Head football coach hired by school board

The Munday ISD Board of Trustees met in called session Friday, April 1, to hire an Athletic Director/Head Football Coach. Out of fifty-seven applicants, Steve Gideon of Groesbeck was selected.

The committee narrowed the field down to seven to be interviewed. From the seven two were selected to be interviewed by the Board. Hart Jeanis of Italy High School was the other finalist.

Coach Gideon is a 1981 graduate of Stephen F. Austin State University. He has thirteen years experience in the coaching field. He spent five years at Boswell High School in Saginaw, Texas. He then spent one year at Canyon High School before going to Comanche High School as first assistant. Following six years at Comanche, he moved to Groesbeck High School where he held the position of assistant foot-

ball coach and head track coach.

Coach Gideon is married and has two children, a seven year old daughter, Quincee, and a son, Blake, who is four. His wife, Ralene, is a math teacher.

The new coach will assume his duties at MHS on April 18.

Blood Drive to be held on April 11

The American Red Cross will hold a blood drive in Munday on April 11 from 3:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. at the Munday Community Center, for area residents.

Blood banks throughout the United States are continuing to emphasize the need for donors to give again and again to help eliminate shortages caused by bad weather and seasonal illnesses.

"We appreciate the support which is being given by each regional community and hope that all eligible donors will participate at scheduled blood drive visits," said Polly Brumfield, director of donor resources development for the Wichita Falls location of Southwest Region Red Cross Blood Services.

"Volunteer blood donors must be at least 17, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and be in good health," said Brenda Smith, who serves as local blood services chairperson. "Although all types are needed, we want to encourage type-O donors to make a special effort to donate."

Citizens identify critical issues in Knox County

Key leaders from throughout Knox County came together on March 28 to examine, discuss and identify conditions impacting the county. This process was a part of developing the Knox County Long Range Extension Program.

Oscar Mangis, Chairman of the Knox County Extension Program Council, welcomed the group and introduced County Judge, David Neil Perdue, who served as moderator for the evening.

Beginning in 1986, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service took a comprehensive look at the issues of greatest concern to Texas Citizens. The resulting effort was the Long Range Extension Program which provided a basis of the Extension Service to develop issue-based programming in Knox County.

Since 1986, issues have altered and evolved. Therefore, it became appropriate to go through the issue identification process again. By doing this, Extension programming will address issues of greatest concern.

Four statewide goals provided the basis for the issue identification process. A resource panel addressed the four goals by presenting a short analysis of the current and emerging conditions and consequences of each goal within Knox County. Serving on the panel were:

— Stephen Kuehler, Administrator, Knox County Hospital — "Health, Safety and Well-Being" — John Rector, Director, Agri-

cultural Stabilization and Conservation Service — "Environmental Stewardship and Natural Resources"

— Gary Schur, President, First National Bank of Munday — "Economic Competitiveness, Viability and Stability"

— Rick Moeller, Agricultural Science Teacher in Munday — "Development of Life Skills and Leadership Qualities"

Following the panel analysis, task force groups in each of the goal areas met and identified, discussed, and prioritized issues impacting Knox County. Serving as task force facilitators were Philip Homer, Lynn Fitzgerald, Stanton Brown, and Paula Schur.

A few of the issues identified pertained to: Chemicals and the Water Supply, Chemical Applications, Loss of Quail Population, Rural Water Supply, Seymour Aquifer - The Clean Water Act, Control of Fire Ants, Parenting Responsibilities, Rural Health Care, Stress, Tax Abatement Program, Business Opportunities, Job Creation, Alcohol and Drug Abuse, and Teen Pregnancy.

Some of the issues identified were complex and intertwined. Addressing those issues will require teamwork among Extension and other groups and organizations in the county. The issues identified will be summarized and compile into the Long Range Extension Program document for use by groups and individuals in addressing the issues. Copies of the Long Range Extension Program will be available in October 1994.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is dedicated to educating and improving the health and economic well-being of Texas citizens. We ask the support of Knox County citizens as we address these critical issues over the next five year period.

