Abraham Lincoln was called "Honest Abe" because, I suppose, of his complete honesty in all situations. George Washington was reported to have been so honest and truthful that when asked, as a little boy, what happened to a particular cherry tree, he replied, "I cannot tell a lie. I chopped it down."

Both these were honest men, of that there is no doubt. But my great-uncle, Garland Thiebaud, was right up there with the most honest of them all. If he had been famous, one could have looked up trustworthy in the dictionary and found his picture. He was honest almost to a fault.

Everybody I've ever known who has worked for an hourly wage in the fields would figure time on a half hour basis. If you worked until 3:20, you'd count it 3:30. If you quit at 3:10, you called your time 3:00. Everybody but Uncle Garland. He figured his time to the minute so that a farmer might wind up owing him \$47.62 for hoeing.

Once a store in Munday ran a special of 12 washcloths for a dollar. Uncle Garland took advantage of the sale, but when he returned to Goree, he had mistakenly picked up 13 washcloths. Now, I'm sure there are many people who would have returned the extra washcloth the next time they were in Munday, but Uncle Garland immediately went to his car and made the twelve mile round trip to return the washcloth.

Uncle Garland had very strong religious convictions. He would play forty-two with Papa Beecher and Daddy and all my uncles until late in the night on Saturday, but he refused to play after midnight marked the Sabbath. Even if he were the fourth man present at one of our Sunday gatherings, he wouldn't play no matter who asked him. He would watch, but he wouldn't play.

He was also proud of the fact that he was a tee-totaler. He refused to touch any kind of alcoholic beverage. One of my dad's favorite stories was of a Sunday when Uncle Garland sat watching a forty-two game and the conversation somehow got around to somebody who was known to drink too much. Uncle Garland made the remark that he wouldn't take a drink of whiskey for a million dollars.

My grandfather looked at him with his jet black eyes.

"Do you mean you wouldn't get falling down drunk for a million dollars or just take one little sip?"

"I wouldn't take one sip of whiskey for a million dollars," he answered.

"You're saying as hard as you work for your money, if a man offered you a million dollars to take one little sip of whiskey, you'd refuse?"

"Yep."

"Think of all the good things you could do for other poor people if you had a million dollars," my granddad said.

"I don't care. I wouldn't do it."

Now, my Papa Beecher was never a drinking man, but to turn down a million dollars for the tiniest little sip of whiskey was almost too extreme.

"Now, Garland," he said, "Here you sit and you won't play dominoes with us, but you're sitting there telling a bald-faced lie right here on Sunday."

Fortunately - perhaps unfortunately - Uncle Garland was never offered a million dollars to "take a sip", so nobody ever knew who was right.

Because he was so good and trustworthy, he was very trusting of other people - which, of course, made him a prime target for my cousin Charles' practical jokes.

Charles always got into more trouble

Band Earns Fourth Sweepstakes

Munday High School band students traveled to Vernon April 19 for the Region II UIL Concert and Sightreading Contest and came away with two first division ratings and Sweepstakes honors for the fourth consecutive year.

Bands receiving the Sweepstakes distinction are awarded first division ratings at marching, concert and sightreading competition. Three judges rate bands in each contest, and at least two of them must consider a group first division for it to receive an overall I rating.

"This is the first year the band has ever received a unanimous sweepstakes," Rodney Bennett, band director commented. "That means we received nine I's during contests - three I's in marching, three I's in sightreading, and three I's in concert."

"In the past, there has usually been a II from at least one contest judge, but not this year. It just doesn't get any better than this," he bragged.

Other Class A bands receiving Sweepstakes honors were Petrolia and Baird. Ratings from other area bands included: Crowell, V concert, V sightreading;

Paducah, I concert, I sightreading; Petrolia, I concert, I sightreading; Throckmorton, II concert, II sightreading; Muenster, III concert; III sightreading; Windthorst, III concert, III sightreading and Knox City, III concert and III sightreading.

Regarding the band's performance in the concert and sightreading contest, Bennett commented, "I was very pleased with the band's performance. It was not perfect, but it was what we needed."

"The band's sightreading was extraordinary. They have always read well and are capable of reading music much more difficult than is expected of a Class A band. This is by far the best playing band I have had since I began teaching," he concluded.

