### Woman sues hypnotist

LONDON — A woman who said a stage hypnotist turned her into a "zombie" and drove her to attempt suicide won her lawsuit Friday.

Lynn Howarth told London's High Court that her problems began when she was hypnotized by Philip Green at a social club in northwestern England in 1994.

"I went to that stage show as a normal, happy, healthy, energetic woman and came out a zombie." she told the court.

Howarth, 40, said an age-regression skit in Green's act reawakened memories of sexual abuse by an uncle when she was eight. She said she later suffered from panic attacks and depression and twice attempted suicide.

Judge Brian Leveson agreed that Green's suggestion caused Howarth "to regress to an age when she was sexually abused and, as a result, suffer depressive illness."

Green agreed to pay \$9,000 US in damages.

### Convict breaks into prison

SAN JOSE, CA — For Arnold Ancheta, it was out of the oven and into the frying pan.

Ancheta, an inmate at Elmwood Correctional Facility, broke out of a medium-security dorm only to hop the wrong fence and end up next door at the women's jail.

Last week, Ancheta apparently stood atop a bunk bed and punched holes in the wall to use as steps toward a skylight. He then used a bed sheet and a mop handle to pry apart two bars that blocked the roof opening. He squeezed through the bars and broke out the plexiglass-covered skylight.

He jumped down about 20 feet from the roof. However, instead of heading toward the fence that leads to a public road, he jumped a smaller fence and ended up on the women's side of the facility, according to a Corrections spokesman.

June 3 — Texas Rangers captured three merchant vessels loaded with supplies for the Mexican Army, thus earning the title "Horse Marines" (1836).


June 5 — Cantonment on Sweetwater was established; designated Fort Elliot on February 21, 1876. Last troops left the post on October 20, 1890.

Muleshoe High School's Class of 2001 achieved so much success during its run, it was really no surprise that graduation would come off without a hitch.


The weather even cooperated.

# Cotton season predicted to be "buggy"

Predicting insect problems is an art, with a little science mixed in. The trouble is, whether insects become a problem in a given season is dependent upon many things, with weather one of the dominant factors.

And we all know how difficult it is to predict weather accurately in this part of the world. With that said, let's get down to the business of "crystalballing" future cotton pest problems. The predicted problem with thrips has materialized with clouds of thrips moving out of maturing wheat and other host plants

into emerging stands of seedling cotton. Pressure from adult thrips has been so great that even Temiktreated cotton has some feeding damage. Remember that thrips must feed on treated plants to get a lethal

# Combest says remember needs of veterans

Memorial Day is a time when we reflect upon the sacrifices our veterans have made to defend our country's freedom. Our veterans deserve the utmost respect and recognition. # Armyworms being found in area corn

Significant numbers of beet armyworms are being found in some corn in the Farwell-Muleshoe area, according to a report from the Parmer-Bailey office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Beet armyworms will feed on corn, but are more common in sorghum and cotton. Because little is known about beet armyworm damage to corn, the damage potential is difficult to estimate, said Cherinell Riley, extension agent-IPM. At present, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service expect corn less than eight (8) inches tall to be at risk. Corn less than six (6) inches tall is at higher risk. Damage will include leaf feeding and window-paning, similar to fall armyworm. It is possible that smaller plants may undergo "deadheart," which occurs when the growing point is killed. The risk of deadheart is unknown.

It is not impossible to formulate firm treatment thresholds. If beet armyworm damage is similar to that from fall armyworms, infestation of 50 % or more will be tolerable in taller plants. Smaller plants are at greater risk, however, so the treatment threshold is probably lower. Transgenic (B-) corn is not very toxic to beet armyworm, so field planted in these hybrids are also at risk.

If treatment is required,

### Refuge sightings on increase

Recent observations at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge have proved interesting, with the recent sighting of a male vermillion flycatcher and a rose-breasted grosbeak.

Three refuge lakes are at near capacity due to spring rains, resulting in abundant native grasses and various wildflowers.

While migrating white-faced ibis and cattle egrets have not been seen recently at Paul's Lake, nesting killdeer and American avocet, as well as other shore birds, can be seen. Prairie dogs and at least one pair of burrowing owls can be seen and as many as 15 mule deer have been noted at the refuge on both sides of highway 214 and near the refuge campground.

ground application is preferred. If treatments are applied by air, a minimum of five gallons of water per acre should be applied, and more is better.

The beet armyworm larvae are light green to dark green in color with four pairs of abdominal prolegs and a dark head. There are many fine, white, wavy lines along the back and a broader stripe along each side. There is usually a distinctive dark spot on each side just above the second pair of true legs. Eggs are laid in masses and some plants can have many small larvae on them These will spread out as they get older.

All riders must wear an ANSI or Snell-approved helmets and all traffic laws must be obeyed.





## Application deadline near for deficiency payments

The signup deadline for 2000 crop year loan deficiency payments (LDPs) on farms without a production flexibility contact (PFC) is approaching for many crops, says Bailey County Farm Service Agency executive director Kim Hanlin.

Loan deficiency payments to operators of noncontract farms were authorized in an amendment to the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996. The amendment applies to farms that were not initially signed up for a production flexibility contract in 1996 and covers contract commodities only (wheat, corn, barley, rye, oats, sorghum and cotton). The amendment applies only to the 2000 crop year.

Producers are eligible for a beneficial interest exemption on contract commodities produced on farms without production flexibility contract if the commodity was harvested and marketed by November 29, 2000.

