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Primary Runoff Election Results

Voters went to the polls Tuesday, April 12, for the Primary Runoff Election. As a result, Precinct 2 has a new commissioner, as Jerry Parker defeated incumbent Bobby Roberson by seven votes. Parker received 158 votes to Roberson's 151.

In statewide runoff races, Richard Fisher won over Jim Mattox for United States Senator. Fisher received 336 votes to Mattox's 253 in the county. Fisher will face Republican Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison in the November election.

Texas Supreme Court Justice Raul A. Gonzalez, a Democrat, defeated René Haas state and county wide. He received 341 votes and Haas received 233 in the county.

In the Democratic runoff for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, Betty Marshall defeated Gene Kelly statewide. County voters favored Marshall by six votes with 265. Kelly received 259. Marshall will face Republican Sharon Keller in November, who defeated Sam Bayless in Tuesday's runoff.

Don Wittig defeated Pat Lykos in the Republican runoff for Attorney General, and will face Democratic Attorney General Dan Morales in the fall.

Visitors' bleachers being erected at football stadium

Construction on new visitors' bleachers at the Munday football field is scheduled to begin Wednesday, April 20. Work is being done by Southern Bleachers of Graham.

The Munday Little League took part of the old bleachers to the baseball field. The Young Farmers also removed a section for their use, and school personnel removed the remaining.

The new bleachers will provide seating for 450 people and will be handicapped accessible. Work should be completed within ten days.

Second PTO meeting to be held Thursday

Munday Elementary School Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) will hold their second general meeting Thursday, April 21, at 6 p.m. in the elementary cafeteria.

On the agenda will be the approval of by-laws and election of officers. Anyone interested may attend.

Uniform cotton planting date set

Knox County cotton producers met Tuesday, April 12, to vote on a uniform planting date. The date decided on was Monday, May 16.

Those attending were treated to a fried catfish meal sponsored by the Knox County Boll Weevil Association. Lindy Patton from Rolling Plains Cotton Growers presented a program on the Boll Weevil Eradication Process.

A uniform planting date is very important in controlling over-wintering Boll Weevils. A boll weevil can only survive a certain length of time without fresh bolls to feed on. If these are unavailable when they emerge from their winter homes, they will soon die.

There are several factors which help out in this. A cold dry winter will help reduce the number of weevils which survive the winter. A second factor is the date in which they

begin to over-winter. If the weevils begin over-wintering in October, they will come out earlier than if they begin to over-winter in December. Thus a later planting date will help control weevils.

Many farmers have the argument that a May 1 planting date will produce more cotton. This may be very well true. However, it requires more spraying for boll weevils which will cause more killing of beneficial insects and thus cause more secondary pest problems - budworm, bollworm, aphids, thrips, etc.

Some concern with the Boll Weevil Eradication is the cost. If the boll weevil has been suppressed due to cultural practices (i.e. uniform planting date) the cost of the boll weevil eradication may be somewhat lessened.

Stamford service awarded bid for garbage disposal

Under the terms of the contract, the City trash truck and dumpsters were sold to Triple C. They will collect the garbage and haul it to the Abilene landfill.

Current service will remain the same until otherwise notified. A rate adjustment will be necessary. The public will be informed when more information is made available.

Pesticide applicator training and testing Thursday, April 28

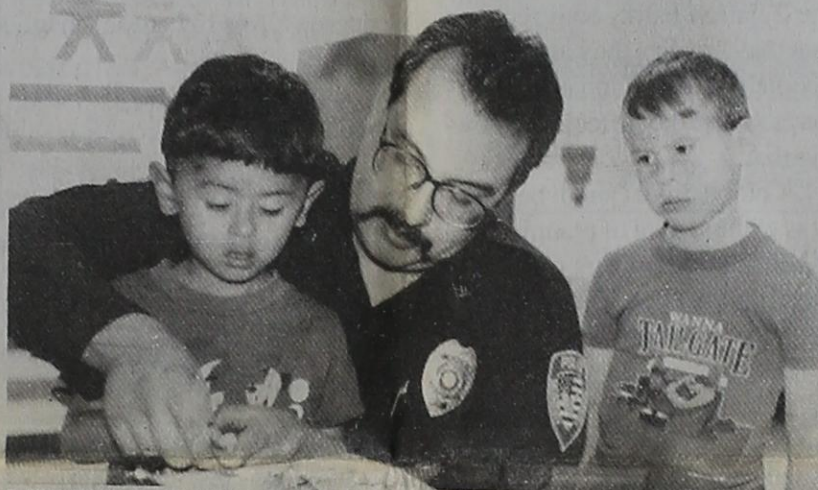
A course of training and testing for licensed private pesticide applicators will be conducted Thursday, April 28 at the Knight's of Columbus Hall in Rhineland.