Criticism from the judges was complimentary, especially in sightreading. Nice sound, fine balance, blend and intonation, student attentive to instructor, and good instruction were some of the evaluations made by judges. In the concert segment of the contest, the judge noted good musical concept, excellent

teaching, and a good looking group on stage.

The Purple Cloud will perform the contest show at the annual Musicade to be presented May 9 at the High School Auditorium.

Child Welfare Board Has Special Duties

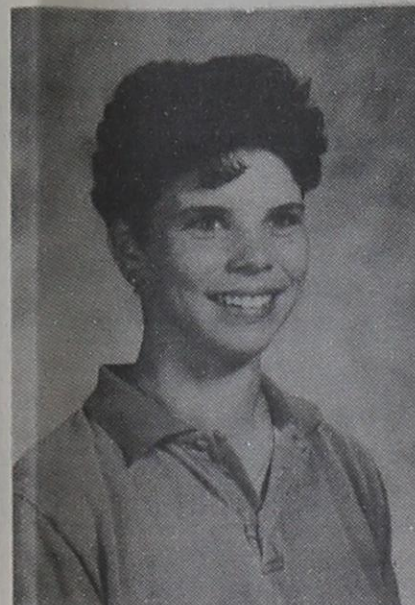
One function of the Knox County Child Welfare Board is to act as a "support" group for the Texas Department of Human Services.

over fireworks than anybody I ever knew. He was never without a firecracker to toss behind us when we were kids and the fascination with fireworks carried over into young adulthood. When Tommy and I married, Charles had a "partner in crime" because Tommy shared his firecracker fascination.

So it was that at the end of one cold Christmas day, the family bade Uncle Garland and his wife, Aunt Ava, goodbye as some of the family members walked out onto the long front porch to wave as they started to leave. Aunt Ava settled herself into the passenger seat as Uncle Garland gave a little wave and climbed in under the wheel. He turned on the ignition and suddenly there was an ear-splitting explosion as smoke poured out from under the car's hood. Both car doors flew open as Uncle Garland and Aunt Ava flung themselves out of the car to make their escape. All the doors on the old homestead flew open as family members rushed out to find the source of the explosion. Two family members knew. A smoke bomb had been planted on the engine of Uncle Garland's car - quite harmless except for the damage to one's heart or nervous system.

When the smoke cleared and Uncle Garland decided that the mafia did not have a contract out on his life, he helped a rather reluctant Aunt Ava back into the car and drove away - perhaps not quite so trusting as when he had arrived.

Uncle Garland died a few years ago - still just as honest as he had always been - and, as far as I know, his lips still untouched by alcoholic beverage.

I don't know if angels in Heaven really have halos, but if they do, I know Uncle Garland has one of the shiniest ones of all.

Nursing Home Bill Passes House

A bill to aid thousands of Texans in need of nursing home services was passed by the House Tuesday, according to Representative David Counts of Knox City, who co-sponsored the measure with Representative Betty Denton of Waco.

House Bill 318 raises the state income cap on Medicaid eligibility from the present \$715 per month to the federal maximum of \$1104 per month.

An amendment to the bill applying the same increase to home-based community care services was also approved.

It is estimated that the increase will allow an extra five thousand elderly and disabled Texans meet the eligibility requirements for nursing home services.

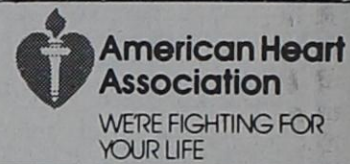
"But how can you know for sure?" the doctor inquires.

DISPOSING OF HOUSEHOLD CLEANING PRODUCTS

Everyone generally knows about careful use and storage of household cleaning products. "Care" is also the key word for proper disposal of containers of such products.

Most unused household products and containers can be disposed of with other household waste without problems. However, two precautions should be taken:

1. Always secure caps on empty containers. This protects children, pets and garbage handlers.

2. Discard containers in an outside garbage can with a secure lid or in a similar place where children and pets cannot easily get to them.

Always read and follow label instructions. Remember that some products require special handling.

Some labels specify rinsing containers before disposing of them. On the other hand, never add water to containers of such products as granular drain cleaners and toilet bowl cleaners.

Always check disinfectants, sanitizers and similar products for special instructions.

Never reuse empty cleaning product containers for other purposes. Label instructions meant for one product may be dangerous to someone who doesn't know the container is being reused.

