One of life's most devastating
emotions--perhaps ranked second to
extreme grief--is fear. We are all, at
one time or another, afraid of something. But until we have experienced
the possibility of a violent or lifethreatening situation toward us or
one of our loved ones, we haven't
really known fear.

Every woman fears having car trouble on the road alone, especially at night, or walking across an empty city parking lot long after dark. I hate getting into an elevator alone and if ever I am held at gun or knife point, the assailant might just as well use it, because I'll be just as dead.

Everybody has a scary story. That's what makes sitting outside after dark or around a table with friends so much fun. Of course, it's fun to tell a soary story after the fact—to describe the situation, probably embellish it just a little—sometimes maybe, a lot.

"I'll tell you what happened to me one time," somebody will begin and everybody kind of settles in, watching the storyteller intently as he describes his most frightening experi-

But there's nothing fun or exciting about the actual experience of fear. There's nothing pleasant about that rush of adrenalin that makes your mouth bone dry and your heart start to pound so that you can hear it.

"I've got a gun," I've heard people say, "and I'm not afraid of anybody." But having a gun sometimes only

When Tommy and I lived in Fort Worth, the only place that would fit our very skimpy budget was a furnished apartment that happened to be located behind a seedy-looking bar. Nobody ever bothered us, but I was afraid when Tommy would be late coming home from work, so Daddy gave me a little 22 pistol. It just about fits in the palm of my hand and holds seven rounds of ammunition. It gave me a certain sense of security, but I almost made the worst mistake of my life with it.

When our first two were babies, Tommy worked at the cotton gin every fall to make money for Christmas. He worked at both the Goree and Hefner gins, but that particular fall, he was working at Hefner. He didn't get home until long after midnight and we lived miles away from any neighbor. We didn't have a phone and he took our only old car to work every day, so from early in the morning until I saw the car lights on the window each night, I was totally stranded and when darkness began to fall, I was usually terrified.

One bitterly cold night, the wind was howling around our old farm-house, rattling the piece of loose tin on the roof of the little "lean-to" room where we slept in the winter. The branches of the old paradise tree outside the window kept up a steady, ghostly rhythm as they scratched against the pane, sometimes quietly, and then growing in intensity as the wind increased.

I put my babies to bed and lay down to read a bedtime story. I had fallen asleep when I heard the sound of a car pull into the yard. Instantly awake, I ran into the kitchen and looked at the clock above the refrigerator. It was after ten, too early for Tommy and too late for visitors.

Peeking out, I saw a red car I didn't recognize just as somebody stepped up onto the front porch and started to knock. I didn't answer the knock, but pressed against the wall silently, hoping one of the babies didn't call out.

appearance of smoke from the top of the buildings, an explosion from inside sent bricks and other debris shooting into the air as the gas tank on a truck parked in a building owned by Dale Redding apparently ignited.

According to Kent Trainham, who first noticed the smoke through the window of his grocery store, there appeared to be a grass fire at the back of the buildings. He ran across the steet to investigate and realized the smoke was coming from inside. Eye witnesses reported that within moments of the first signs of smoke, "a ball of fire just came shooting out of the top of the building".

Fire units from Munday and Seymour were dispatched to assist the Goree Fire Department as firemen struggled to contain the blaze that threatened to spread to the homes

within the neighborhood.

The buildings were owned by Dale Redding, Goree School, A & E Well Service, and T. J. Trainham. Trainham had until recently operated a laundromat in one of the buildings.

Another fire, which apparently started from a water heater in the kitchen of the Mike Hernandez home Tuesday morning, gutted the interior of the residence and caused ex-

Fire fighting units were again dispatched from Munday as Goree firemen fought to save the wooden structure and keep the fire from spreading in the dry grass around the area.

Lena Hernandez and the couple's children had left the house shortly before the water heater exploded.

No injuries were sustained in either fire and monetary damages were still unassessed at press time.

Additional Sales Tax Effective July 1

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reminds everyone who collects or pays sales tax that beginning July 1, there will be an additional quarter percent sales tax collected on all taxable purchases.

"This change means we'll all be paying a little bit more to help fund education and human services in Texas," Bullock said.

The new rate of 6 1/4 percent was approved by the Texas Legislature after a fouth special session on the issue ended in early June. This increase brings the sales tax rate in Knox County, including Munday, Knox City, Goree and Benjamin to 7 1/4 percent, of which 1 percent is city sales tax. Maximum Texas sales tax rate is 8 1/4 percent.

Bullock's office estimates that a family of four making \$35,000 per year will pay an additional \$24.65 a year in the state sales tax.

peeked out again, I couldn't see him returning to his car in the light from the front porch. Frantically, I dashed into the front bedroom just in time to see his hat over the "cottage curtains". There was no light on the back porch, and a curtain covered the glass pane in the door, so I couldn't see out and I hoped he couldn't see me as I ran across the kitchen in a crouched position and took my pistol from high on the kitchen shelf.

By this time, he was knocking louder on the back door and in my panic-stricken state, I imagined he was pounding or even kicking the rickety old screen door. I opened my box of shells, dropping them--watching them roll noisily across the floor.

"Who is it?" I shouted, not realizing in my fear that he could not hear me over the howling wind.