There is no charge for the training and testing. If you wish to obtain a license the fee is \$50 and there is a \$10 charge for the training materials if you choose to keep them.

Children may now be registered for Pre-kindergarten

Children who will be four years old on or before September 1, 1994 may register for pre-kindergarten at Munday elementary school.

Before starting to school, a child must have:

1. A completed immunization record;
2. A birth certificate or record of birth; and
3. A social security number.

Pre-kindergarten will be offered in two sessions; a morning session and an afternoon session. Parents may request either morning or afternoon and an effort will be made to honor the request.

Munday Mayor has filed for write-in votes in upcoming election

In the upcoming city election, there will be a blank line on the ballot for a write-in candidate for mayor underneath Lawrence Fitzgerald's name. Incumbent Richard Albus has filed as a write-in candidate.

The rules have changed from past elections. Voters can only write the name of a candidate who has filed as a write-in, not anyone they choose. In other words, you may vote for Lawrence (Larry) Fitzgerald by checking the square beside his name, or you may write in Richard Albus on the blank line. If someone else's name is written on the line, the vote will not count.

The City Election will be held May 7.

District Championship slips away for Moguettes; Moguls place third

Missed it by that much! Both the Munday Moguls and Moguettes were points away from winning the District 2-A track championships. The Moguettes finished second with 133 points behind District Champion, Petersburg, with 140. Winning the Boys Championship was Spur with 105 followed by a close second and third in Petersburg with 98 and Munday with 96.

The Girls Championship came, down to the final race, 1600 relay, with Munday trailing Petersburg 117 to 120. The team that won the relay would win the title. Petersburg slightly outran the Moguettes with a time of 4:26.12 to Munday's 4:27.33.

The Moguls were edged out of the district runner-up spot in the 1600 relay. Running their best time of the year by almost five seconds, the Moguls placed second behind Paducah (3:33.76) by

less than a second with a time of 3:34.20.

Record number of donors show up for Bloodmobile

The American Red Cross Bloodmobile came to Munday April 11, and was greeted by 55 blood donors, the most this community has had in several years.

The Red Cross team of nurses praised the wonderful turnout, but regretted that the absence of a nurse caused an unusually long wait for the donors. However, they appreciated the patience and politeness of every donor.

Every unit of blood is very important due to the fact that the demand for donors has tripled in the last ten years. Medical advances such as chemotherapy, organ transplants, and heart surgery have resulted in an increased use of blood and blood components.

Insurance company reports indicate that 99% of all people who live to the age of 72 use blood components at least once in their lifetime. Thanks to volunteer blood donors, patients using blood in a hospital serviced by the American Red Cross receive all the blood products they need without being required to replace it or pay a replacement fee. There is no charge for the blood product itself.

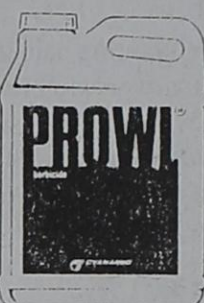
which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

