







## How to Play BRIDGE

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ARTICLE No. 19

There is one point about the bidding that frequently puzzles even the most experienced bridge players. Partner has bid a suit and the opponents have overbid. With what type of hand should a player raise his partner's bid?

One of the first points to notice is that no player has a justifiable raise for his partner's suit unless he has of at least three small trumps or two to an honor. Lacking such holdings in the trump suit, a player should deny, not assist his partner's bid. Provided, however, "ability to trump some short or missing suit" is usually valued as follows:

A doubleton is worth $\frac{1}{2}$ trick with 3 trumps and 1 trick with 4 trumps.	
A singleton " " 2 " " " " " " " "	
A blank suit " " 2 " " " " " " " "	

The fact that the supporting hand holds four or more cards of partner's suit or three to an honor, is usually valued as follows:

Three small trumps	0 trick
The ace or king	1 " "
The queen	$\frac{1}{2}$ " "
Four small trumps	1 " "
Four trumps headed by an honor	1 " " plus honor value
Five small trumps	$1\frac{1}{2}$ " "
Five trumps headed by an honor	2 " "

Two values must be placed on all high cards: First, their value in defense of opponents' bids. This is their sure trick value. Second, their value in support of partner's best bid. The latter valuation is much higher than their sure trick valuation because the chance that they may be trumped is less, and the chances of setting up a suit is much stronger. Their value as cards of recentry is also considerable. These additional values are practically double their sure trick value.

When a player makes a suit bid of one, he figures that his partner holds the possibility of at least three tricks in support of that bid. As a bid of one heart, for example, is a contract to take, in the two combined hands, seven out of the thirteen tricks, a player should hold in his own hand the possibility of taking at least four tricks with hearts as trumps. These four tricks added to the three expected to show up in the partner's hand compose the seven tricks contracted for when a player bids one heart. Since a bid of one in the suit included at least three expected tricks in his partner's hand, to raise once, partner must hold the probability of 4 tricks; to raise twice, partner must hold the probability of 5 tricks; to raise three times, partner must hold the probability of 6 tricks.

Study over this analysis very carefully, and if you thoroughly understand it you cannot help but find it much easier and simpler to decide the question as to when and how often you should raise your partner's suit bid.

Here is a neat little problem from one of our correspondents in Connecticut. Study the bidding carefully before you decide what to do. There are certain very definite principles of bidding connected with it that make it a most interesting problem.

Problem No. 20

A: Y  
B: Z

Hearts—Q  
Clubs—Q, J, 7, 6, 4  
Diamonds—7  
Spades—Q, 10, 8, 5, 4, 2

No score, rubber game. Z dealt and passed. A passed. Y bid one diamond and B bid one no-trump. Z bid two spades. A passed. Y bid three diamonds and B doubled. Z now bid three spades (a very bad bid by the way). A passed. Y bid four hearts and B doubled. What should Z do now? An analysis of this interesting hand will be given in the next article.

### Prohibition And The Automobile

It's easy to talk. So long as we have no intention of doing what we think others ought to do. It's easy to criticize. There is no other line of thought that requires so little backbone and brains as criticism. It's easy to stand around and tell the world what ought to be done. But it takes more moral cour-

age than the greater majority than we do. And a lot of us think we are really better than we are.

Just now our whole country is in a political turmoil. We have this same political epidemic every four years without fail. And I suppose it will continue to occur at the same intervals of time as long as our government lasts.

Several years ago the question of prohibition became one

of our political problems. Year after year the wets and the dries fought for political supremacy. And finally prohibition won the fight. The nation's great distillers were shut down and hundreds of thousands of saloon doors were closed. A terrible howl went up all over the country. The country was ruined some said. The saloon keepers would all starve to death because the government eliminated their business.

But so far have any of you noticed any headline in the daily papers announcing the fact that any saloon keeper and his family have ever starved to death because of losing his job? Instead of the majority of the saloon keepers starving to death they found better jobs. And they have been making a happier living since they lost their old job than when they had it. And not only that but thousands and hundreds of thousands of their old patrons are now living in homes of their own and supporting their families and sending their children to school every day in the year.

