Munday Schools receive Significant Gain Award

The Texas Education Agency has informed Munday Independent School District that they would be receiving two awards for student gain in performance on the 1993-94 Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test.

Of 6,152 campuses eligible for consideration statewide, only 391 met the standards for the Significant Gain Award. This award places Munday High School and Munday Elementary School in the top six percent of Texas schools for performance on last year's TAAS tests.

Munday schools will be recognized at the Texas Successful Schools Awards Ceremony at Austin in January.

Along with the recognition, the campuses will receive cash awards in the amount determined by the average daily attendance. This preliminary cash award will amount to \$4,190 for Munday Elementary, and \$2,517 for Munday High School.

The cash awards can be used for instructional materials, technology machines and software, professional staff development, incentive programs, or any other purpose which gives priority to academic enhancement. The School Campus Improvement Committee will determine the use of the award.

"The credit, of course, for the great improvement must go to the students involved. They are the ones who actually had to perform on the tests. The teachers are also to be highly commended for the direction and encouragement they gave to the students. I really believe that if we have high expectations of our students and give them the training and opportunities to learn, they will perform well. I

want to publicly thank the students and the entire staff for a job well done," stated Doug Donoho, Munday Elementary School principal.

Munday High School also received non-monetary exemplary acknowledgment for academic performance on the supplemental college admission testing SAT and/or ACT indicator. Munday

High School was one of 396 schools to meet the standards for the acknowledgment out of 1,139 eligible.

"It was due to the hard work and dedication of our teachers and the students to make these recognitions possible. It's nice to see that somebody recognizes them for their hard work," said MHS Principal Phil Hall.

Moguls lose by a foot; drop first district game

The Munday Moguls were upset last Friday night by the Paducah Dragons 15 to 13. The Dragons kicked a 39 yard field goal with 51 seconds left in the game to give the Moguls a fourth winless game by 3 points or less.

The Mogul offense couldn't get the ball moving without a turnover, while losing four fumbles and one interception to Paducah.

While the Mogul rushing defense held their opponent to only 6 yards rushing, it wasn't enough. The Dragons gained 142 yards in the air on only 5 passes out of 8. Those five completions accounted for the 2 touchdown passes and a set up for the field goal.

The first quarter was scoreless with both defenses being stubborn and offenses stumbling. Nathan Kuehler sacked the Paducah quarterback for 12 yard loss in the first and Gerald Taylor recovering a Dragon fumble.

The second began great for the Moguls with Jeff Cook sacking the Paducah QB for a 16 yard loss forcing them to punt. Munday took a 7 play drive to the Dragon 38 before turning the ball over on downs.

Paducah didn't have the ball long after getting sacked for a 7 yard loss by Nathan Kuehler assisted by Chris Torres and Gerald Taylor. The Mogul defense caused a fumble on third and 17 and Bronco Flye picked the ball up at the 24 and rushed in for a Munday touchdown. Peewee Reagins kicked the PAT to put the Moguls on top 7 to 0.

A punt by the Dragons on their next possession gave Munday the ball at their own 25. The Moguls couldn't hold on to the ball for more than two plays. A fumble was recovered at the 38 by Paducah.

After runs and two penalties against Munday, the Dragons were at the 23. QB Andie Cruz hit Stewart Richards for a 23 yard touchdown pass with 2:39 left in the half. The extra point would even the score at 7 but Jason Hise plunged through the line to block the PAT to keep a one point advantage.

The third quarter began with the Moguls starting a drive from their own 46. Munday moved the ball across mid field to the Dragon 34, but the drive quickly stopped with another fumble recovered by Paducah at the 31.

Paducah couldn't move the ball and were forced to punt. Gerald Taylor wasn't going to wait for the punt. Taylor blocked the kick and Jeff Cook recovered about the 8 yard line and ran in for the touchdown. The PAT was no good and the Moguls were ahead 13 to 6.

Paducah's next possession was stopped after three plays at their own 44 and they were forced to punt again. This time Peewee Reagins wasn't going to wait. Reagins blocked the punt and Jeff Cook recovered for Munday and moved the ball to the 27 before being tackled.

The Moguls could not take advantage of the blocked punt. After four plays Munday was 1 yard short of a first and the Dragons took the ball at their own 18.

Paducah made a first out to their own 33. QB Andie Cruz then aired out a 67 yard pass to Glendale Hurd for a touchdown pulling them within one point of the Moguls. A two point conversion failed on an incomplete pass.

The Dragons quickly gained 32 yards on a pass to the Mogul 28. Three plays later Paducah was four yards short of a first. The coach called for the field goal unit and Clearance Thomas split the uprights with 51 seconds left to put the Dragons over the top 15 to Munday's 13.

