Voters To Decide On Economic Development Sales Tax, January 19

At the December meeting of the Munday City Council, members agreed to call an election to allow the public to vote on the one half cent sales tax option for economic and industrial development. The date for this election has been set for Saturday, January 19.

In June of 1989, the 71st Legislature passed a local option sales tax to be used only for industrial development activities. This allows any city in a county of less than 500,000 population to levy a sales tax of up to 1/2% to fund an industrial development corporation. Only a majority of the voters can impose this additional sales tax on the public.

This proposition, which is supported by the local Chamber of Commerce board of directors, would go into effect July 1, 1991 and could generate approximately \$24,000 per year for Munday. The money would create jobs through economic and industrial development. It would be used specifically to purchase, construct, improve or equip manufacturing, industrial, transportation and distribution facilities; make secured and unsecured loans for permanent

or interim financing; issue bonds to finance buildings, machinery, land or equipment for manufacturing or industrial projects; and pay for infrastructure such as streets, water and sewer, if they are directly related to an economic development project. No more than 10% of the funds may be used for promotion.

To spend these funds, the City Council must create a development corporation with a board consisting of five directors. The corporation then has the authority to expend the funds on economic development projects. The City Council can also contract with existing private corporations to carry out economic and industrial projects.

A recent survey showed that the average income for a family in Knox County is \$11,000 per year. It is estimated that a family earning \$12,000 per year would spend only an additional \$13 per year with the sales tax increase. That averages out to approximately 25 cents a week. A family earning \$30,000 per year would spend only \$27 per year with the added tax, or 51 cents per week.

FmHA To Resume Disaster Farm Loans

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) expects to resume approval of emergency loans for farmers who have suffered losses from last year's weather disasters in the near future, acting FmHA state director John E. Kirchhoff said recently.

"We know many producers are reaching the point where they have to make decisions on next year's crops, and we are confident we will be able to provide assistance," he said.

FmHA was forced to temporarily suspend final approval of emergency loans because of a provision in the 1990 farm bill which, in the end, will benefit farmers and ranchers.

Under FmHA's regular statutory authority, farmers must have crop insurance, if available, to be eligible for FmHA emergency loans, in most cases. The 1990 farm legislation, signed into law on November 28, waived that provision for loans based on losses on 1990 crops.

"I am informed that the regulation change waiving the insurance requirement is now in final clearance in Washington," Kirchhoff said.

He said applications are being accepted and can be processed up to the point of final approval. To assist in the timely processing of applications, any farmer, in a disaster-designated county who feels qualified for an emergency loan, is encouraged to file a completed application with the County Supervisor as soon as possible.

"I have been assured that we will be notified immediately when the regulation change has been published in the Federal Register, and loans can then be given final approval without further delay," he said. "We can and we will help our Texas producers with their credit needs."

State ASCS Panel Appointed For 1991

Jerry D. Harris, a cotton and grain sorghum farmer in Dawson and Gaines Counties, has been named to a sixth term as chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee, U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced.

Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yetter also named Mrs. Hope Huffman of McGregor to her second one-year term on the panel and re-appointed veteran ASCS committee members Dale Hunt of Garwood, D.V. Guerra, Jr. of Edinburg, and Keith Spears of Vernon.

"These five leaders bring a wealth of practical background in agriculture to ASCS. Jerry Harris has established an impressive record, combining years of experience as both a family farmer and a federal program administrator," the senator said. "Hope Huffman, Dale Hunt, D.V. Guerra, and Keith Spears all have done remarkable work in helping to lead the ASCS and I am pleased that they have agreed to continue their service to Texas and America."

The five-member panel oversees activities of the ASCS organization throughout Texas, including administration of federal farm programs in Texas.

Texas ASCS employs a staff of 1,400 and supervises the distribution of more than \$1.5 billion in federal farm program benefits to the farmers and ranchers of Texas every year.