I would expect that many of these farmers will need to treat at least twice to pull their cotton through the thrips vulnerability period. Addimethoate are all good choices when spraying for thrips. I've heard of producers in the Southeast using pyrethroids for thrips control. While these may work for some species, they are relatively ineffective against our dominant species, western flower thrips. Also, I would not recommend using pyrethroids this early in the season. Our resistance management strategies have us hold off their use until August.

With several kinds of looper, armyworm, cutworm and army cutworm moths flying about, cotton producers are very nervous about a repeat of the 2000 season when heavy yield losses and astronomical spray bills were the rule. We've had the rains to green up the landscape and produce abundant host plants for beet armyworms. And now we have confirmed reports that beet armyworms are infesting some fields of corn.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation trapping program has collected large numbers of beet armyworm moths in west Texas. In fact, moth trap catches are up 177% in west Texas traps com-

pared to last year but down Those at-planting seed treat- 42% in Foundation traps run in the South Texas/Winter Garden area. This area did not have problems with beet armyworms like we did last year. My only hope is that these Producers who opted to save early beet armyworm numbers do not translate into later headaches for cotton farmers. But these are not cheap insecticides and with the depressed economic climate surrounding cotton, producers can ill afford to wage battle again with this pest.

Don't let these pests sneak before you know it. Scout fields beginning at the 5th true leaf stage. Several effective insecticides exist for fleahopper control and include Address and Orthene, Bidrin, dimethoate, Provado, Steward, Lannate, and Vydate.

Plant bugs also are also controlled by these same insecticides but often at higher rates. Our best materials in 2000 tests were Orthene and Bidrin. Pyrethroids also fit the bill for later plant bug problems, especially where large numbers continuously migrate out of adjacent host plants.

While 2001 needs to be a inexpensive year for cotton producers, potential insect problems could spoil this scenario.

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
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

As I write this, son, I'm very much aware that tonight I'll be the school board member standing up on the stage handing you your high school diploma. I'm also aware that you'd far rather be triple-teamed by an offensive line in Texas Stadium and even bleed a little (just 25 or so stitches worth) than get openly gushy in front of a thousand people at graduation. I understand, but I'll warn you ahead of time: I'm probably going to hug you, so you might

as well prepare to be embarrassed. It's only fair, you know. I might have been just a tad embarrassed myself if I'd dissolved into a weeping heap up on the stage last Sunday evening at the baccalaureate service. I was about to sing myself, but the words and the music of the song you and the choir sang, and, clearly discernable to me at least, the voices of two of my sons in the choir, mingled with my emotions. And it was even harder because—you'll probably think this is really weird-as I had earlier looked out into the audience from my seat on the stage, I had seen a younger boy, just visible from the nose up, whose straight blonde hair and blue eyes combined to make him look, well, an awful lot like you did not that long ago. Almost uncannily like you still do and always will in my mind, no matter how big you become. But there you were, bigger than life (we long ago got over thinking you might be the little guy in the family!) wearing a black cap and gown, and just a heartbeat or two away from graduation. Sitting there, I could look, it seemed, both at the boy you'd been and the man you are so quickly becoming.

Have I told you that I like what you're becoming?

I love to see you unafraid to face even the biggest opponent on an offensive line, but I'm also thrilled to see you unafraid to be gentle and to laugh with the littlest "gigglingest" child at church or to put your big arm around the smallest elderly sister in Christ.

I know the way you set up on the line in a game, and where you place your hands, and how you rock just a bit before you erupt into action, and just how you run, spin, engage, and tackle. I've never played a single down of football, but I've experienced Joy (and what I'm trying to describe, well, it completely deserves the capital J, and you know it when you feel it). It's the deep Joy that comes from doing what God has uniquely gifted you to do, and what you've had the commitment to work hard to hone (still by His power) so you can present the gift back to Him, and then trusting Him and absolutely forgetting yourself as you play, sing, write, fly, run, act, dive, perform, teach-it could be any of a thousand things, and sometimes it's just living, just breathing-for Him, by His power, thanking Him with every breath for the gift He's given and feeling the wellspring of Joy wash over you when by using the gift for His glory, you give it back, and God gives it again.

Jeffrey, my son, you are one of God's very best gifts to me, and watching you and loving you, has always brought me Joy.

# Mandatory livestock price reporting procedures reviewed

WASHINGTON — A hearing was held by the Agriculture Committee this week to review the implementation of mandatory livestock price reporting and to examine recent problems associated with misreported

"Our goal should be the return of credibility for the Agriculture Marketing Service's (AMS) reporting function and the assurance of an orderly livestock market benefitting producers, packers, retailers, and consumers," said Chairman Larry Combest (R-TX).

Since the implementation of mandatory price reporting April 3, many AMS reports have had data missing as a result of the so-called 3/60 rule. The rule is designed to ensure proprietary data is not released to the pub-

Livestock markets were recently shocked by revelations that AMS reporting errors, allegedly caused by a computer program error, had understated prices of boxed beef since the beginning of April. Ken Clayton, acting administrator of the AMS, testified that in response to the reporting errors, Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman ordered a "top to bot-

tom review" of the mandatory price reporting system.

An independent review team, led by USDA Chief Economist Keith Collins, was appointed to carry out the review. The charge of the review team is to examine the mandatory reporting system process and procedures, review the performance of the system to date, assess the consequences of the misreporting of the boxed beef cutout values, and recommend to the Secretary actions that can be taken to enhance the integrity of the system as well as ensure accurate reporting in the future.