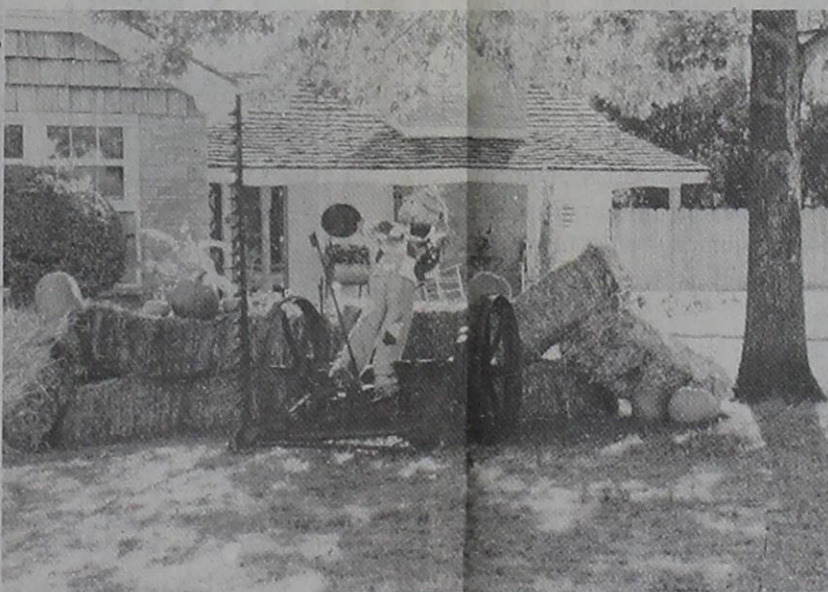

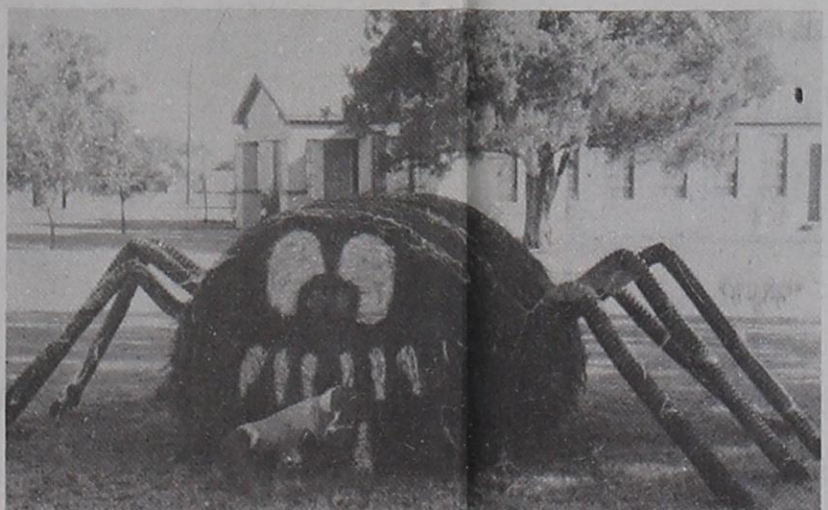

In, out, in, out. You're doing
this right now, even as you read
this column. Your brain is con-
trolling the rhythm automatically.
You don't even have to think about
it. It feels very natural. You're
breathing, and you've been doing
it almost nonstop since the day the
delivery doctor, (or mid-wife)
slapped your bare behind at your
birth.

It happens all the time, whether
you think about or not. It is one of
our bodies' most natural activi-
ties. We breathe in, taking in fresh
air laden with oxygen, and we
breathe out carbon dioxide and
moisture. This continuing process
keeps us alive. We can control the
process consciously if we try. Take
a big deep breath and hold it, don't
let it out. What happens? If you
hold it too long, you'll pass out!
Now try the other way, breathing
out long and slow. Resist the urge
to breathe back in. What happens?
Just as when you hold it in too
long, you're headed for "faint city".
In breathing, we need both sides
of the equation. We need to breathe
in and we need to breathe out so
that we can breathe in again and so
repeat the cycle.

So why, you may ask, are we
getting an elementary lesson on
respiration? This is supposed to
be a pastor's column right? Well,
here's the point. As followers of
Jesus we need to sustain our spiri-
tual lives as well as our physical
lives. We do this by "breathing in"
scripture, prayer and devotion,
fellowship, and God's grace. But
that is only half the process. In

order to complete the cycle we
must "exhale" also. We "exhale"
acts of mercy, justice, and com-
passion. We "exhale" the "Breath
of God" when we are witness to
what the Spirit is accomplishing
in our lives. If we only take in, it's
like holding our breath! Our spiri-
tual lives become stale and dry
just like the air in our lungs when
we hold it in. Likewise, if we only
breathe out, through acts of ser-
vice and witness, we exhaust our
supply of spiritual resources and
"pass out". (i.e. drop-out, bum-
out, etc.) It's important to your
spiritual health to do both, and to
get into a natural rhythm of "in"
and "out".