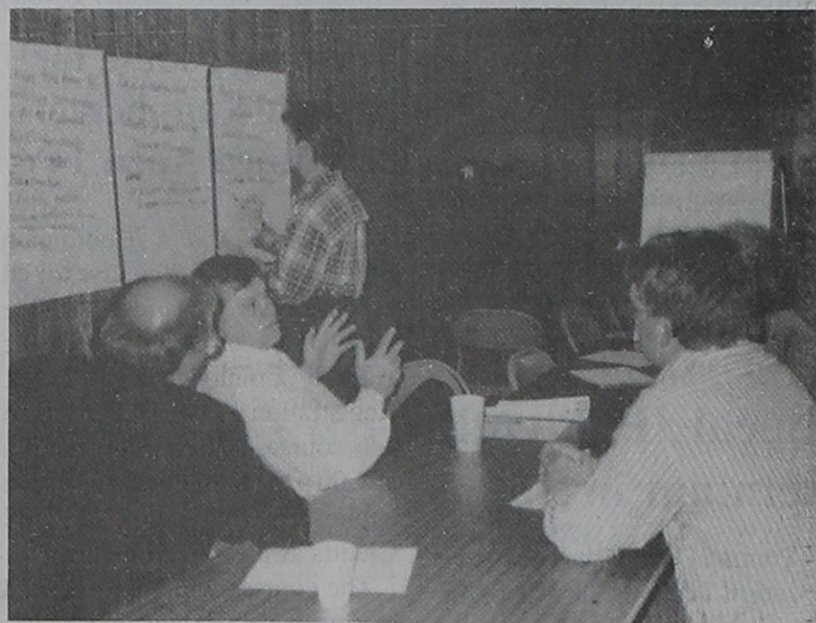

PCA to hold 60th Annual Stockholders Meeting

Rolling Plains Credit Association's 60th Annual Stockholders Meeting will be held Thursday evening, April 7, in Childress and Friday evening, April 8, in Stamford. At both sessions registration and the meal will begin at 6:00 p.m. and be followed by a brief business session. The City Auditorium will be the site of the Childress session with the Stamford meeting held in the High School Cafeteria.

Drawings will be held from members' registration cards until a total of \$900 is awarded in each session. The harmony and hilarity of Donna Fowler and Cindy Nix as "Just Friends" will be featured entertainment.

One Director representing the Spur area will be elected during the short business session. Nominees are Lance D. Morris of Crosbyton and Darrell Thomason of Dry Lake near Spur.

Rolling Plains PCA is one of 18

member-owned Production Credit Associations in the Tenth District of the Farm Credit System which includes 14 PCAs in Texas, three PCAs in New Mexico and one PCA in Louisiana. Collectively PCAs have approximately 12,500 loans outstanding to the region's agricultural producers. At 1993 year's end the Tenth District had some \$830 million in loan volume. Rolling Plains PCA is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System providing over \$50 billion in loans to America's farmers, ranchers and ag-related businesses.

During 1993 Rolling Plains Production Credit Association loaned more than \$102 million to approximately 730 member-borrowers in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Motley, Runnels, Shackelford, Stone-wall and Taylor Counties. The Association had a net profit after taxes of some \$946,000 and made a profit for the 59th time in the 60 fiscal years since it was chartered.

The Association has been rated as a Tier I PCA for six consecutive years. This rating is based on safety, soundness and financial strength.

Farmers will be handed a ballot for voting on the planting date as they enter the building. Dates to choose from will be May 9, May 16 or May 23. These results will be announced at the end of the program.

