 Bill Passes HouseAeed of waid thousands of Texans in A passed by he House Tuesday, according to Representative David Counts of Knox City, whoco-sponsored te measof Waco.
House Bill 318 raises the state income cap on Medicaid eligibility from the. present $\$ 715$ per month to the federal maximum of $\$ 1104$ per month. An amendment to the bill applying he same increase to home-based community care services was alsoapproved.
It is estimated that the increase will allow an extra five thousand elderly and disabled Texans meet the eligibility requirements for nursing home services.