Re-evaluate your own life. Does
your relationship with Christ seem
stale to you? Try freshening it up
through intentional acts of service
and witness! Are you spiritually
exhausted? Dive into the Word, or
take a little personal retreat with
your God to replenish your spirit.
You need both to continue to grow
and serve.

**Windbreak trees protect
animals, crops and soil**

Windbreaks provide protection
for people, animals, buildings,
crops, and natural resources. They
reduce soil erosion by wind and
contribute to the control of runoff
from agricultural lands.

Trees and shrubs planted as
windbreaks provide wind erosion
control, improve crop yields, and
enhance the quality of many wind
sensitive crops. Farmstead wind-
breaks protect the home site and
reduce energy consumption.

Windbreaks can reduce stress
on livestock, improve weight gain,
and reduce mortality of young
animals. Finally, windbreaks add
beauty to the landscape and in-
crease the value of the land.

Recently we were reminded how
harsh the wind can be in Knox

County. Windbreaks can reduce
damage caused by strong winds.

Windbreak trees may be pur-
chased now until February 9, 1995,
through the Wichita-Brazos Soil
and Water Conservation District.
Several species of evergreens and
hardwoods are available along
with wildlife packets to promote
deer, quail and pheasant, turkey,
or squirrel.

Potted evergreen trees, hard-
wood trees and wildlife packets
are now available, and will be
delivered February 16. Prices for
the trees can be found in a display
ad elsewhere in the *Courier*. For

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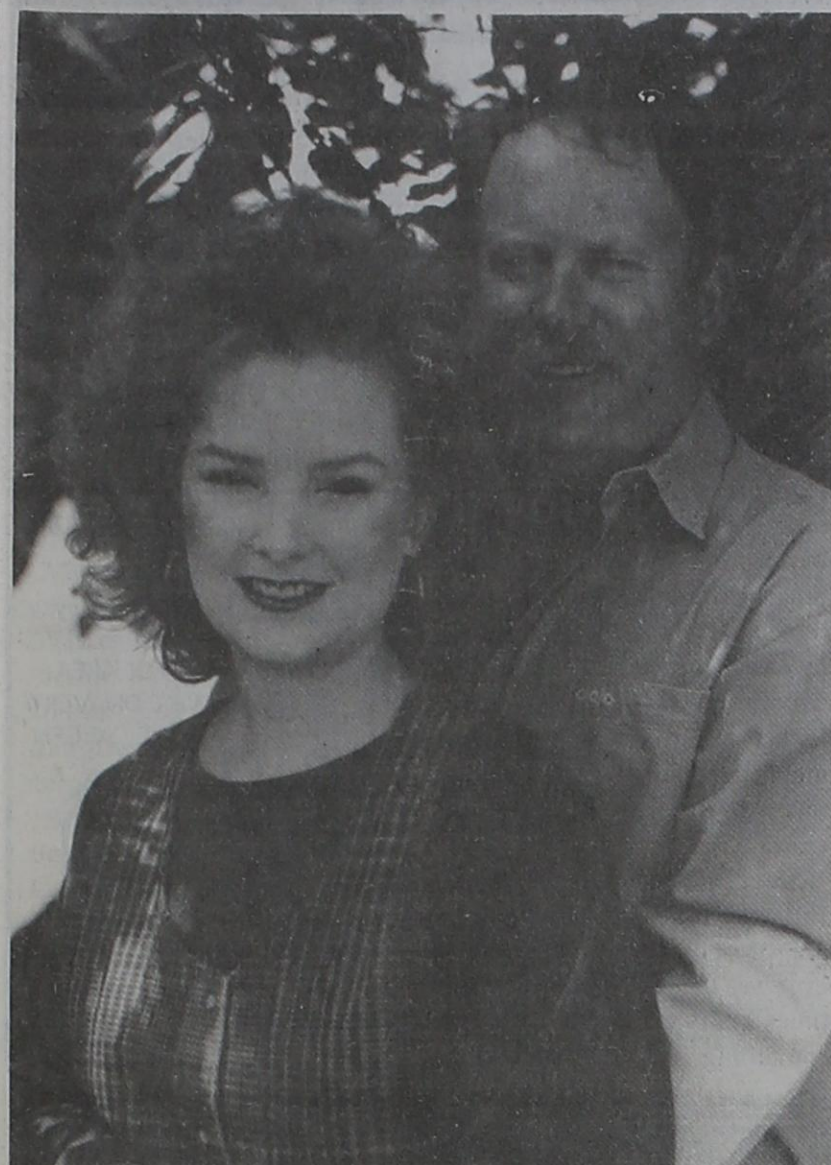

Ave. D, West Ave. F, North 10th and North 12th avenues, the speed limit is 20 m.p.h., 5 m.p.h. in parking lots.

