of Academic Skills (TAAS) test. Of 6,152 campuses eligible for consideration statewide, only 391 met the standards for the Significant Gain Award. This award places Munday High School and Munday Elementary School in the

top six percent of Texas schools for performance on last years TAAS tests.

Munday schools will be recognized at the Texas Successful Schools Awards Ceremony at Austin in January

Along with the recognition, the campuses will receive cash awards in the amount determined by the average daily attendance. This preliminary cash award will amount to \$4,190 for Munday Elementary, and \$2,517 for Munday High School.

The cash awards can be used for instructional materials, technology machines and software, professional staff development, incentive programs, or any other purpose which gives priority to academic enhancement. The School Campus Improvement Committee will determine the use of the award. "The credit, of course, for the great improvement must go to the students involved. They are the ones who actually had to perform on the tests. The teachers are also to be highly commended for the direction and encouragement they gave to the students. I really believe that if we have high expectations of our students and give them the training and opportunities to learn, they will perform well. I

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

In, out, in, out. You're doing order to complete the cycle we this right now, even as you read this column. Your brain is controlling the rhythm automatically. You don't even have to think about it. It feels very natural. You're breathing, and you've been doing it almost nonstop since the day the delivery doctor, (or mid-wife) slapped your bare behind at your birth.

It happens all the time, whether you think about or not. It is one of our bodies' most natural activities. We breathe in, taking in fresh air laden with oxygen, and we breathe out carbon dioxide and moisture. This continuing process keeps us alive. We can control the process consciously if we try. Take a big deep breath and hold it, don't let it out. What happens? If you hold it too long, you'll pass out! Now try the other way, breathing Birthdays and Anniversaries out long and slow. Resist the urge to breathe back in. What happens? Just as when you hold it in too long, you're headed for "faint city". In breathing, we need both sides of the equation. We need to breathe in and we need to breathe out so that we can breathe in again and so repeat the cycle.

> So why, you may ask, are we getting an elementary lesson on respiration? This is supposed to be a pastor's column right? Well, here's the point. As followers of Jesus we need to sustain our spiritual lives as well as our physical Dallas hospital. lives. We do this by "breathing in" scripture, prayer and devotion, fellowship, and God's grace. But that is only half the process. In

must "exhale" also. We "exhale" acts of mercy, justice, and compassion. We "exhale" the "Breath of God" when we are witness to what the Spirit is accomplishing in our lives. If we only take in, it's like holding our breath! Our spiritual lives become stale and dry just like the air in our lungs when we hold it in. Likewise, if we only breathe out, through acts of service and witness, we exhaust our supply of spiritual resources and "pass out". (i.e. drop-out, burnout, etc.) It's important to your spiritual health to do both, and to get into a natural rhythm of "in" and "out".

Re-evaluate your own life. Does your relationship with Christ seem stale to you? Try freshening it up through intentional acts of service and witness! Are you spiritually exhausted? Dive into the Word, or take a little personal retreat with your God to replenish your spirit. You need both to continue to grow and serve.

Following Jesus Christ requires great cost. There are three reactions to this fact.

Some say "I won't pay that cost." The rich young ruler in the Bible thought he could live religiously without sacrifice. His thinking was wrong. He went away from Jesus very sad because he refused to pay the cost. Today there are many,



many people who refuse to pay the cost of being a true follower of Jesus. Many will be religious, few will sacrifice. There is a great difference between religion and trimmings, potatoes, fruit, milk

Others say "We paid the price, and look what happened." Then they begin to explain their sufferings and complain that Jesus failed them because He didn't bless them a hundred times over because of some sacrifice they made for Him. If our sacrifice only holds during the good times, we have never sacrificed.

Still, a few say "I'm willing to pay the price." These are the ones that leave many of their comforts behind in order to serve Christ.

What is it that keeps you from being in this third group of commited followers? Many times it is the little things that keep getting us down. Missionaries seldom get trampled by elephants -- it's the gnats that get to them. What small thing is keeping you from being willing to pay the price?

Youth wishing to show broilers must order them by October 15. All other animal projects have a November deadline. Swine, sheep, cattle and breeding rabbits must be owned by November 15 and market rabbits owned by November 29.

All market steers, swine and sheep must be properly validated. This can be done by contacting



your supervisor (Ag. Science Teacher or County Extension Agent). They will ear tag these animals and record the exhibitors name and breed classification of the animal.

4-H members are requested to contact Paul Weiser in the Knox County Extension office as quickly as possible if they plan to show under 4-H. The November 15 ownership deadline is only one month away.

All 4-H'ers interested in competing at the Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston or San Angelo stock shows will need to complete the entry forms by the Thanksgiving Holiday.