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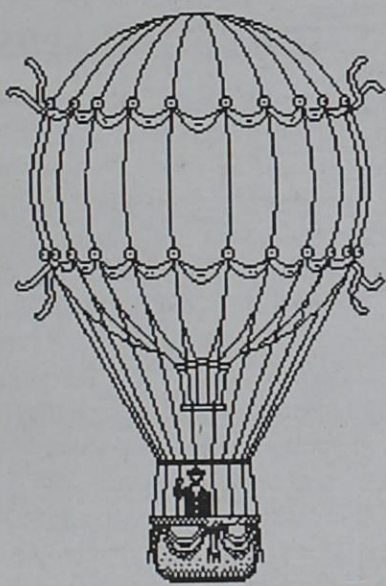

Homecoming will be held this year for ex-students, teachers and residents. Many are already discussing plans on class reunions and parties.

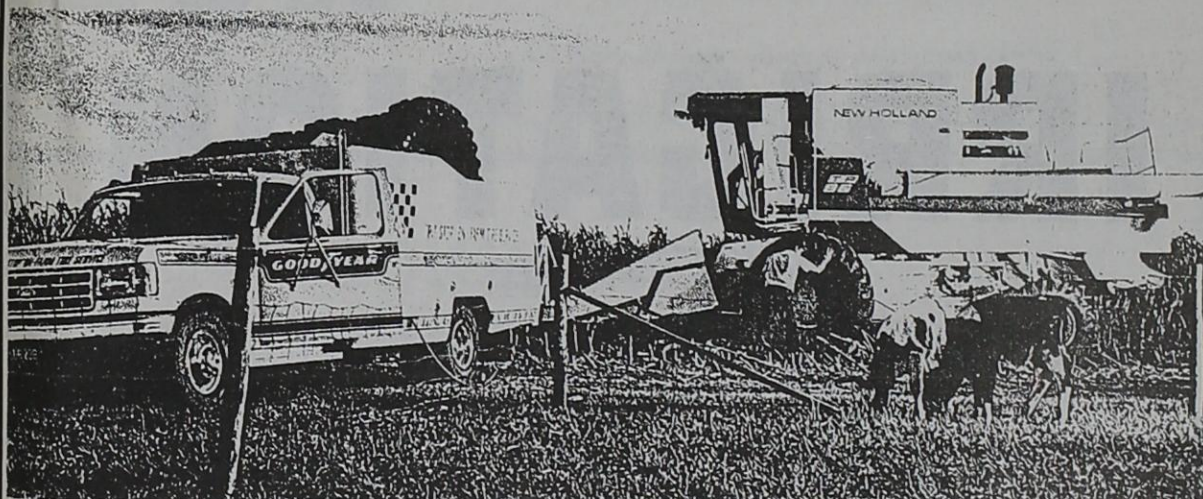
November 5 is the date set for homecoming activities, when the Moguls will take on the Knox City Greyhounds in exciting football action.

"Halcyon Days", according to sea tradition, is the two-week period of calm weather before and after the shortest day of the year, about December 21.

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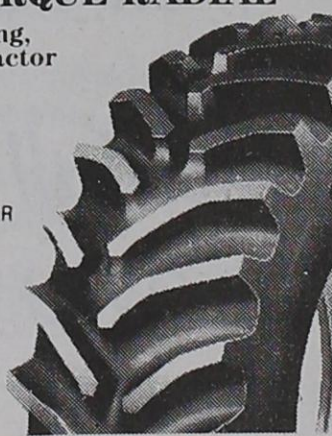
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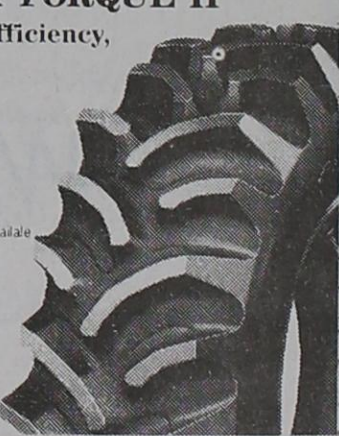

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

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Connecting families and schools to help our children succeed

Raising a child is tough. So is educating a child.