2) **STOP SIGNS:** Definition of stop or stopping - complete cessation from movement. Two stop signs badly ignored, Intersections: Main and S. 9th, Main and S. 10th.

3) **HEADLIGHTS:** The law book reads - Lights must be on half hour after sunset to a half hour before sunrise and at any other time when, due to insufficient light (cloudy) or unfavorable atmospheric conditions (rain) visibility decreased.

When it comes down to the wire, it is truly an amazing thing to know that Jesus loves me. In spite of it all, Jesus loves me.

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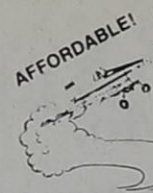
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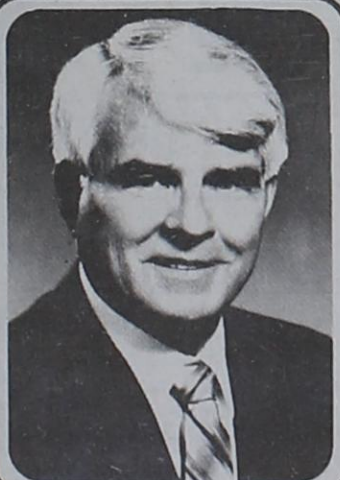

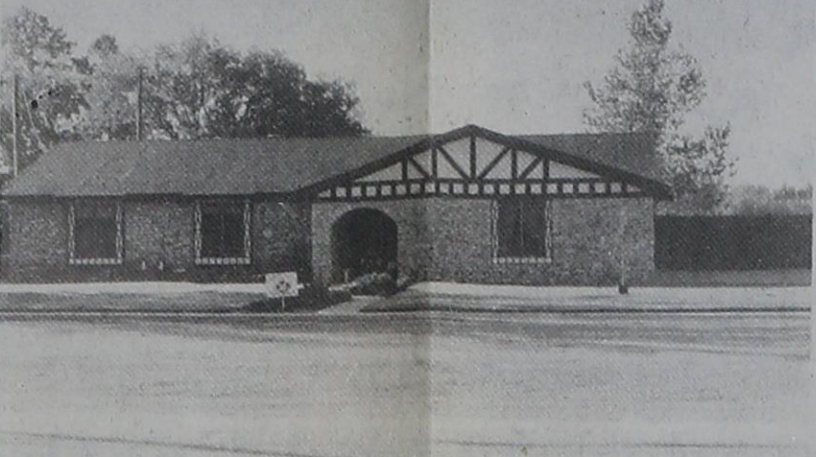

The Knox County Junior Livestock Show is just three months away. The show will be held January 13-14 in Munday.

The Knox County Junior Livestock Show Board met on Monday, September 26 to elect officers and revise the rules. The 1995 officers are: Jack Whitten, Chairman; Poncho Morrow, Vice-Chairman; Dale Bloxham, Secretary; Pam Reed, Treasurer.

All youth interested in showing at this upcoming show will need to contact their Ag. Science Teacher or the Knox County Extension Service for an updated copy of the rule book. Youth wishing to show broilers must order them by October 15. All other animal projects have a November deadline. Swine, sheep, cattle and breeding rabbits must be owned by November 15 and market rabbits owned by November 29.

All market steers, swine and sheep must be properly validated. This can be done by contacting

your supervisor (Ag. Science Teacher or County Extension Agent). They will ear tag these animals and record the exhibitors name and breed classification of the animal.

4-H members are requested to contact Paul Weiser in the Knox County Extension office as quickly as possible if they plan to show under 4-H. The November 15 ownership deadline is only one month away.

All 4-H'ers interested in competing at the Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston or San Angelo stock shows will need to complete the entry forms by the Thanksgiving Holiday. The entry cards are not in the office but will be arriving soon. Notify Paul Weiser if interested in these shows so the proper number of entry cards can be ordered.

Dates for these major shows are: Fort Worth - Jan. 20 - Feb. 5 (Jr. market show is Jan. 31 - Feb. 4); San Antonio - Feb. 4-19 (Jr. market show Feb. 13-18); Houston - Feb. 17 - March 5 (Jr. market show Feb. 23 - March 4); and San Angelo - March 4-12.