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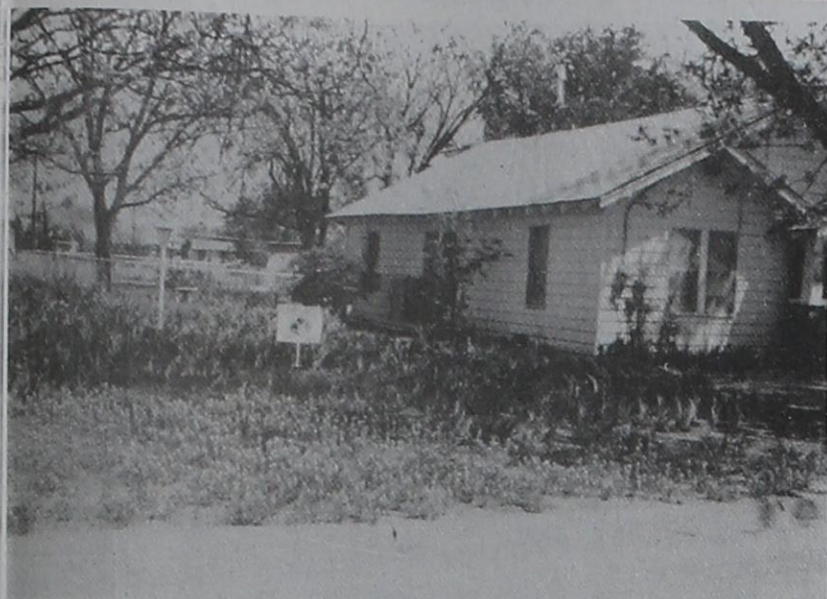

Commissioners to hold public hearing on hormone herbicides

Knox County is a Hormone Herbicide Regulated County. These hormone herbicides can be used year-round in the northwestern part of the county, but in the cotton areas it is regulated to non-cotton growing months.

When this regulation was first developed for Knox County an April 1st deadline was established to protect vegetables. Vegetable crops are slowly being phased out of Knox County and some of the wheat producers would like to utilize hormone herbicides in April.

To change the deadline the Commissioners Court must hold a public hearing. This public hearing will be conducted Monday, May 9 at 10:30 a.m. in the courthouse in Benjamin.

Anyone wishing to voice their opinion in favor or against any changes will need to attend. The Commissioners would like to take care of this item so any changes may be put into effect for 1995.

License/certificate required to purchase and apply restricted use pesticides

Hormone herbicides are just a few of the restricted use pesticides. Anyone wishing to purchase a restricted use or state limited use pesticide must have a pesticide license/certificate.

What is the difference between a certificate and a license? A certificate allows an individual to purchase and apply restricted use or state limited use pesticides, while a license will allow an individual to purchase, apply and oversee the application of a product.

In simpler terms, if you wish to purchase a pesticide and have someone else apply that product, by law you need a license and not a certificate.

Anyone interested in testing for a private applicators license can do so Thursday, April 28, here in Knox County. The location is not finalized.

For those who have a license/

certificate you must acquire CEU's (continuing education units). How many and by when? This answer is a big DEPENDS.

Anyone who has a certificate issued before January 1989 is required to have 15 CEU's by December 31, 1995. If a certificate owner wished to supervise the application, you must be retested and the 15 CEU's are not required until after being retested.

For those who have a certificate issued January 1989 through December 1989 (numbers 158,533 to 166,895) must be retested. It is not necessary to acquire CEU's. Once these retests are completed, and for those who have a license issued on or after January 1990, 15 CEU's must be acquired in five years (before the license expires).

If you would like to find out how many CEU's you currently have, give Elizabeth Perkins a call at TDA at (512) 475-1657. It is wise to keep count of all CEU's which have been taken. The certificates given at these programs are your proof of completion if TDA accidentally loses your records -- it has happened.

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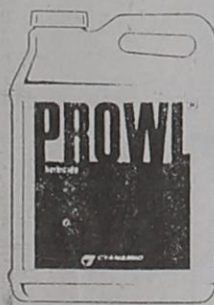

shopping techniques.

Participants will model their creations in a public fashion show at 6:15 p.m. in the auditorium. West Texas Utilities Company and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are sponsors, and WTU will host a meal for the 4-H participants. Cotton awards will be presented in all divisions by the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers.

Each Senior contestant will compete in one of four categories in the Construction Division and four categories in the Buying Division: Casual, Dressy, Formal or Specialty Wear.

Intermediate contestants will compete in the Buying Division or in Casual, Dressy Formal or Specialty Wear in the Construction Division.