Oh yes, a few of the men and even women who believe in the old theory of the saloon have drifted out into the woods and the canyons and down along the river bottoms and are "still" operating. But they are not happy in their business. There is not a happy, proud bootlegger in this nation. No body is happy when he is doing something that he is ashamed of and that he has to hide from the laws of his country to do. And I sometimes wonder how many of us who talk so loud about the bootlegger know the real motive of his business. Most of them are trying to make some money and every other business seems over loaded. That's one motive at least. There are others.

But how many of us have studied the relation between prohibition and the automobile business. What effect has prohibition had on the automobile business? Statistics tell us that the people of the United States spend approximately \$8,000,000,000 annually on automobiles. How much of this eight billion dollars do you suppose used to be spent in the open saloon? And who got the benefit of that money? Did the wives and children of our drunkards get any pleasure out of the money spent at the saloon? Do you believe the automobile industry in all its branches is furnishing as many

men a job today as the saloon business did twenty-five years ago? If it is then how many people were thrown out of employment by the elimination of the saloon? This is not saying that all the saloon keepers and managers of distillers went into the automobile business. It is not saying that any of them did. But it takes about 20 many people to do the world's work and if the automobile business which has been developed almost entirely since the open saloon was forced out of business it furnished employment to an equal or greater number of home providers, then how can we argue that the nation has lost anything in an industrial way or a commercial way by getting rid of the saloon?

But there are other sides to the question. Which of these two national industries means the most joy and happiness and pleasure to the American homes? Now those three words, "joy, happiness and pleasure" may sound just alike. But they are not. It is a real joy to even look at a big pretty car. But it is a lot more happiness lies in it and real happiness lies in owning it, if you own it honestly.

And now the question that every sane voter should ask himself or herself is this: Has prohibition helped the automobile business? Has it made the automobile a safer means of

transportation? Or do you think we would all be just as safe in our cars out on the public highways if we allow the open saloon to come back into our country and turn everybody loose in both the saloon and the automobile if they choose to indulge in both. Would the women be safe out on the road? And no other thing invented has brought so much freedom and pleasure within the reach of the busy women of our land as the automobile. Would the children be safe on the road to school? Oh, we'd fine the drunk drivers! When? After the children were crippled or dead. And our policemen wouldn't have time to do a thing but keep the people out of the way of the drunk drivers if the open saloon were to return to the U. S. A.

If there were not another reason for keeping our country dry, the automobile is reason enough. Or shall we all give up our cars and wipe out the automobile business in order to make our country safe for the saloon and its advocates.

There are a thousand reasons why we should not allow our country to fall back into the "wet" column. And now is the time for every American citizen to do some sound, sensible, sane thinking. Now is the time to lay down every form of sentiment and prejudice in favor of a few people having their

own way for their own special gratification, and stand and vote together as one united, patriotic nation for the greatest good and the greatest safety and the most happiness for all the people.

