Guilty pleas accepted at District Court; Indictments returned
handed down and seven were handed down and seven other guilty pleas were accepted in the SOth Judicial District Court action last week, according to Distric Attorney Bill Neal.
Also four additional indictments County Grand Jury, meeting Tues County Grand Jury, meeting Tues Further, assets used in crim. Further, assets used in crimina enterprises and seized by local law enforcement officers and forfeited by the State last week amounted to $\$ 6,021.96$, and fines assessed in criminal cases in the District Court totalled $\$ 4,500.00$, while restitution to parties damaged by criminal acts in District Court cases to-

Jerome Hall called the Spring and $94 \%$ passed writing. The state 1997 TAAS scores "really good." Hall presented the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills scores to
the public by explaining "Or the public by explaining "Our fourth grade scores were not as good as we had hoped but we were
pleased with the school district pleased with the schoo
over-all performance."
TAAS is a standardized test designed to asses̀s reading, math and writing abilities of students at various levels. Science and social studies are also tested on the eighth grade level.
Tenth graders are required to pass TAAS exit level tests and in April thirty-one students in Munday participated. $65 \%$ of those students met the minimum expectations on all the tests. $90 \%$

In Munday $82 \%$ passed the reading exam, $86 \%$ passed the math exam and $75 \%$ passed the writing test. The state average for these tests on the eighth grade level is $83 \%$ in reading, $76 \%$ in math and $80 \%$ in writing.
89\% of Munday seventh graders passed the reading test, $81 \%$ passed the math test and $78 \%$ passed in writing. The state averfor for reading is $87 \%$ and $79 \%$ or math.

Noncitizens receiving SSI have 90 days to prove eligibility
Noncitizens will have up to 90
days from the date they receive a notice to submit proof of U.S. citizenship or eligible alien status to continue receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. Social Security recently notified more than 895,000 individuals whose records do not show that they meet the new SSI immigran citizenship or eligible alien status requirements established by recen welfare reform legislation. To ge SSI, individuals must be either U.S. citizen or nation, or a legal alien in certain categories.
If you receive a notice and are U.S. citizen, you need to let us know. You will need to bring us evidence of citizenship, such as certificate of naturalization or your U.S. passport. (An Immigration and Naturalization Service factsheet which explains how to become a U.S. citizen accomp nied the notice.)
If you meet one of the eligible alien categories, you should bring us an unexpired Immigration and Naturalization Service document listed in the notice. You will need to bring us the original document to establish your eligibility Socia Security does not accept copies of documents.
People who submit proof of eligibility on time will receive a notice informing them of the eligibility category they meet, and the proof we used to make our decision. If you do not contact Social Security or submit proof of your eligibility, you will receive a second notice informing you that we plan to stop your SSI payment in August or September. The notices will explain your appeal rights and what you should do if you become a citizen or your alien status changes and you think you are eligible for SSI.

The largest share of state fund ing for FY $98-99$ will be in the areas f education, which will total more than $\$ 37$ billion. Funding for public education will total more than $\$ 25$ billion for the biennium, an increase of $\$ 1.5$ billion ove current two-year funding. Funding or higher education will total nearly $\$ 12$ billion.
The state's health and human service programs will receive more than $\$ 26$ billion in the bien nium.
HB 1 provides funding for 223,000 full-time equivalent state employees in 1998 and for 22,800 in 1999. This represents a reduction of 4,350 FTEs from the authorized funding levels for the cur rent state operating year.

According to Congress, Ameri cans lose an estimated $\$ 40$ billion each year due to the fraudulent sales of goods and services over the telephone. With an estimated 14,000 fraudulent telemarketing firms in the country one can understand why. In a study conducted by the American Association of Retired Persons fifty-six percent of the names on "Mooch lists" (the name telemarketers call their list of most likely victims) were aged 50 o older. finding way to balance the federal budget, tax relief is high on readers' minds
as well. The possible cuts outlined were estate tax relief, child tax credit, capital
gains tax cut, education tax cut and individual retirement accounts. Then, asked you to tell me which cuts were most important to you.
I received a number of interesting comments that I will share later in this column, but first a brief review of your priorities.
The clear favorite as the most important tax cut for you and your family is estate tax relief. Thirty-four percent of those who responded said an estate
tax cut is the most important; 16 percent of you reported it as the second mos important priority. Overall, 66 percent of you ranked estate tax relief as one of
your top three tax relief measures. A capital gains tax cut ranked second in popularity. Twenty-six percent of
you listed a cut in the capital gains tax as the most important kind of relief for you; 32 percent listed it as the second most important tax relief measure.

listed the IRA changes as one of your top three tax-relief priorities. relief provision: about 13 percent said it it the second most important item.
Finally, 9 percent of you responded that the education tax cut is the mos important tax cut for you; almost 29 percent said it is the second most important
cut. Responding to the questions about estate taxes, one person wrote, "There
really should not be any estate taxes. Taxes already have been paid once in accumulating the estate." Another observed, "If a person works hard enough
to save and make a future for their family, they should be able to share it with their family. Under the current system, there is no incentive to work and sav Another woman summed up her life of paying taxes: "We pay taxes each
year on what we make. Then we invest anything left over and pay taxes on our investments. Then (our family) has to pay the estate tax."
The second most topular tax-cut proposal was capital gains tax cuts. A
family wrote "Capital gains should take inflation into consideration. After family wrote, "Capital gains should tare inflation into consideration. After
holding something for a good many years, your 'gains' actually are losses." One respondent observed, "Enough of compromise. There should be a 40
percent to 50 percent reduction in the capital gains tax - for all capital gains not just the sale of a home.
A couple replied, "The capital gains tax takes all incentive out of doin
business. If people don't invest there will be bo job opportunities, the economy business. If people don t invest, there will be no job opportunities, the economy
would slow and there would de much less taxes paid. As long as investors can
make a liute, they have an incentive to make a little, they have an incentive to invest for everyone's future."
About phasing out limits on IRAs, one person wrote, "This suggestio sounds good in that you could pay taxes on what you contribute up front, but
be allowed tax-free withdrawals. Quite often today, what older folks thought would be enough to live on turns out not to go far enough."
"It is important to encourage people to save and accumulate funds," "It is important to encourage people to save and accumulate funds,"
another responded. "Right now, you pay taxes on your income, and then ge
taxed on what you set aside. You Another wrote, "Taxes should be structured so people make their ow
decisions and are responsible for their own futures. It is a disgrace tha government punishes people for saving and being thrifty".
Fourth on your list was the child tax credit. Although this was a popula proposal, many of those who wrote to comment on it did so in the negative. On
family wrote, "The child tax credit leaves people with adult children no cred for having raised them." "Two wage-earner families need help now."
But others observed, "T Finally, on the issue of education tax credits, we received a letter that lays
out the situation elquenty: "Every dollar we save is taxed. My son starts college in the fall but we are
not eligible for funds because we work and we save. We face huge loans and debt for many years to come." "We are not asking for a handout. We would like a little justice, though Stop punishing those who work, save and play by the rules. An education tax
credit would level the playing field." Another reader wrote, "Without education, opportunity evaporates."

Russell plead guilty to he allegation, and Judge Hajek sentenced him to a four-year term. Carlos Santisteven, 21, of Munday, lead guilty to a charge of Posses ion of a Prohibited Weapon and was assessed a three-year probated sentence, but ordered to pay a $\$ 2,500.00$ fine and court costs.