Junior contestants will compete in the Pop-Over Skirt or Pant, Dressy, Specialty or Casual Wear in the Construction Division or in the Buying Division. Special awards will be presented to the Senior, Intermediate and Junior exhibiting the best cotton garment or ensemble and the one modeling the best wool or mohair outfit.

Senior, Intermediate and Junior contestants will be judged in separate groups and compete for awards in their own skill classification. Only the Senior winners advance to the State contest.

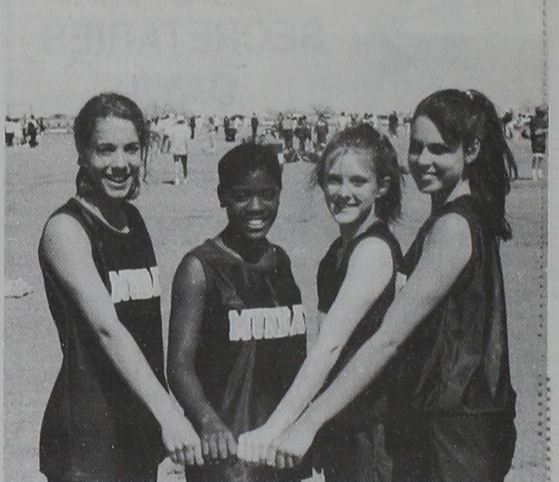

New emergency room equipment purchased

The Knox County Hospital has received several new pieces of equipment for their emergency room, purchased by the Ladies Auxiliary.

The new Dinamap Vital Sign Monitor gives a digital readout of a patient's blood pressure and pulse rate. It can be set at time intervals to give quick readings at a glance, say every 15 minutes, while the doctor or nurse is working on the patient.

The new Lifepak 9 Monitor Defibrillator monitors the heart-beat. If the rhythm becomes irregular or stops, the external pacemaker will shock the heart to get it beating regular again until the patient can be transferred for surgery.

Another new item is the Pulse Oximeter which measures the oxygen concentration of the blood. You don't have to be pricked with a needle; a small device is clipped

on your finger and the doctor or nurse can keep a check on your oxygen level.

A portable X-ray machine, which has been nicknamed "Howard" by the hospital personnel, and an ER Trauma Stretcher has also been purchased. The new stretcher is larger and more comfortable, and can be rolled anywhere needed or put in several different positions. The old one was really outdated, but is being kept as a backup.

With so many people in Knox County having heart problems, this new equipment will be a great asset to patients and hospital personnel.

Medicine and cardiac care has progressed at an astonishing rate. It is important for the nurses and doctors to keep up-to-date with these advances. Presently RNs, LVNs and Paramedics are taking a 32 hour course in EKG interpre-

tation. An RN from Abilene Regional is teaching the course each Monday. Participants are being taught how to read and understand the cardiac monitor and tell what type of irregular heart rate the patient is having.

Knowing that the Knox County Hospital has modern equipment, and personnel who know how to use it, should make us all "breathe a little easier."

Family/community education meeting held in Seymour

Rolling Plains Family and Community Education (FCE) and formerly Extension Homemakers held their annual District meeting on Wednesday, April 13. Delegates from twenty-five counties in the Rolling Plains area met in the First Baptist Church in Seymour.

Attending from Knox County were: Frances Cook and Lula Baty of Gilliland, Eileen Rolo of Knox City, and Jane Rowan, county extension agent.

The program included Johnnie Messer, Texas Association for Family and Community Education (TAFCE) treasurer, who brought a message from the TAFCE board. Also featured were workshops including a TAFCE Resource Room, Wearable Art, and Family Rap; Critical TV Viewing.

Approximately 130 members of the FCE clubs in the Rolling Plains District attended. The purpose of organized FCE clubs is to improve family living, develop leadership skills and to improve human rights. Texas Association for Family and Community Education is a part of the National Association for Family and Community Education, County Women's Council, and the Associated Country Women of the World. They are the largest organization of women in the world.

TAFCE clubs are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System.

If you go down to the coffee shops here in Knox County you will hear a familiar refrain, "Boy we sure could use some rain." Of course as any good farmer can tell you, there are very few times when we don't need rain here, and now is definitely not one of those times.

