
LET'S TAKE CARE OF THEM The West Texas Utilities Company has a large crew of men here working on re-





There is one point about the bidding that frequently puzzles even the most bid a suit and the opponents have over-bid. With what type of hand should a payer raise his partner's bid? Due of the first points to notice is that no player has a justifiable raise for his rartner's suit bid unless he has at bonor. Lacking such holdings in the trump suit, a player should deny, not assist his partner's bid? Provided, how:

"Ability to trump some short or missing suit" is usually valued as follows A doubleton is worth 1/2 trick with 3 trumps and 1 trick with 4 trumps

"The fact that the supporting hand holds four or more cards of partner's suit or three to an honor," is usually valued as follows:

Three small trumps The ace or king	0	trick		~	
Four small trumps	1/2

Five small trumps Five trumps headed by an honor	11/2	"			

Two values must be placed on all high cards: First, their value in defense of opponents' bids. This is their sure trick value. Second, their value in sup-port of partner's best bid. The latter valuation is much higher than their sure trick valuation because the chance that they may be trumped is less, and the chances of setting up a suit is much the charces of setting up a suit is much stronger. Art of Starting, Going and Stopping By BILL BOGUS

All I know is what I read in the papers, and I just noticed where John N. Willys, president of The Willys-Overland Company, had just put out a big brother to that famous little Whippet Four-a Whippet Six, and I had figured all along that the only way they could improve on that little car was to just build a bigger one with more cylinders. And now, whether one wants a four or a six they can have it in a Whippet, which looks like it ought to solve this automobile buying problem for anybedy that's looking for transportation at a minimum cost, with all the comforts and other advantages that are provided in cars that cost much more.

I been looking over this Whippet line, and say, there's a real car-either one of them is more than a mile ahead of the nearest competition, not only in the matter of first cost, but in getting you over all kinds of roads for more miles per dollar. One of the big reasons for this is in the new ciling system that the engineers have worked out and put in this car. Everybody is familiar with the old fashioned splash system of getting oil to the crankshaft-it works just like throwing a can of oil on a tight bearing. Some of it might go down to the bearing if it isn't too tight, but when bearings get loose it's a mighty good idea to have them tightened. This Whippet has solved the oiling problem by forcing the oil through the crankshaft into the bearing when they are tight, and naturally this keeps them tight for there is little wear where there is an abundance of oil.

The Whippet is so small it can park in a spot that the fellow in the big car has passed up. It has that quick rightnow get-away that not big car possesses -speed galore-and of course when you get speed you feel more comfortable like

when you know you can stop, and for this purpose Mr. Willys has had brakes put on all four wheels, which enables the driver to stop with a dull thud. Since all the roads aren't built on the level this car is built to climb the steepest hills with surprising ease-and then stop when you're over on the down-hill grade.

And then, the engineers figured that there were not so many filling stations scattered along the roads and they have built a car that will give you about thirty miles per gallon of gasoline, and if it is mixed with corn-it's just too bad.

While it doesn't really seem possible to the price, this car also has radiator, fenders, upholstered seats, gas tank (located at the rear where is belongs). steering wheel, and a number of other little things that add to the convenience of driving the car. We're really surprised that so many things can be put together so well and then sold at the extremely low price at which the Whippet is sold. We just can't figure out why they didn't ask more for this car than they have, for they could have gotten it, and when folks realize just what they are getting for their money in this Whippet car they are going to give the factories a big run to keep up with the demand for them.

And everybody knows by now that the Whippet Willys-Knight line of cars are being sold in Munary by the Barman Mctor Company, a firm that has been here for a good many more years, and who will carry a full and complete line of parts and supplies as well as maintain an up-to-the-minute servicing department for Whippet and Willys-Knight owners.
