Enrollment Figures Show Rise In Munday Schools

With the first week of school behind us, Munday ISD reports an increase in enrollment compared to last year's figures. They had 486 enrolled the first week of school, 21 more students than in

Doug Donoho, Munday Elementary principal, reports 286 in Pre-Kindergarten through sixth grade. Phil Hall, High School Principal, reports 200 in junior high and high school. The fifth grade has the largest class, with 45, and kindergarten has the smallest class with only 23 students. Class totals in elementary are: Pre-K, 35; Kindergarten, 23; first grade, 34; second grade, 42; third

grade, 34; fourth grade 36, fifth

grade, 45; and sixth grade, 37. Secondary school breakdown is: seventh grade, 30; eighth grade, 28; freshmen, 33; sophomores,

31; juniors and seniors, 39 each. The 1992-93 school year is officially underway, but hang in there kids, your first holiday is less than 2 weeks away, which is Monday, September 7, Labor Day.

Dove Season Opens Tuesday, September 1

Hunters, it's time to drag those shotguns out of the closet and get them cleaned up and ready for hunting because dove season opens Tuesday, September 1!

Hunting time will be 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. Daily bag limit will be 12, with the possession limit being 24 after the second day of the season.


According to Ronnie Ainsworth, Knox County Game Warden, the dove population is fair and pretty scattered over the county. The weather will be a main factor in how good the hunting will be on opening day. He reminds local hunters that all shotguns must be plugged to a threeshot capacity.

Hunting licenses are mandatory, and may be purchased from Mr. Ainsworth in Knox City, Snack 'n Tackle at Miller Creek Reservoir,

or at the county clerk's office in Benjamin.

If you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are age 17 or over, you must successfully complete a Hunter Education Training Course. If you are age 12 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Children under 12 must also be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Proof of certification is required to be on the person while hunting. You do not have to show proof of this certification to buy a

If you have any questions concerning hunting regulations, you may contact Ainsworth at his Knox City residence.



There is a rhythm in the pastoral ministry that I would recommend to anybody. In the mornings I ponder the Psalm for the week. I read it slowly so that I can feel the passion of the psalmist. She may be a pilgrim picking flowers in the barren desert as she journeys to the Temple to offer the flowers of her life to God (Psalm 84). Such passion guides me through a long week, giving thanks for the Methodist flowers God has planted me with, anticipating the strength we will share on Sunday.

In this week's Psalm (15), I read this morning what kind of conduct I should practice, if I expect

to enjoy worship on Sunday. Knowing that the Psalter is a prayer book, I try to pray the psalm in my own words and mood. Tomorrow I will use a different Bible translation, looking for new shades of meaning and guidance. Meeting God in the morning, through the psalmist, gives me strength to be a pastor.

One cannot be much of a pastor, though, holed up in the office all day. The strength of the Psalter is wasted unless it is shared. So, like all good pastors I journey outward in the afternoon to the homes of members, coffee shop, places of business, and hospitals. One discovers the real world in such places. There I am awed by the simple acts of caring, the gestures of friendship, real honesty, as well as the heavy burdens of suffering borne lightly by our community members. Jesus said, "The kingdom of God is in your midst". How can a person keep from believing when God is in the rhythm of our lives?





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

O: Is there a mistake in Matthew 27:9-10 which tells us that Jeremiah and not Zechariah, predicted the betrayal price of Jesus?

A: No, there is no mistake in this scripture nor any other place in the Bible.

Matthew 27 does, indeed, attribute this prophecy to the Old Testament writer of Jeremiah. Our only record of the prophecy is found in Zechariah 11:11-13. However, Zechariah noted that: "Are not these the words which the Lord proclaimed by the former prophets, when Jerusalem was inhabited . . .?" (Zechariah 7:7).

Zechariah was very familiar with the former prophets' writings, especially those of Jeremiah, and frequently quoted from these writings. In the 17 verses that make up Zechariah chapter 11, there are 10 known loose quotations from Jeremiah (verse 1: Jer. 22:6-7; v. 3: Jer. 25:36; Jer. 50:44; v. 5: Jer. 50:7; v. 6: Jer. 13:14; v. 9: Jer. 15:2; 43:11; v. 10: Jer. 14:21; v. 16: Jer. 23:2; v. 17: Jer. 23:1).

Verse 13 of this chapter is the only verse which is not a quotation from earlier prophets (that we have record of). Likely, Zechariah was quoting from one of Jeremiah's writings - or even a verbal prediction - that we do not have available, today. There are several books written by the apostles and prophets that are not available. These include: Jashar (2 Samuel 1:18); Acts of Solomon (1 Kings 11:41); Chronicles of Samuel, Chronicles of Nathan, Chronicles of Gad (1 Chronicles 29:29); Visions of Ahijah, Visions of Iddo (2 Chron. 9:29); Chron. of the Kings of Judah, Chron. of the Kings of Israel (1 Kings 14:19, 29); another Lamentations (2 Chron. 35:25); two more letters of Paul to the Corinthians (1 Cor. 5:9; 2 Cor. 2:4); Paul's letter to the Laodiceans (Colossians 4:16). And these are just the writings mentioned in the Bible

The only mistake, here, is that people today still betray Christ by declaring Him to be their Lord and then turning their backs on His Church.

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


