

## **Questions Answered At Town Hall Meeting**

Concerned citizens met with continue working on it, and I hope Congressman Bill Sarpaulius at a Town Hall Meeting Tuesday, August 24, at the Munday Chamber of Commerce office.

The Congressman discussed health care reform, economic growth, social security, the Reconciliation Bill or Deficit Reduction Bill.

Following his presentation, he

opened the floor for questions. One person in attendance expressed concern on the \$59 million cut in college grants. Sarpaulius replied, "We passed about 4 weeks ago a new education program where any kid can now go to college. The government will basically loan them the money. When they finish college, they can either pay that back either by money, or by community service. With that program in tact now, there's no need for another program."

He was also asked how the \$5 million cut on research building facilities would affect the local research station. "You probably won't see an increase as far as building more buildings, but I think we're going to be successful in hanging on to what we got," he replied.

EPA regulations on landfills was another subject brought up. Following a brief discussion, the Congressman added, "With my one vote, I'm trying every way I can to help you with it. We're going to

we're successful."

He closed the meeting by saying, "I respect those people who feel differently than the way I do, and the way I voted. The beautiful thing about this country is you're entitled to your own opinions. But I did what I thought was right, and I think it's worth the chance to try and make some of those changes. I hope it will work, but we'll never know unless we give it a try. There's those who complain about the government, but if you stop and think, I think we still have the best country in the world. We have a tendancy to always complain, and sometimes we forget to turn around and look at the blessings that we do have."

> According to Ronnie Ainsworth, Knox County Game Warden, the dove population is good right now, but should be better later in the month. Last week's rain has scattered the birds pretty much, so there probably won't be any fast and furious shooting going on the first day, but there is plenty of doves. He reminds local hunters that all shotguns must be plugged to a three-shot capacity.

Hunting licenses are mandatory, and may be purchased from Mr. Ainsworth in Knox City, the County Clerk's office and Bud Clower's bait shop in Benjamin, and at Snack 'n Tackle at Miller Creek Reservoir.

If you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are age 17 or over, you must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. If you are age 12-16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Children under 12 must also be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Proof of certification is required to be on the person while hunting. You do not have to show proof of

this certification to buy a license. If you have any questions concerning hunting regulations, you may contact Ainsworth at his Knox City residence.

The class will be doing several fund raisers to raise money for the Junior Senior Banquet, and other activities for the future.



## From A Carpenter's Son

My daughter is 16 months old. There isn't a door in our house she can't open, a container she can't get the lid off, or a cabinet she can't empty in five seconds flat. Anytime I call my wife from the office, our conversation is always interrupted by "No, don't", "stop it", and my personal favorite - "Courtni Elizabeth Whetsell!!!!!" And from what I have witnessed and been told, we have a *good* baby! Older parents, who are "inthe-know" about such things, give me the reassuring message "wait

till she starts talking!"

I, being a former nursery worker veteran, know exactly what they mean. What's the difference between a politician and a talkative two-and-a-half to three year old? Try as you might, you can never get the toddler to only say "no comment". They can talk a fencepost to death in record time.

There are several main reasons for this bent towards unceasing conversation. First, they have just learned the art of conversing verbally and are fascinated with this new toy. They want to try it out in every occasion that presents itself. Second, all children are born with the desire to grow up and to mature. They have learned that talking is a grown-up way to socialize. It's much more grown up than say, biting or randomly pulling on your parent's clothing.

But third, and I think most importantly, they are proud, proud of the new words they master every day, proud of the attention they can receive now if they 'turn up the volume', proud that they can talk to mommy and daddy the way mommy and daddy talk to each other.

And there is absolutely nothing wrong with any of that Eternal conversation is a small price to pay for the healthy development of these little minds. Even though from our past comes the phrase,

"Children should be seen and not heard!", most of us, with a few reasonable exceptions, would tend to disagree . . . or do we?

It just occurred to me that I can think of one group of children who ought to at least be seen before they are heard - God's children. There is entirely too much talking going on in the Body of Christ, especially for the slim amount of 'walking' that's being done.

Don't get me wrong, I am a strong advocate of personal verbal witness, especially when you have no other choice due to circumstances, i.e. the person is 'just passing through', etc . . . But most people have their best witness opportunities with their friends and co-workers, and in the words of Mike Wamke - "people aren't listenin' to hear Jesus, they're lookin' to see Him." In James 1:27, James writes "And this is what God considers to be pure and undefiled religion: to care for widows and orphans in their suffering, and to keep yourself from the corruption of this world."

One of the primary requirements for an authentic evangelistic witness, is a genuine love and concern for God's people, or in the words of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, "a passion for souls" and this is best demonstrated by our actions of love toward those we wish to win to Christ.

"What good is it to say to them, 'God bless you! Keep warm and eatwell," if you don't provide them any food or clothing? So it is when faith produces no actions. It is dead and worth nothing"
