Police department plans more citations for traffic violations

The January monthly council meeting was very beneficial to the Munday Police Department and the entire city. The yearly police report made the council aware of some major traffic problems throughout the city, and agreed if drastic measures, (citations), were not taken, the number of accidents for the past year would more than double for the upcoming year.

Three major areas of concern: (1) Speeding- Speed limits are posted all over the city. Residential area streets are all 30 mph speed limits. During a regular school day, 7:30 a.m. till 4:00p.m., all day, the speed limit is 20 mph on all streets around the school. The only exception is Main Street, the speed limit is 30 mph for westbound traffic, 35 mph for eastbound and 20 mph both directions when school lights are flashing. (2) Stop signs- What's the big hurry? Definition of stop- A complete cessation from movement. When approaching a stop intersection indicated by a stop sign, you shall stop before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection or, in the event there is no crosswalk, shall stop at a clearly marked stop line, if none, then at the point nearest the intersecting roadway where you have a view of approaching traffic on the intersecting roadway. Which on Munday's many streets means, stop with the front end of your vehicle even with the stop sign. After your complete stop, slowly roll forward and proceed when

safe to do so. (3) Seat Belts- If you are 15 years old and older you are responsible if you are caught not wearing your safety belt. If you are the driver, you are responsible for anyone under the age of 15 that is not wearing a seat belt while riding with you. A child younger than 2 years old must ride in a safety seat, not in Mom's lap or standing in the front seat, like so many do in the school zone every morning and throughout the city.

I apologize for the lack of sympathy for the crying parent of the child that just went flying through the windshield because of the uncaring or laziness of that parent, grandparent or guardian. The council and myself do not apologize for any measures taken to insure the safety of the city's law abiding citizens.

I, Chief Tejada, respectfully request any and all assistance, including advice on how to make the City of Munday a safer place. Thank you.

City Council meets in session on January 10

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met January 10, 1995, in regular session at Munday City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Members present were Mayor Richard Albus and council members Winters Mathews, Danny Owens, Jessie Andrade and Sherri Morren. Absent was Gary Tidwell.

Mayor Albus called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. and ordered the reading of previous minutes. Minutes of the December 13 regular meeting were read. Motion by Owens and seconded by Mathews to approve minutes as read. Motion carried.

The local cable reception and the recent adjustment were discussed. Several calls have been received at City Hall regarding this matter. Mayor Albus instructed City Administrator Jim Slayton to contact Harmon Cable to request they attend the next regularly scheduled Council meeting to further discuss these problems.

Dan Offutt met with the Council requesting the extension of the sewer line to his property. The Council authorized the Mayor and City Administrator to further investigate the extension and to report back to the Council.

Winters Mathews reported to the Council on behalf of Munday

Housing Authority on HUD Section 8 Housing. An application is being considered by MHA. The City has a cap on the number of units that MHA can oversee. The City would have to raise the cap for MHA to pursue this matter. Motion by Owens and seconded by Mathews to raise the cap by 50 additional units. Motion carried.

Bids were received regarding a motor grader. One bid was received from Stevens and Martin Paving of Abilene for \$18,000.00 for a 1981 Galion. After discussion, Owens moved to reject all bids for the purchase of a motor grader. Seconded by Morren. Motion carried. One bid was received from Ed Murphy for \$1,253.01 for the sale of the 1969 Galion motor grader currently owned by the City. Due to the bid amount and the fact that the City did not purchase a replacement motor grader, Owens moved to reject all bids. Seconded by Mathews. Motion carried.

Employee reports were given. No action was required.

The monthly financial report was given. Motion by Andrade and seconded by Owens to accept and approve. Motion carried.

Motion by Owens and seconded by Morren to adjourn at 9:30 p.m. Motion carried.

Munday band directors are recognized state-wide

Rodney Bennett and his wife, Marilyn, march to the beat of the same drummer each day at school.

That's because they work together. He is the band director and she is the assistant band director for Munday High School.

"We balance each other out quite well," Rodney says. "Things that drive me berserk, she can handle and vice versa.

"We think alike. I'll start to say something to a kid and she'll finish the statement," he says.

Under the Bennetts' direction, the Purple Cloud Band has received numerous honors, including being named the Class A State Honor Band last year by the Texas Music Educators Association. It has been a top five finalist in the UIL state marching contest four times, and won UIL Sweepstakes awards eight times.

