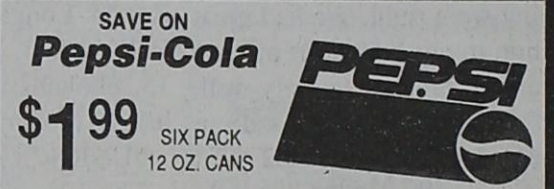

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"On A Wizer Note"

Knox County is known for cattle, cotton, wheat and watermelons throughout Texas. How many people know about Knox County sheep and goat production? Probably not many. Why is that? Mainly because it is not as big a commodity as the others listed.

Those who do raise sheep are probably well aware of the National Sheep Referendum on February 6, 1996. This referendum will be for the "Sheep and Wool Program, Research, Education, and Information Order". Anyone who raised or fed sheep during the time period of January 1, 1994 through December 31, 1994 are eligible to vote.

Voting will take place at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service office in each county. Voting hours will be regular office hours — 8 a.m. through 5 p.m. These ballots will then be collected by the Farm Services Agency for counting.

Once again, this is for anyone who fed or raised lambs or sheep in 1994. This includes 4-H and FFA show lambs.

Speaking of 4-H, the Knox County 4-H Valentine's Dance is scheduled for Saturday, February 10 beginning at 7 p.m. All 4-H members are welcome to attend and bring a guest. Each member is asked to bring a 2 liter soft drink or a plate of snacks as a cover charge. We will also be playing Bingo. For this, 4-H'ers are asked to bring a white elephant gift.

The weekend of February 9-11 will also be the date of the 1996 District Beef Show in Wichita Falls. Several steer and heifer exhibitors from Knox County will be attending.

Other stock shows in the near future are the San Antonio Livestock Exposition - February 3-18; Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo - February 16-March 3; and the San Angelo Stock Show March 2-10, 1996. Good luck to all the 4-H and FFA exhibitors at these shows.

Farmers and ranchers will also have a show of their own coming up. The Texoma Farm & Ranch Show will be in Wichita Falls on Wednesday and Thursday, February 21 and 22, 1996. On Wednesday, beginning at 8 a.m. a program will be conducted. This program will offer 5 CEU's toward pesticide licenses. Topics for this program include: "Peach and Pecan Production"; "Wild Oat Control"; "Wheat & Cotton Pest Management"; "Wheat Breeding and Management"; and "Laws and Regulations".

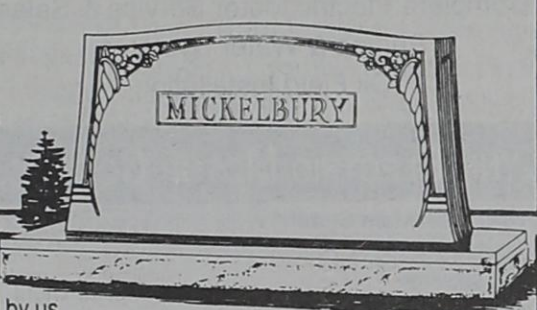

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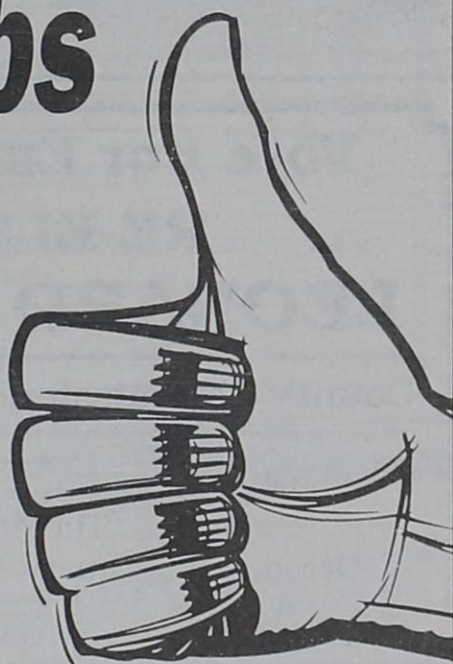