The day-to-day reality of the American family is different today than a generation ago. Parents and children spend far less time together and almost all parents face an ongoing struggle to balance the demands of their family life with their jobs. At a time when parents are under tremendous pressures that make them less able to participate in their children's lives, there is a greater need for them to be involved, particularly in education.

Parents and families can make a big difference in the education of young people. The U.S. Department of Education is committed to dealing with this issue by emphasizing the importance of family-school partnerships in its major legislative initiatives: GOALS 2000 and the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). Parents are being asked to become partners in a national family involvement campaign. This joint effort will connect

families, schools, and communities to enable all children to meet high standards.

The Family-School Connection

People who have worked with families and schools have suggested a number of concrete actions that parents, schools, and communities can take now to help all children learn.

As their children's first teachers, **parents and families can:**

1. **Schedule daily homework time.** Establish a time each day for your child to be engaged in academic work. Review the work regularly. Provide a quiet, well-lighted place for study. Cut off TVs and radios. Also, discourage phone calls during work time. Encourage your child's efforts and be available for questions. Spend time discussing what your child has learned.

While schools have the responsibility of assigning meaningful work, students have the responsibility to complete it. Time spent on academic work at home is directly related to achievement.

2. **Read together.** Read with your

children and let them see you and older children read. Take your children to the library to get a library card and help them find books on their interests and hobbies.

Studies show that when parents read to their children or listen to them read on a regular basis, their achievement improves. Taking the time to read with children is the most successful way to encourage children to read which is critical to a child's education.

3. **Use TV wisely.** Establish a TV watching budget and help your child choose programs for viewing. Select programs to watch together and discuss.

Parents need to use TV wisely by both limiting the amount of viewing and helping children select educational programs. When chosen carefully, some television programs can help increase interest in learning.

4. **Keep in touch with the school.** Don't leave it up to the school to let you know how and what your children are doing. Stay aware of what your children are learning, what their assignments are, and how they are doing. Make a point of visiting the school and talking with the teachers. If you can't visit, schedule a phone call. Don't wait until there is a problem.

Research on the performance of high school students has shown that parents who are consistently informed about their children's progress can contribute to higher achievement. The partnership between parents and teachers is key to creating a climate at home and at school that is conducive to learning.

5. **Offer praise and encouragement.** Encourage your children to put in the time and effort to complete assignments. Encourage them to persevere. Cultivate a warm and supporting home atmosphere while also setting and enforcing standards for school work.

Parents play a dominant role in influencing a child's confidence and motivation to become a successful learner. Parents should encourage children to complete assignments as well as introduce them to enrichment programs and outside experiences that will enhance their self-confidence and broaden their interests.

6. **Talk to your teenager.** Know who your teenager's friends are and keep tabs on their whereabouts. Support you teenagers in their school and extracurricular activities.

ties. Keep them involved in family activities. Continue to set and enforce rules. Stress your teenagers importance as a role model to younger siblings.

Teenagers and parents can learn a lot about each other just by talking. Parents should communicate their values openly with their teenagers. By talking about the importance of values such as honesty, self-reliance, and responsibility, parents are helping their teenagers make good decisions.

State Senator Steve Carriker (D-Roby) was honored March 26 by the Texas Academy of Family Physicians for his outstanding efforts in the Texas Legislature during the 1993 Legislative Session. The TAFP gave the Presidential Award of Merit to Senator Carriker.

The award, presented by Jimmy Randles, MD of Waco, is a mark of commitment to the health care of Texans and the specialty of Family Practice. Dr. Randles stated, "Steve Carriker is a champion of rural health care and he understand better than anyone the valuable role family physicians play in providing health care for rural Texans."