This is Rodney's 13th year as band director. Marilyn is in her fifth year as assistant band director and elementary music teacher.

Before his wife joined him in Munday, Rodney commuted from Wichita Falls -- 75 miles away. His first six weeks on the job, he says, he put 9,000 miles on his car.

Their son, Ronnie Whitfield, was the catalyst in getting them to teach together, Marilyn says. He attended Wichita Falls Rider High School for six weeks before deciding that he wanted to go to a smaller school -- in particular, Munday. He and Rodney took up residence four nights a week in a Munday motel until Marilyn landed her job.

The Bennetts, who went to high school together, have been married 14 years. They played together for one semester in the Midwestern State University

band, but this is their first time to teach together.

Both developed a love for music in junior high. He started on the bass trombone and she began playing the oboe.

"I knew from the time I picked up a horn in junior high what I wanted to do," he says.

He was a double major in college, earning bachelor's degrees in music education and performance.

"Until I did my student teaching, I was going to be a performer," he says.

He had performed for two years in the 1st Division Marine Band before enrolling in Midwestern.

Marilyn says, "In elementary school I knew I wanted to teach, and in junior high I knew that I wanted to teach music."

Marilyn teaches nearly every child in the school district, except pre-kindergarten. She works with all the elementary students in music classes, plus she assists with all the band students in the junior high and high school. And most of the students are in band. The high school band has 91 students, 73 are in the junior high band and 34 in the fifth-grade band.

"I can't think of another job that I would have as much fun at as this one," Marilyn says.

And working together makes their jobs much more fun, both say.


Mr. Hertel was born October 31, 1932, in Rhineland. He married Glenda Coffman on September 12, 1954, in Rhineland. He was raised there and attended

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Reminder To Taxpayers

January 31, 1995

IS THE LAST DAY TO PAY YOUR 1994 TAXES AND AVOID THE ADDITIONAL PENALTY AND INTEREST CHARGES

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1995. However, if you became 65 after January 1, 1994, and before January 1, 1995, you need to apply for the additional over 65, \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser Stanton Brown, between the dates of January 1, 1995 and May 1, 1995. These exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County Courthouse.

AG-USE EXEMPTIONS

Annual applications for qualifying land for agriculture use is not required. If you have been receiving the AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1995 and May 1, 1995.

DISABLED VETERANS EXEMPTION

These exemptions need to be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1994 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1995. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1995 and May 1, 1995.

RENTITIONS


Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions is between January 1, 1995 and April 1, 1995.

A popular word in health care in the last few years is "wellness". Where once we talked about "good health" or "feeling good", now our concern is "wellness". What exactly does the concept of wellness encompass?



The cold war

Ready your battle stations: Cold season from sudden changes in the weather, sitting in a draft, going outside in the cold with wet hair or without a hat, or even by working too hard.

So how do you catch a cold? By catching a virus. In fact, at least 200 different viruses are known to cause colds.

A cold virus attacks through the upper passages of the nose, entering the body either directly through the nose or through the eyes by way of the tear ducts, which empty into the nasal passages.

It usually makes its presence known in the throat first. This is why many people, upon feeling that distinctively scratchy throat, know it's time to stock up on tissues.

The body, however, does not take lightly to this assault. It quickly sets off a counterattack, and it does this by releasing chemicals that cause inflammation and swelling of the infected tissues, thus creating those typical cold symptoms we all recognize: stuffed-up nose, chills, cough, aches, and a runny nose. So, the annoying symptoms that distinguish a cold are nothing more than the body's defenses against the cold virus.

Unlike the flu virus, a cold virus is not usually spread by coughs and sneezes. Rather, a cold virus is nearly always spread from the nose to the hand of the infected person, and then from the hand to the nose of a vulnerable person. In this chain of infection, there is often a go-between, such as a doorknob or a telephone. This is why hand washing is important.

Hand to hand combat

Just to complicate matters, colds are most easily spread the day before symptoms appear and during the first two days of symptoms. So unfortunately, you can

hands with warm water for at least 10 seconds, and rinse. (And toss out those used tissues!)

Clean up spills on no-wax floors as soon as you notice them. Spills can permanently discolor the floor if they penetrate the "wear layer" or cause it to change chemically.

To wipe up stubborn spills, add diluted floor cleaner to a dampened cloth or sponge before wiping.

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