The Fishing Doc

MILLERS CREEK RESERVOIR
Level & Condition: Full & Clear.
Temperature (at surface): 35°.

Black Bass: Fair. Taking slow moving, deep running lures. Best at 14-18 feet deep. Largest reported at 1 1/2 lbs. taken on large live minnows.

White Bass & Striper: Fair. Best at 22 feet on live minnows. A few taking jigs.

Crappie: Good to 1 1/2 lbs. Best on slow moving jigs at 18-22 feet. Some being caught on jig-minnow combinations.

Catfish: Fair. A few being caught on deep trollines on live minnows, small perch and cutbait. Some being caught on rod and reel at 20 feet on Tan Bait.

Carp & Buffalo: Good to 10 lbs. Best at 15-20 feet on Tan Bait or cut bait.

Fishing Tip

Q: Will fish bite when the lake (or pond) is iced over?

A: Fish will bite at any season under most any condition, including during the times when the lake ices over. Usually less fish are caught during this time due to less fishermen being on the lake. Lakes which have

enclosed fishing barges are good proof of this. The best fishing trip I've ever had was fishing through a hole in the ice. I was inside a heated barge (floating dock) while a west Texas blizzard roared outside. Large crappie took my jig on every deep water cast. At that time, one fellow caught an eight pound black bass on a tiny minnow and another caught a similar-sized channel catfish, too.

The secret to cold water fishing is to fish deep and slow...while keeping yourself warm.

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Extension Club To Host Snack Bar

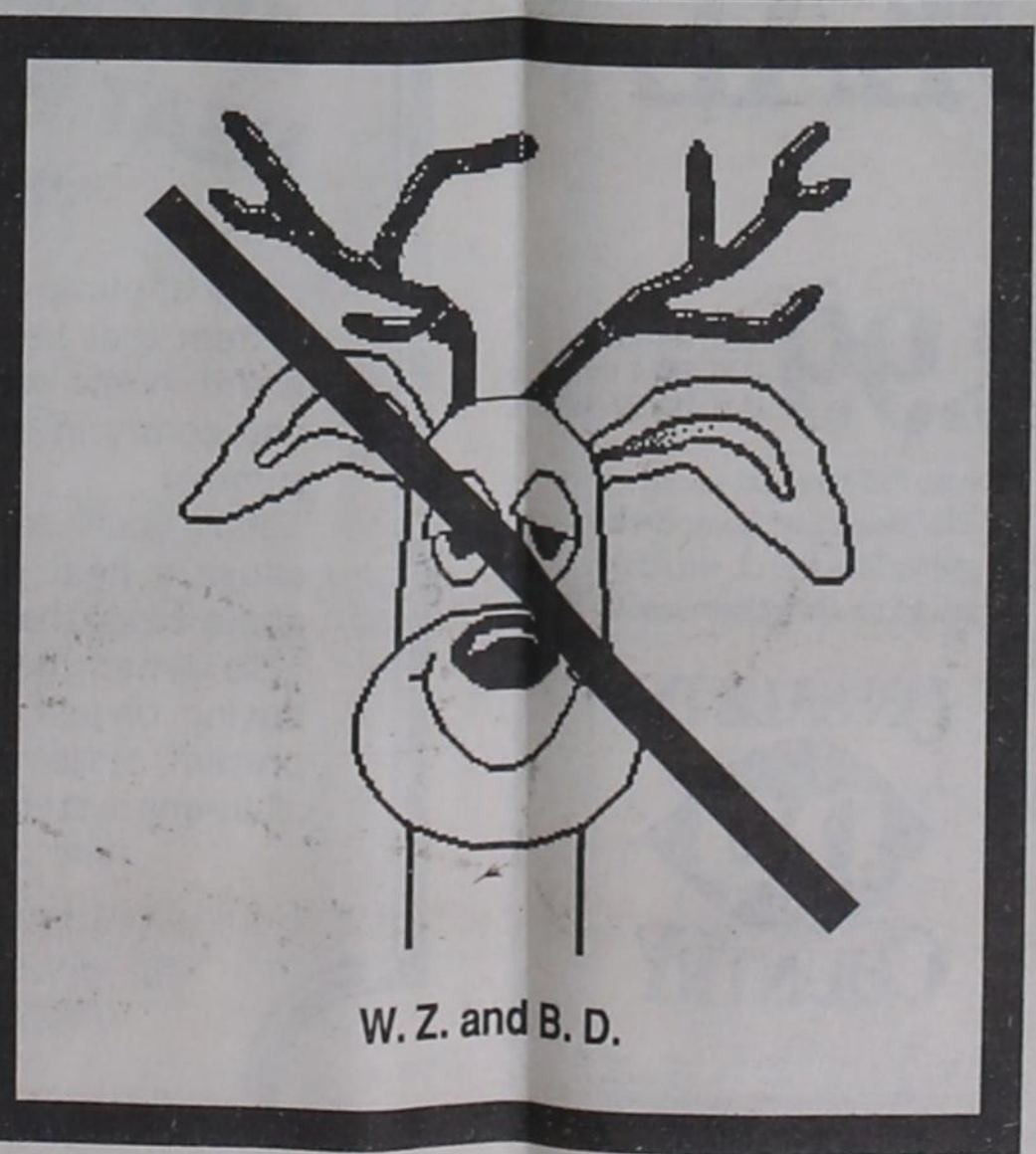
The Knox County Extension Homemakers Council will host the concession stand at the Knox County Junior Livestock Show this weekend at the Young Farmers Barn in Munday.

