Article 545.412 of the Transportation Code says: A person is breaking the law, if the person is at least 15 years of age, is riding in the front seat, is occupying a seat that is equipped with a safety belt and is not secured by that belt.

A person is breaking the law if they operate a car equipped with seatbelts and allows a child who is at least three years of age but younger than fifteen years of age to ride in the front seat of the vehicle without securing the child with a safety belt. A child two years of age or younger must be secured in a child passenger safety seat. NOT **ON A PERSONS LAP!**

Think about your life, your future. But especially think about the child's life, their future. Enjoy their laughter and even their crying, because of being secured in a car seat or by a seatbelt. I guarantee, you won't enjoy their cries of pain because they weren't secured.
