# Area farmers give thanks for rain

Eyes were raised to the heavens during the later part of the week when some much needed moisture fell upon the parched lands of the Knox Prairie. By Friday morning, February 7, approximately one inch had fallen in the Munday area with locations just to the north reporting almost one and one-half inch.

"This is just great," states Sonny Moore of Farmer's Grain Co-op in Munday, "It just couldn't have fallen any better."

He went on to explain that what our wheat fields need now is more moisture and seasonal temperatures of 55 - 70 degrees. "If it gets too warm it just gets rid of the moisture in the ground that much faster," he reports. Wheat is in a dormant stage right now but the

Recent scientific studies indicate a decline in the occurrence of breast cancer, and screening mammography is a major factor in this decline. The best protection is still early detection.

Munday High School was selected as a recognized campus based on base indicators as well as supplemental indicators. Munday ISD was also selected as a recognized district based on performance on additional indicators.

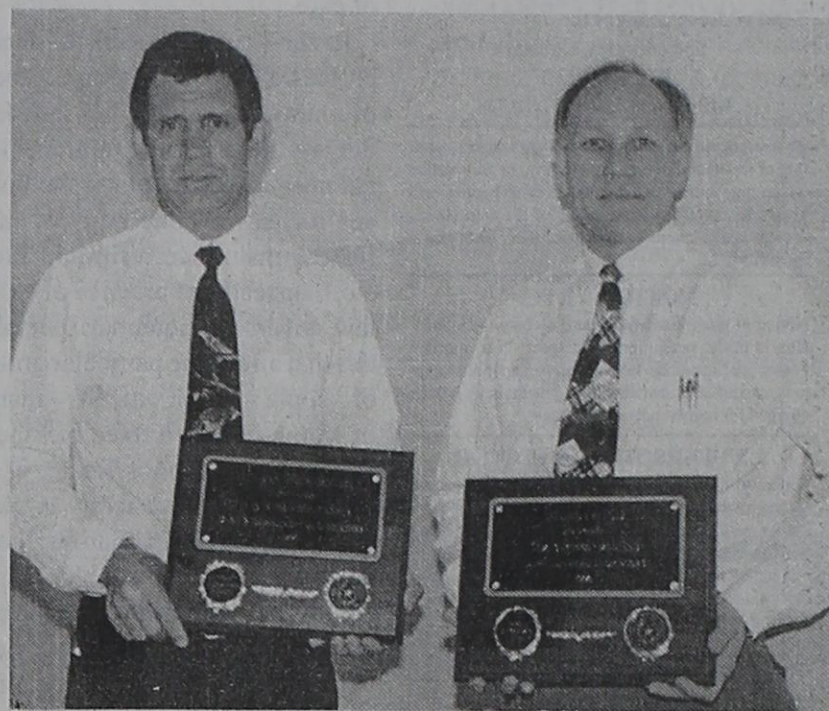

## Knox County Hospital District receives donation from Ladies' Auxiliary

The Knox County Hospital District received a donation from the Ladies' Auxiliary in the amount of \$9,176.26 to purchase a Lifepak 10 defibrillator/monitor for the Knox County EMS. This medical device will be carried on the Knox City EMS to be used to resuscitate patients with ventricular fibrillation, a frequent cause of cardiac arrest.

The Lifepak 10 defibrillator/monitor is a complete cardiac life support system used by paramedics in the field, or other authorized healthcare providers. The device is a recognized means of diagnosing, treating, and terminating potentially fatal cardiac dysrhythmias by applying a brief, high-energy pulse of electricity to the heart. Use of the machine is only under the direction or guidance of a medical doctor.

"We are excited to be able to

JEROME HALL, principal of Munday High School and Superintendent of Schools respectively, are pleased to present the two plaques that the school district and the high school campus received for excellence in attendance, TAAS scores and ACT and SAT scores. This is the 3rd consecutive year that the school district has been distinguished as a "recognized" school.

Munday met the recognized level performance standards for all base indicators and has demonstrated required improvement on the TAAS. The base indicators standards for a recognized campus include at least 70% passing in each subject area on the 1996 TAAS, a

dropout rate of 3.5% or less in 1994-95, and at least 94% attendance in grades 1-12 in 1994-95. In addition to those requirements for each TAAS subject area below 80% passing, Munday met or exceeded the change needed to reach 90% passing within five years.

From Munday High School 88.6% of all students passed reading, 76.9% of all students passed math, and 86.0% passed writing. In addition the 94-95 dropout rate was .5% and the 94-95 attendance rate was 97.4%.