One of Senator Carriker's chief concerns is the shortage of primary care physicians in Texas. Statistics show 36.4 percent of all family physicians will reach retirement age by the end of the decade, and an even higher percentage of those are in rural areas. The United States, and Texas for that matter, has less than a third of the physician workforce in primary care/generalists specialties, while other nations like Great Britain, Germany and Canada have more than 50% of their physicians in generalists specialties. President Clinton's Health Security Act calls for 55% of the nation's medical graduates to enter the primary care specialties of Family Practice, General Internal Medicine, General Pediatrics and Obstetrics/Gynecology.

The TAFP was established to promote and assure the maintenance of high quality health care by providing the highest professional standards of Family Practice through the provision of Continuing Medical Education.

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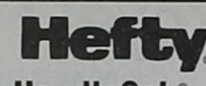

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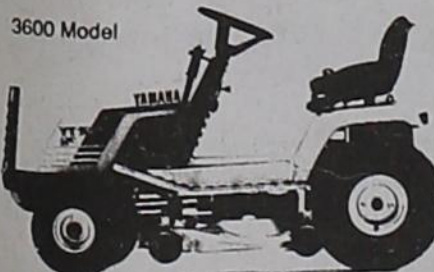

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Missing man found during aerial search

A bright yellow baseball cap may have saved the life of an elderly man.

According to the Knox County Sheriff's Department, 84 year old Oliver R. Miller of Gilliland left his home on foot around 2 a.m. Thursday morning, March 28, fully dressed and carrying a flashlight. When he didn't return after approximately an hour and a half, his wife, Frances, called Mediplex Home Health and 9-1-1 for help.

The Sheriff's Department and two nurses from the local Mediplex office, Patty Arismendez and Linda Latham, were among the first on the scene. A ground search began, with the help of neighbors, family members, the Knox City Police Department, and the Benjamin Volunteer Fire Department. Ricky Russell was called to bring

his K-9 to help, and Commissioner Homer's hands and King County Sheriff Jim Waller also participated in the search. Jim Cottingham of Petty Flying Service in Munday sent an airplane to fly over the area.

Many farmers and ranchers joined the hunt on horses, three-wheelers and four-wheelers, all very concerned about the missing elderly man.

According to Sheriff Carlson, they thought someone might have picked him up on the road, so they notified the Haskell and Seymour radio stations to broadcast the story.

The Department of Public Safety sent a helicopter out of Lubbock which arrived at approximately 11 a.m. Sheriff Carlson joined the chopper crew in their aerial search. The Sheriff said something bright yellow caught their attention, which turned out to be Mr. Miller's cap. He was lying in a ravine approximately 1 1/2 to 2 miles northwest of his home. The ground crew was notified and quickly headed for the specified location. Mr. Miller was found lying in shallow water and mud at the bottom of a ravine. He was cold, wet, and tired, but was awake and talking. No broken bones were found, but he had several scratches and bruises.

"I really believe that bright yellow ball cap saved his life," said Sheriff Carlson. Mr. Miller was wearing a light colored shirt and khaki pants, which blended in with the scenery and could have easily been missed, he said.

After his eleven hour ordeal, Mr. Miller was taken to the Sey-

mour hospital by the Munday crew of the Knox County Ambulance Service, where he was admitted.

"We are extremely grateful for all the help in finding Mr. Miller," stated Sheriff Mike Carlson. "Everyone did their part in the search, and this time it had a happy ending. He was very lucky."

Councilman candidate withdraws from race

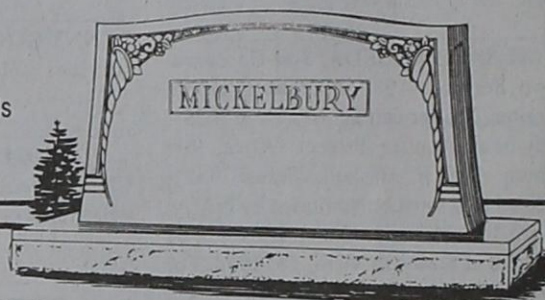
In the race for Munday city councilman, there will be two candidates instead of three to fill the two positions available.