With trembling fingers, I managed to shove seven shells into the chamber and snap it closed.

"Who is it?" I shouted again, pointing the gun toward the glass pane in the door. There was still no response and the knocking continued.

"Tell me who you are!" I cocked the pistol, but God was watching out for both of us that night, because the knocking suddenly stopped.

I ran back to the front, crouching below the curtains, and peeked out as the man's hat went back by the windows and disappeared behind the lilac bushes. In a moment, I heard his car start and I watched as he backed out and drove away down the road.

A flood of relief washed over me, but it was only momentary as I considered the possibility of his returning when he thought I might be asleep. In my youth and excitement, it didn't occur to me that if he had really wanted in, the rickety old doors and insecure chain locks couldn't have kept him out for long. I positioned a kitchen chair so I could see both doors and sat waiting with the loaded pistol in my lap.

The wind increased and thunder began to rumble somewhere in the distance as the minutes crawled past midnight. At a little past one, I heard the far away, unmistakable sound of our old car.

By the time Tommy had stopped, I had unlocked the door and was running, sobbing hysterically, to meet him. He quickly took the pistol out of my hand and led me back to the house as I calmed down enough to tell him about the man who had tried to get into the house.

Tommy sat down at the table and began to empty the pistol as I described how I had almost fired through the pane in the door. Suddenly his face paled.

"Do you know," he said, quietly, "that you almost shot Mr. Coffman?" I stared at him in disbelief, knowing my own face was as ashen as his.



Many things that happen to cause us fear are usually just circumstantial or practical jokes. The worst endresult of fear is the trouble we bring on ourselves because of it. And weapons in the hands of untrained persons can be tragic.

We all have memories of sitting in the yard after dark, listening to the grown-ups tell their scary stories of uncanny experiences, prowlers in the chicken house or footsteps somewhere in the house late at night. Even as a child we knew the story of the white horse that appeared in a ghostly light, crossing the road on the nights when the moon was full was just a story, but it was scary, shivery fun to

Some people have a real knack for the telling, voices lowered at just the right places, long pauses as the listeners paint mental images. It's interesting past time on a cold winter night, a good way to establish comraderie. But scary incidents are not fun to experience, there're only fun to tell. Many years later.


The Lord's Corner

Firebreaks, A Defense Against Wildfires

With the abundance of grass, coupled with the extremely hot weather that has occurred during June, ranchers should seriously consider installing permanent firebreaks on rangeland according to Gary Conner, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

"Firebreaks are the simplest and cheapest means of fire protection you can provide on your rangeland," said Conner. "They serve several important functions. They divide the range into compartments, containing a fire

to a smaller area and providing less fuel for it."

L. D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District stated that access is important in fighting grass fires. Fires which burn many acres do so because firefighters cannot get through the pastures to the front of the fire.

"Firebreaks and firelanes can provide ready access for firefighters to get around the fire," Offutt added.

Speed is also important. Plowing firelines through the pasture during a fire is slow and dangerous. Firelanes can help. The sooner fighters can safely get in front of a wildfire, the better the chances of preventing a small fire from becoming a raging monster.

Firebreaks should be planted with suitable grasses, legumes, or other plants and must be properly constructed to prevent erosion.

HELPING YOUR CHILD ACQUIRE LITERACY SKILLS

The U.S. Department of Education has noted that "parents are their children's first and most influential teachers". Most parents want their child to learn to read andwrite, but often they don't know what they can do to help them.

Parents can do several things to help their children acquire the skills and concepts needed for reading:

*Play matching games with the child. The ability to catagorize things (such as buttons, blocks, beans or toys by shape, color, and size or groceries by food groups) is an important thinking skill.

*Knowing the letters of the alphabet can be encouraged when children look for the letters of their name on signs, in magazines, or in the newspaper.

*Visual discrimination, or being able to identify small differences between such letters as p, q, b and d, is an important skill for reading, Matching pictures in a deck of cards, playing lotto games or matching the dots on dominoes can help children with this skill.

*Auditory discrimination, being able to distinquish between such similar sounds as b ord, m orn, is also an important skill in learning to read. Matching objects beginning with the same sounds (house, hut, hamburger) or listening for different sounds (sound boxes can be made by placing beans, nuts, bulk tea, salt, soda, etc. in metal bandage boxes; tape the boxes closed). Talking about which makes the loudest or softest noise or how the sounds differ can assist children with this important skill.

*Praising children for their efforts and displaying their work enhances the child's sense of self worth. When children feel good about themselves

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

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
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

Summer Employment Counts For Social Security

Many young people in this area will take a summer job this year, many for the first time. There are many things they should know about social security.

First, a social security card is needed. If the young person does not have one, they should call 1-800-234-5772 for information on obtaining a card.

In 1990, one social security credit is earned for each \$520 up to a maximum of four credits for the year if earnings total \$2,080 or more.

All covered wages and self-employment income are recorded in the young person's name and social security number on a lifetime earnings record. His entitlement and the amount of future benefits will depend on the accuracy of that record.

There are special rules that apply if the young person receives cash tips in his job. Tips must be reported in writing to employers within ten days after the month ends if they amount to more than \$20 or more.