The same can be said of life. Life is meaningless -- or meaningful -- depending on your perspective. Ask yourself:



"Where am I looking for satisfaction? Have I found it there? If not, why not?"

See you next week, and remember: life is surely given us for higher purposes than to gather what our ancestors have wisely thrown away.

5% ARP Announced For 1991 Cotton Crops

Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter has announced a five percent acreage reduction program (ARP) for the 1991 crop of upland cotton. This compares with a 12.5 percent reduction for the 1990 crop and is in keeping with an earlier recommendation by the National Cotton Council, which represents all segments of the U.S. cotton industry.

The Secretary also announced an advance deficiency payment of four cents/pound, which represents 40% of the projected 10 cents total deficiency payment for the 1991 crop. The law requires the Secretary to make an advance payment of 30% to 50% of the projected deficiency payment for the year.

The reduction percentage is keyed to a provision of 1990 farm law that requires the Secretary to set the ARP at a level that allow the carryover of upland cotton at the end of the 1991 season to be equal to 30% of total upland offtake for the season. The law forbids the ARP to exceed 25%.

This is the first year the stocks-to-use ratio was used to calculate the acreage reduction program for cotton. This new procedure is a cotton industry recommendation.

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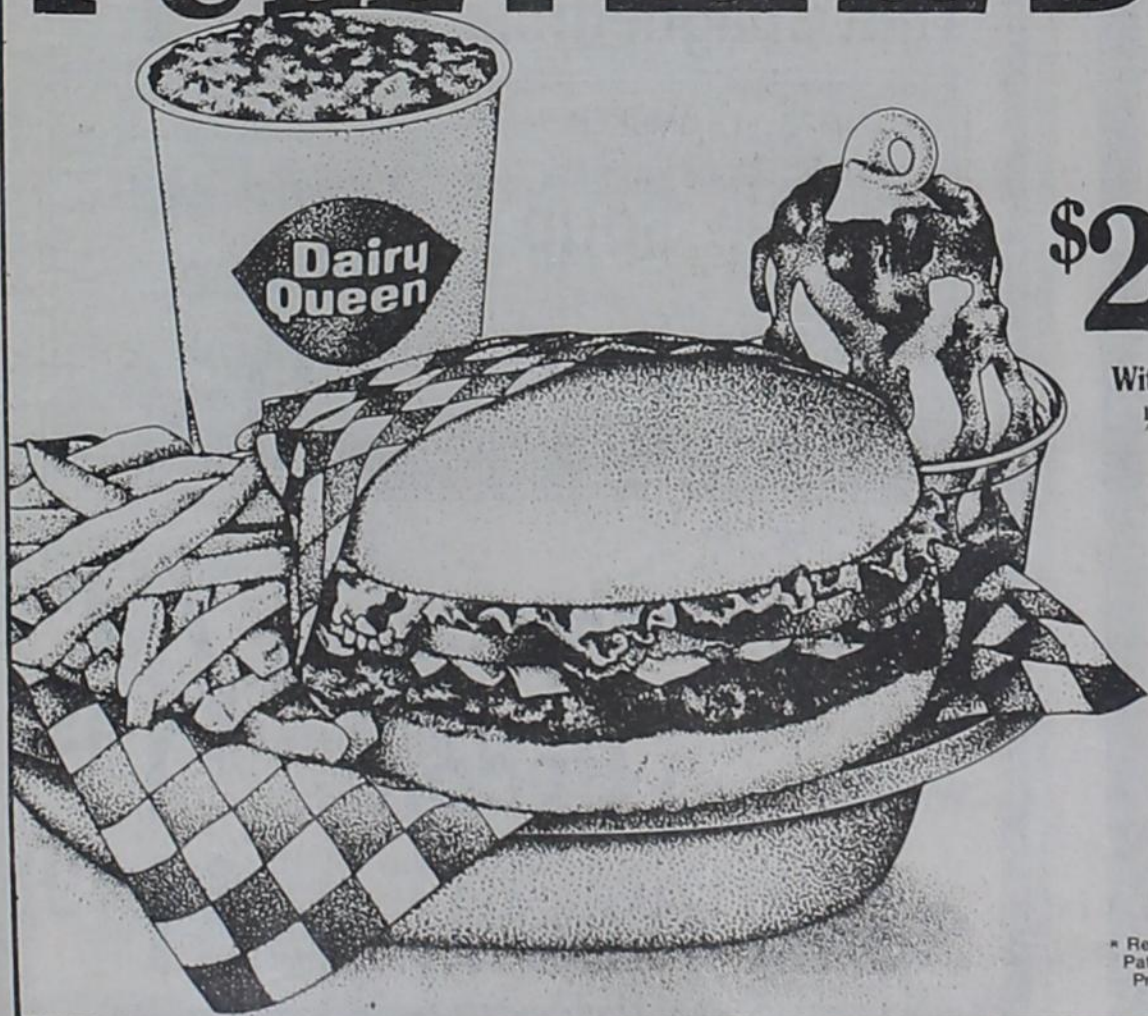

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

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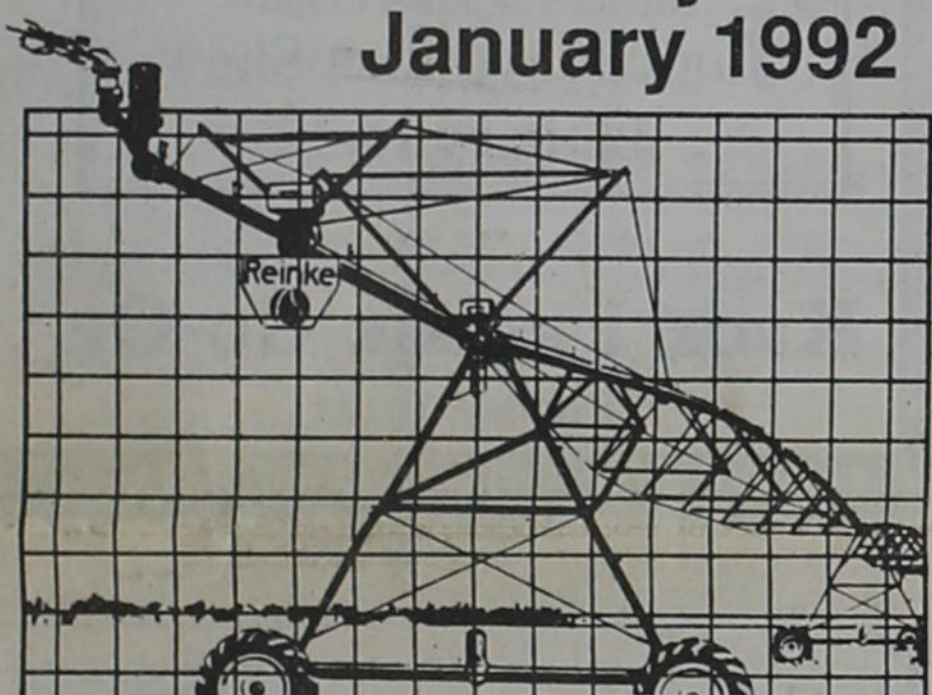