I read in the paper that the folks in Winters, Texas, had a special community prayer service to ask for rain. It worked. In less than 24 hours they received half an inch (never look a gift horse in the mouth).

You know, there are a lot of times in our lives when we feel hot and dry, spiritually. We don't know how or why, only that we go to the well and the water sometimes just isn't there. It's easy for us, at times like this, to become disappointed with God, or question our faith.

Believe it or not, I went through a pretty dry period myself, right after Easter. I wasn't so much questioning God, (which I believe He doesn't mind as much as some folks would have you believe) as I was questioning my faith, and even my calling. I tell you this because I want you to know that its ok for Christians to doubt sometimes. Everybody does. But God knows and understands this. The Bible is full of stories of people living out their faith authentically, struggling to overcome fears, having moments of doubt, and stepping out onto the water again, so to speak.

The trick is to not give up. Don't lose hope. Just because the well may be dry now, doesn't mean it will be dry forever.

A wise old man I knew once said these words about a drought that had lasted all summer long. "It has rained before. It will rain again." He did not give God any deadlines or ultimatums. He sim-

ply trusted in God's ability to be true to His own nature.

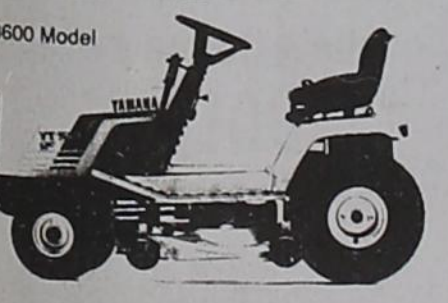

April designated Child Abuse Prevention Awareness Month

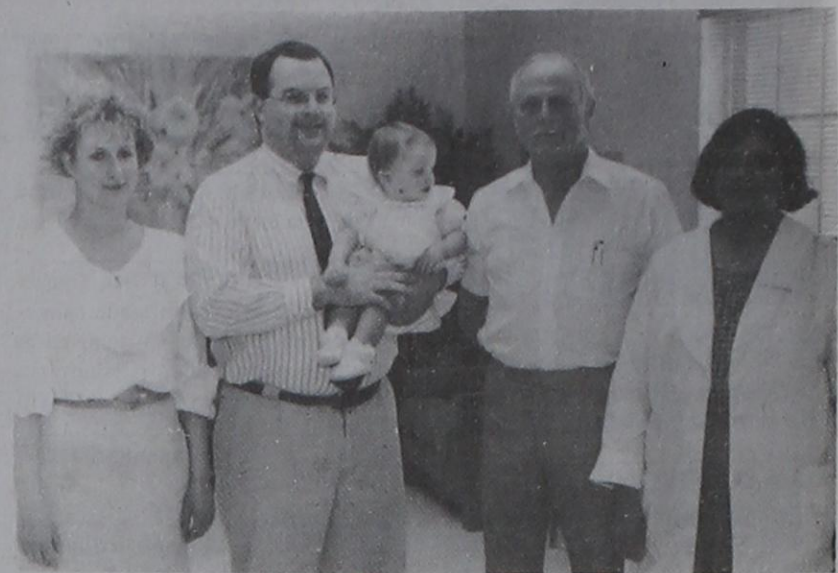
The Knox County Child Welfare Board has actively participated in a program designed to make the public aware that the month of April is Child Abuse Prevention Awareness Month.

Harmon Cable signs agreement with Fox Broadcast affiliate

Harmon Cable Communication announced recently that an agreement has been signed with Fox Broadcasting to continue carriage of KJTL-TV, the Fox broadcast affiliate from Wichita Falls. The agreement assures carriage of the station through 1996. KJTL is carried on Harmon Cable channel 8.

With the uninterrupted coverage of the Fox station, Harmon Cable customers will be able to watch the NFC football games this fall, along with other quality Fox programming. Fox Broadcasting will take over the NFC package from CBS beginning with the pre-season in August.

Harmon Cable General Manager, Gus Cagle. "We are, however, still pursuing carriage for Stamford, Haskell and Rule." Currently there is no local broadcast station close enough to provide a quality signal to these communities.