Munday ISD was a recognized district based on performance on additional indicators. At least 55% of graduates must have taken the SAT or ACT and 10% or more must score above the 1000 on the SAT or 24 Composite on the ACT. Munday students had 95.5% taking the test and 13.6% scoring above the criterion.

This is the third consecutive year that Munday ISD has received this recognition.

# Elder Law: A growing field

As your Attorney General, I have been increasingly involved in issues that affect senior Texans: the quality of long-term care, the prosecution of elder abuse, Medicaid fraud control, and consumer fraud that targets elders. I believe we owe our senior citizens respect, protection and the highest standard of care.

In the private sector, the legal profession has seen the emergence of a new specialty: elder law. Elder law differs from traditional legal specialties in which the lawyer focuses on one body of law (taxes, insurance, criminal law, etc.). Instead, the practice of elder law covers all potential specialties that affect one particular group of people - senior citizens - many of whom live on a fixed income.

If you are a senior Texan, or if you are concerned about an elderly friend or family member, perhaps you have considered hiring an attorney. The following information may help you to decide whether an elder law specialist

would be right for you.

Why is this new field growing? In part, the growth mirrors changes in our population. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 33 million Americans are now over age 65, or roughly 13 percent of the nation's population. The fastest growing segment of this group is people over age 85. According to a report by the U.S. senate Committee on Aging, nearly half of all senior citizens will spend time in a nursing home. While many of these stays are brief, such as for recovery after surgery, many others involve long-term residence.

The field of elder law covers a wide and growing range of topics. In addition to their traditional work in probate, wills, and trust and estate planning, elder law specialists are now involved in such diverse areas as: planning for disability or incapacity through living wills, living trusts, and durable power of attorney documents; establishing eligibility for Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid benefits; long-term care, including patients' rights, quality of care, and long-

term care insurance; elder fraud and abuse; grandparents' visitation rights; age discrimination at work; housing problems (mortgages, housing discrimination, etc); conservatorship and guardianships; retirement and pension benefits.

Should you retain an elder law specialist? Begin by asking if you have a problem that requires the services of an attorney, or if in fact you have a social services or medical question. If you are not sure, ask a trusted friend, your clergy, or a social worker for advice. You may also call the Legal Hotline for Older Texans at (800) 622-2520 for a free over-the-phone consultation. Staff at the Legal Hotline can help you decide whether your problem merits retaining the services of an attorney.

Ask for referrals from local senior citizen groups, your clergy, other attorneys, and social service agencies. While the State Bar of Texas does not certify elder law specialists, its lawyer referral service (800 252-9690) will provide you with the names of attorneys in your area for your consideration.

Before retaining an attorney, ask for references, and check them out thoroughly. Ask how much experience the attorneys have, and about the aspects of elder law that they regularly deal with. Ask about the fee you will be charged.

Planning for the future? Senior

citizens share common concerns: quality of life and control over their affairs as they grow older, the threat of serious illness and steep medical bills, maintaining an adequate income, and safe-guarding the interests of loved ones. Unfortunately, most of us cannot know which of these concerns will be the biggest challenge we face in old

age. Many elder law attorneys report that clients come to them during times of crisis. It is wise to plan as far ahead as possible before the need arises.

Special guests, Leta Mangis and Charlene Brothers of the K.C. Circle Club brought reports from the State FCE Convention held in Tyler, Texas.

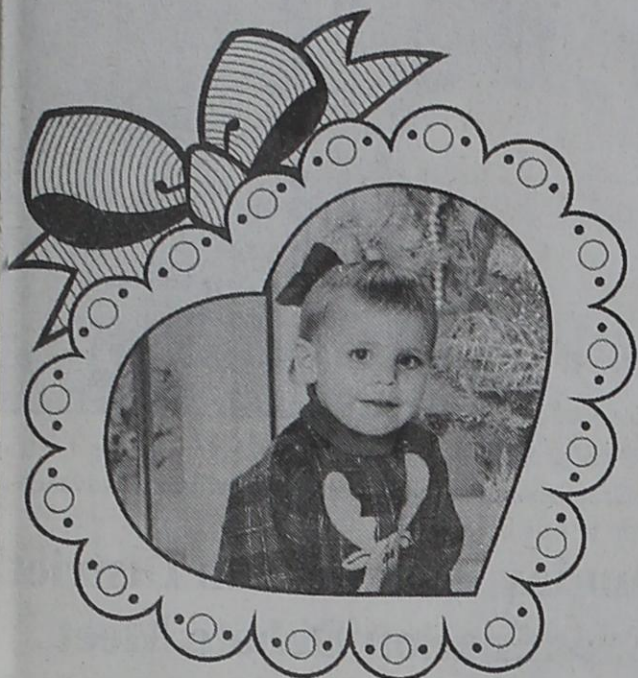
Ms. Brothers presented a most informative report to the group on "Rights to Privacy." Ms. Mangis gave the highlights of a seminar she attended related to "stress."