1990 Grain Producers To Receive Payments

According to Keith Bjerke, executive vice president of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation, approximately \$1.743 billion in deficiency and 0/92 payments will be made to eligible producers of the 1990 wheat, barley and oats crops.

Deficiency payments are made under the 1990 wheat, barley and oats programs when the national weighted average market prices received by producers during the first five months of the marketing year (June through October) are below established "target" price levels.

Deficiency payment rates are based upon the difference between the target price for the commodity and the higher of the five-month average market price or the basic loan rate.

Producers who enrolled in the wheat, barley and oats 0/92 programs were guaranteed a minimum payment rate of \$0.90 per bushel for wheat and \$0.26 for barley. Oats producers did not receive a guaranteed payment rate. Eligible producers will receive this guaranteed rate less any advance in 0/92 payments they have already received.

Carry Your Medicare Card At All Times

If you have Medicare, it's important that you keep your Medicare card handy. The Medicare card is your proof that you have Medicare protection, so keep it with you.

Doctors, hospitals, and other Medicare-service providers need to see your Medicare card in order to be sure that you have coverage and that the Medicare number is correct. Otherwise, Medicare payments may be delayed.

What if you lose your card? Don't worry. All you have to do is contact social security and we'll help you get a replacement free of charge. Call 1-800-234-SSA (1-800-234-5772) weekdays between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

It usually takes four to six weeks to get the new card. And remember, there's no charge for the phone call or the replacement card.

Knox County Appraisal District Reminder To Taxpayers

January 31, 1991

is the last day to pay your 1990 taxes and avoid the additional penalty and interest charges

Homestead Exemptions

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1991. However, if you became 65 after January 1, 1990 and before January 1, 1991, you need to apply for the additional over 65, \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser Stanton Brown, between the dates of January 1, 1991 and May 1, 1991. These exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County Courthouse.

Ag-Use Exemptions

Annual applications for qualifying land for agricultural use is not required. If you have been receiving the AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1991 and May 1, 1991.

Disabled Veterans Exemption

These exemptions need not be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1990 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1991. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1991 and May 1, 1991.

Renditions

Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions is between January 1, 1991 and April 1, 1991.

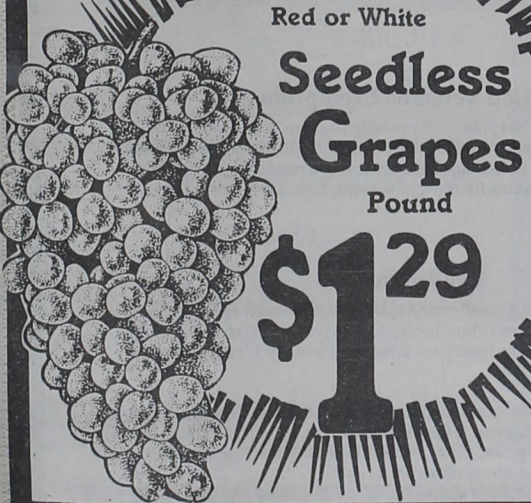