Don't pour leftover chemicals into a

drain or toilet unless this is intended use. You may damage plumbing or septic tanks or contaminate the water supply.

KNIFE CARE

Never soak knives in hot water - prolonged moisture will eventually warp, roughen and even loosen wood handles. Instead, always wash knives quickly in hot soap or detergent suds and rinse, then wipe them dry at once.

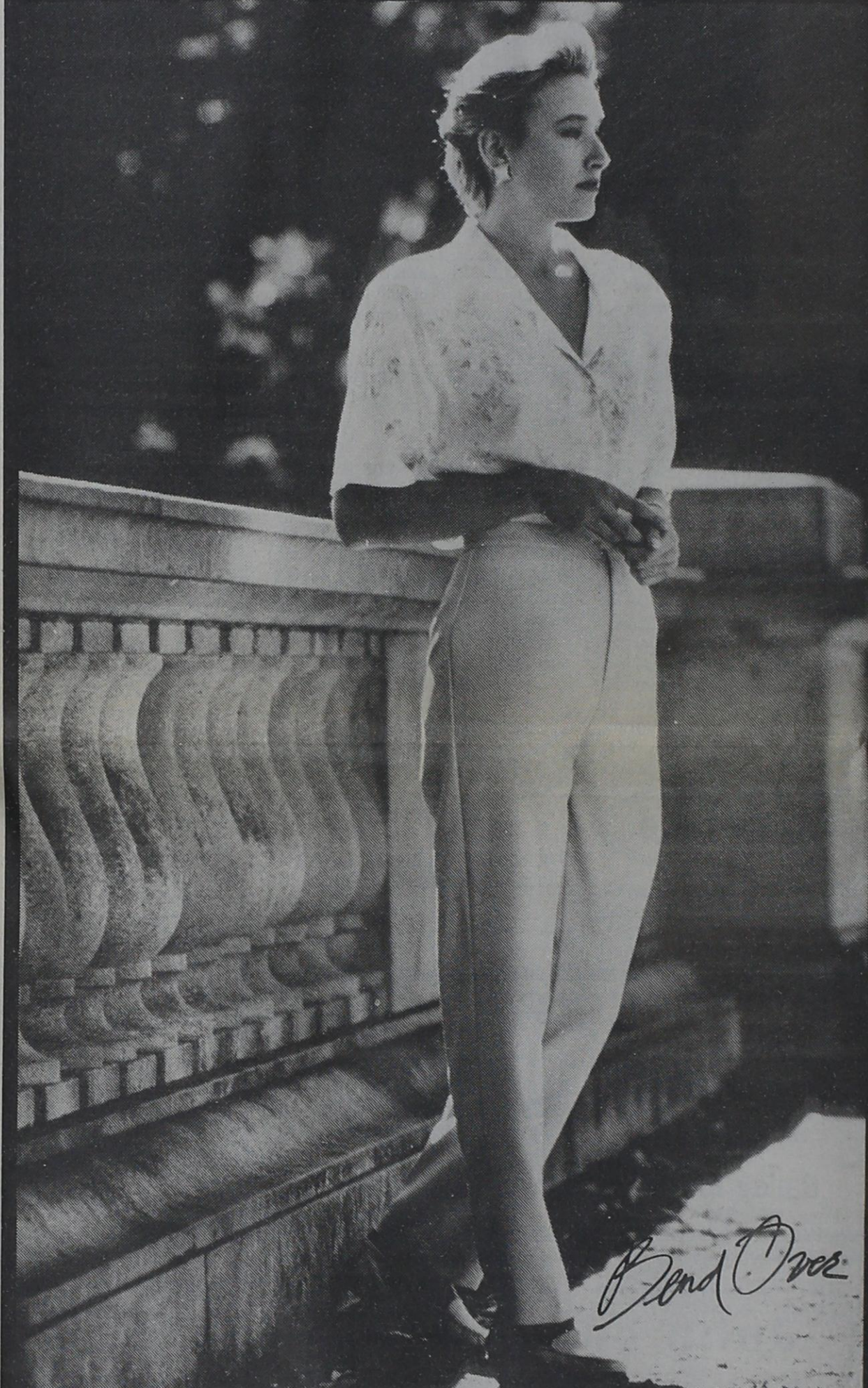
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
