



As compared with the usual conditions of mixed variety production, each individual farmer of a one variety community is able to raise more cotton and a better quality which can be sold at a higher price. Manufactur ers are willing to pay more for dependable supplies of uniform fiber, because the spinning and weaving are less expensive and the resulting fabrices are bet-

The necessity for one variety communities has been emphasized by the hap-hazard cotton production system which has brought the market to its present non-profit status.

Statistics reveal that Texas cotton yielded 131 pounds per acre during the past eight years in Texas. This is 33 pounds less than the preceding eight years and 21 pounds less than the average for all cotton states. As the yield has been receding, the acreage has advanced, thus increasing labor and expense of production The value of Texas cotton per acre has averaged the lowest of all states over a period of seventeen years according to the U. S.