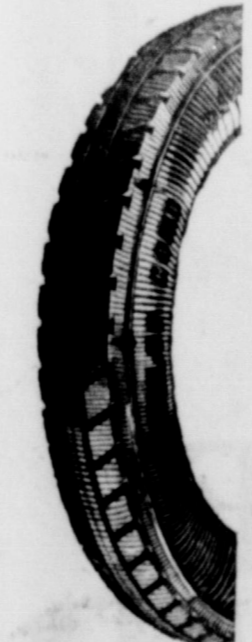

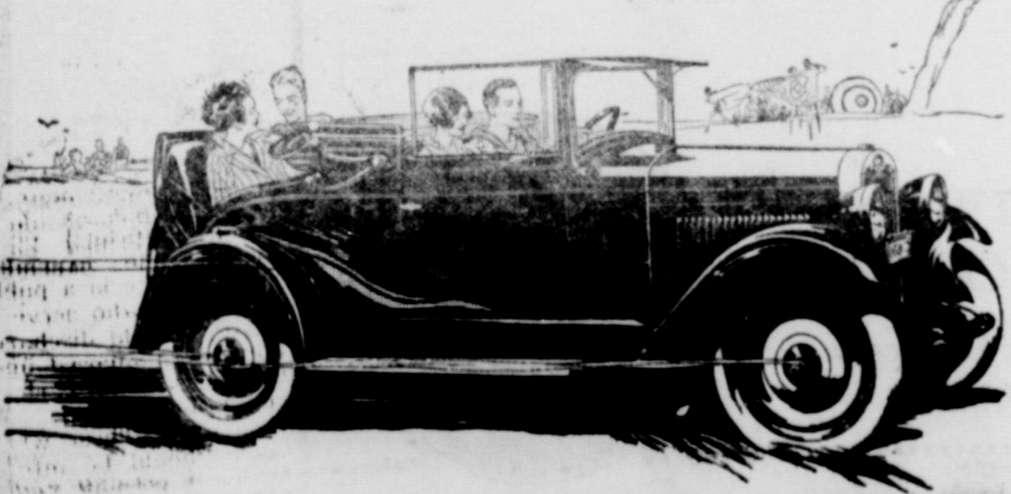

Title 34, Article 1609 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas specifically states that the Commissioners court of each county shall have published in a paper published in the county, at least one time each year, a financial statement of the county. This statement shall show the receipts and disbursements during the preceding four quarters and shall also show the credit or debit of each officer or other person with whom an account is kept. This statement shall show the indebtedness of the county.

This is just as much a law as any other law on the statute books. It is the duty of the officers to abide by the provision of this law as they do other laws. But in this county this has not been done. We say it has not been done because we get every paper published in the county and we believe we would be safe in saying we have not seen a financial statement of Knox county during the past four years.

The people of a county have a right to know just how the funds are being spent and the purpose for which taxes are being collected. We say this in defense of some criticism we have heard about county affairs. We are not charging that a single dollar has been collected that should not have been collected. Neither are we charging that a dollar has been spent in a way that was not to the best interest of the tax payers. We are saying, however, that we believe the people have a right to know how their money is being spent. Not only is that true, but the law requires that such statement be published in order that the people may know just how their tax money is being spent. We see no reason why this law should not be followed to the letter. We can't understand why the officers charged with this work would not be glad to have the people of the county have the information.

The Federal Government requires the National banks to publish statements at least four times each year. If this is good, why shouldn't school districts, cities and counties find it good to let the people who furnish the money in the form of taxes know just how their money is being spent. If the officers elected by the people are spending money in ways not authorized by law the people should know it. If the officers are doing anything, as they act for the tax payers, that they should not do, the people have a right to know it. If everything is being done just as it should be done, the people would be better satisfied to know it.—Goree Advocate.

Indeed those who handle the public's funds should keep the public informed on financial matters and expenditures. A public office is a public trust, and those who serve the tax-payers should discharge every obligation imposed upon them by law—and no part of their obligation is more important than this. Those who pay the taxes should be informed, as far as is possible and practical, just where and for what their money is spent. They should know to what extent the county is obligated.

We can see no reason why these reports should not be published quarterly—as the law provides. They are published in other Texas counties, and why not in Knox. How long could a State or National bank operate that refused or failed to comply with the law requiring that bank statements be published upon call?

There are more funds involved in county affairs than there is in all the banks of Knox county.

No individual business man would have employees operate a business without regular financial reports. Tax-paying citizens have a right to this same consideration—in fact, it is required by law—and this law is being ignored in Knox county Texas, and has been for the past seven years to our knowledge.

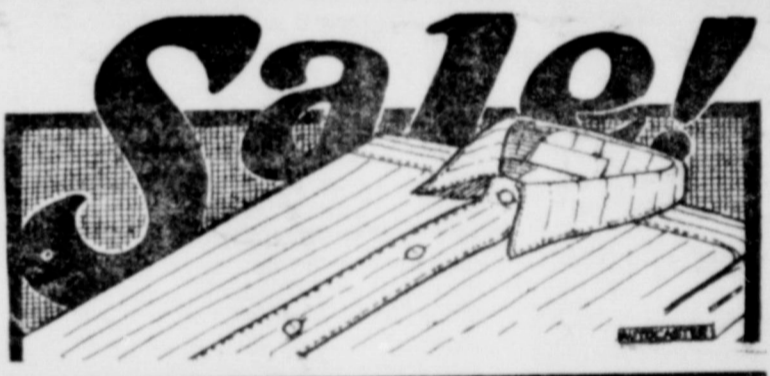