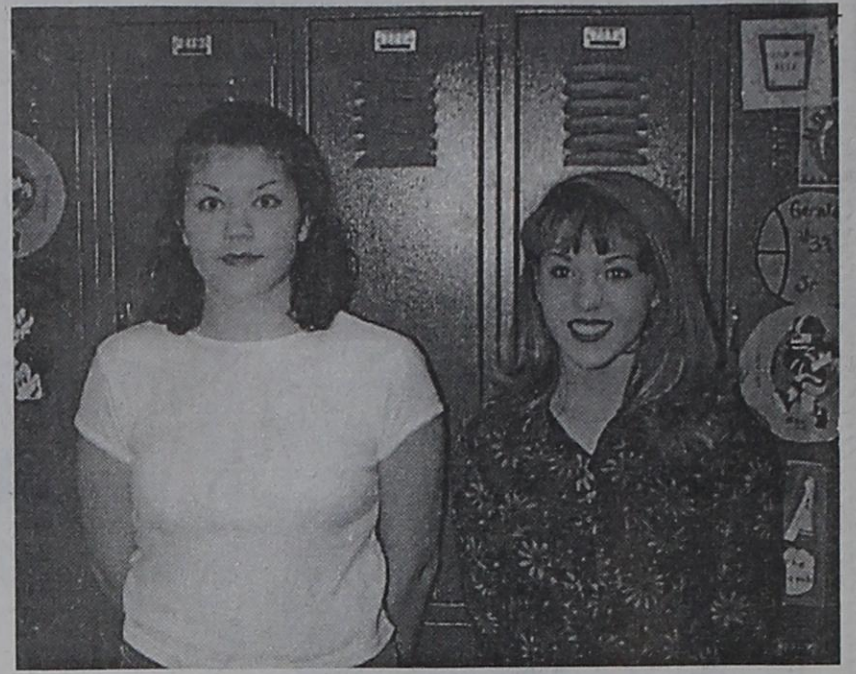

## Two Munday students win District Cross Examination Debate Meet

Munday High School has qualified two students for the 1997 University Interscholastic League State Cross-Examination Meet to be held March 10 - 15 at The University of Texas at Austin.

The students qualified for the state meet by placing at the UIL Cross-Examination District meet. Kandis Longan and Andrea Brown won the team title and Kandis placed first as top speaker at the district cross-examination meet and Andrea was second.

UIL academic contests range from feature writing to accounting, and from computer science to poetry interpretation. Of the 2.2 million students who participated in UIL activities last year, 637,000

Through participation at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. Since its inception in 1954, the TILF has provided \$10.7 million to approximately 9,780 students. This year, the TILF expects to award an estimated 500 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$700,000. These academic scholarships have been funded by grants and donations from foundations and individuals. Each dollar that the TILF receives goes directly for scholarships and no administrative or other overhead expenses are deducted.

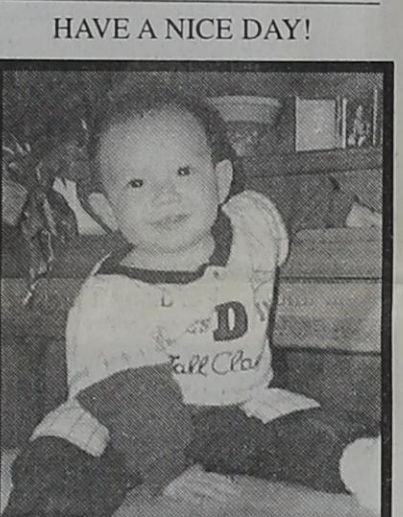

**Most beneficiaries no longer submit annual earnings reports**

Social Security has eliminated the need for most beneficiaries to file an annual report of earnings. Instead, the agency will adjust benefits as required under the Social Security annual earnings limits based on the amount of wages or net earnings from self-employment posted to the worker's Social Security earnings record. The new process begins with reporting year 1996 and could save up to 330,000 public reporting hours. Under the new procedure, beneficiaries will need to file annual reports only when their earnings for purposes of the Social Security earnings test are not the same as the earnings reported on their W-2 and/or self-employment tax return.

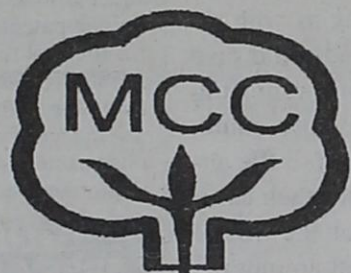
