"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

WHAT'S NEW?

"Therefore, if any one be in Christ, he is a new creature; The old has passed away, behold all things become new."
2 Corinthians 5:17

When two men meet who have not seen each other for some length of time, one of them will invariably ask the other, "What's new with you?" It is a good question to ask at any time. In the spring especially, when the earth gives forth the evidence of new life, we should be concerned with our spiritual growth and the Newness of new life that only God can give. "What's new?" is an important question. True, the New is necessarily true nor is the old necessarily obsolete and worthless. True, Christianity holds fast to that which is good, and much that is old is good. No sensible person writes off a valuable heritage. Never-the-less God

says in Revelation, "Behold I make all things new." Always in the weeks following the Commemoration of Christ's death and resurrection, we should ask ourselves the question Are we content with our ways, the old achievement or are we moving forward with our Lord into new adventures of companionship with God? Is our service to Him greater as the days pass. One minister chided the Christian who indulged in the sentimental nostalgia for the good old days. This kind of religion, he said, has for its symbol "the old oak bucket, the iron-bound bucket, and the MOSS COVERED SERMON that hung in the pulpit."

What's NEW with you and me, as Disciples of Christ.

First, YOU ARE NEW! your family and friends may not reveal it, yet every living child of God is forever becoming new. The newness may not always be good, but the unchanging fact about personality is that it is changing.

We are in the process of becoming something "better or worse" than we are now. "If any one is in Christ" he is becoming a new person altogether. WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE "IN CHRIST?" What does it mean when a person says he is in sales in business, in medicine, in politics? It means that one has made a commitment, a decision, and has become enthusiastically involved in that particular interest or vocation. So, to "Be In Christ" is to be with Him with all that one has or is. "TO BE WITH HIM WHO IS OUR LORD AND SAVIOUR." When Christ is our ruling interest, our Master, then inner changes of a Christlike character are taking place. We are no longer outer-directed beings, or persons; we are INNER-directed, and the inward force is the living Christ.

What's new with you could be a new relationship with others, Paul wrote, "From now on, we regard no one from a human point of view;" worldly standards have ceased to count in the estimate of any man. Now you look at all men through the eyes of Christ. The significant thing about people for the Christian is that they are PEOPLE. Some twisted soul said to a preacher's son playing with a Jewish boy, "You should, as a Christian, hate the Jew." The little fellow looked up at the grown-up and said, "Jesus was a Jew, wasn't he?"

"A new commandment I give to you," Jesus said, "that you loved one another even as I have loved you." This should always be new with us, "Our regard for others, our relationship with others."

Baptist General Convention May 29

Baptist leaders in Callahan County will co-sponsor with the Stewardship Division of the 1.8 million member Baptist General Convention of Texas one of more than 100 major conferences across the state introducing a 1967 Christian concept dealing with total stewardship from a family point of view.

Included in the new approach is a money management emphasis not only on what the family gives but the wise use of what is kept.

Leadership and families in Callahan Baptist Association comprised of approximately 3,270 members in some 12 churches in the county have been invited to attend the Monday, May 29 conference at 7:30 p. m. in the First Baptist Church, Clyde. Pastor of the host church is Rev. Bryan G. Halliburton.

Rev. Clyde Somers, pastor of Admiral Baptist Church, and also a Howard Payne College student in Brownwood, is stewardship chairman of Callahan association and will lead in promotion of the area program through the year, in addition to his work coordinating the Monday night conference.

Overall purpose of the sessions is to introduce an effective approach for churches to implement 1967 materials featuring "a Christian family witnessing to its faith."

AUSTIN — Final minutes are ticking away in the biennial legislative game of "beat the clock."

Obviously, the wind-up of the 60th session will be a cliff-hanger.

As lawmakers move toward the May 29 finish line, the major jobs they came to Austin to accomplish remain unfinished.

THE BUDGET — It went to conference committee, following an unsuccessful attempt by Gov. John Connally and Speaker Ben Barnes to sell the Senate on accepting the House appropriations bill without the traditional conference to adjust differences. House Bill calls for \$448,300,000 in general revenue; Senate bill, \$437,700,000.

REDISTRICTING — A Senate Congressional Bill would save all incumbent congressmen the agony of having to run against a colleague. But the House Judicial District Committee has drawn different lines. So this issue must go to conference committee for an 11th hour compromise. State House of Representatives districts also must be redrawn. But the Senate has little interest in that. Judicial redistricting appears to be impossible unless once more.

SCHOOL TEACHER PAY — Both houses agree there must be a raise. Major problem is to determine the amount.

Although revenue in sight from the Comptroller's last official estimate won't cover the budgets drawn by either house, plus a teacher pay raise of the magnitude sought, legislative leaders still insist adjustments will make the money possible without a tax bill.

Speculation is widespread that the lawmakers can't finish the job on schedule but top leaders are hopeful they can avoid a special session by covering the clock for a few days.

DRIVERS LICENSE CHANGE DUE — Major changes in Texas drivers license laws have been approved by both houses.

Bill increases minimum age for license from 15 to 16 for those who complete approved driver training courses and to 18 for those without such training. Hardship licenses are permitted for 15 year olds where there is a licensed adult driver in the front seat. Motor scooter and motorcycle operators must be at least 15, and for commercial licenses, 17.

placed by a plastic card with a color photograph of the driver. New ones will be good for four years instead of two years and will cost \$6 instead of \$3. Drivers may be required to take a new competency examination when they apply for a new license. However, re-examination is not compulsory, as proposed in the original bill.

License suspension period for violations was increased from six to 12 months for the first offense and from 12 to 18 months for repeat offenses, subject to the court's discretion. Driving while license is suspended will be punishable by fines up to \$500 and a maximum of six months in jail.

HORSE RACING — Voters will be given an opportunity to express their opinion on whether Texas should legalize horse-race betting, if the House agrees with the Senate to put the question on the ballot in the Democratic and Republican primaries next May.

Senate passed the bill by Sen. V. E. Berry of San Antonio, long on advocate of horse-race betting, and sent it to the House for its concurrence. Actually the bill, as passed by the Senate, would not require the parties to put the question on the ballot but would permit and encourage them to.

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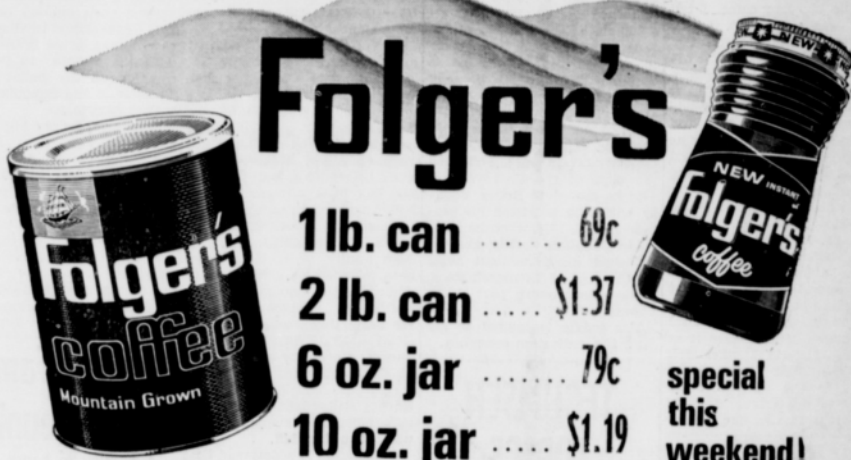
