## Millers Creek will be the place to fish for crappie

The Inland Fisheries Branch of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) recently stocked 6,541 white crappie in Millers Creek reservoir. The fish were from 3 to 7 inches long when stocked. This is larger than the 1.5 inch fingerlings which are usually stocked by TPWD, therefore biologists expect more of the Millers Creek fish to survive to maturity.

Fisheries surveys conducted by TPWD on Millers Creek in 1993 indicated good numbers of legal sized crappie (over 10 inches), however, production of young was poor in 1993. The stocked fish should supplement the 1993 year class and insure that good numbers of legal sized crappie will be available to anglers in the future. A typical crappie in Millers Creek reaches 10 inches in length in 3 years. Since the stocked fish were

already 3 to 7 inches long, the majority of them should reach 10 inches sometime in late 1995 or 1996.

Millers Creek is a productive reservoir that provides quality angling for many people in North Texas. TPWD biologists will continue to manage this fishery to maximize the recreational angling potential of the lake.

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## Additional TAAS Tests to be given

An additional administration of the exit level Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) is being provided for graduating seniors and out-of-school individuals who have not passed the TAAS Exit Test but have met all other graduation requirements.

Out of school examinees are required to contact their school district or education service center by April 22 to reserve a place for testing.

The writing test will be administered May 5, the reading test May 6, and the math test May 9. Testing will begin at 8:30 a.m. in the Munday, Goree, Benjamin and Knox City high schools.

Morris of Crosbyton was reelected to a three year term as director on the Board of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association in the Stockholders Annual Meetings held in Childress on Thursday, April 7, and Stamford on Friday, April 8. Other board members are Garon B. Tidwell of Munday, Dan Henard Jr. of Wellington, Dean Turner of Matador, Keith Corzine of Stamford and Jack Reese of Abilene.

Alvin Ulmer of Sagerton was recognized as a 50-year PCA member in the Stamford session. In appreciation Bobby Sosolik, Munday Branch Office Manager, joined by Mike Guess, Stamford Branch Office Manager, presented a plaque to Mr. Ulmer.

Director Corzine gave the Board Report to the gathering. Earning the highest rating possible by the Tenth District Regulator for the sixth consecutive year, the Association maintains its Tier I designation. The award is based on continued strength in capital, asset quality, management, earnings and liquidity.

The Association made a net profit after taxes of \$946,299 again making a profit for the 59th year of its 60-year existence. In 1993 Rolling Plains Production Credit Association loaned more than \$102 million to approximately 730 borrowers in its 19-county territory. The strength of the member-owned PCA is reflected in the character and management ability of its borrowers.

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## April Sales Tax Rebates delivered

A total of \$113.3 million in April sales tax rebates was delivered by State Comptroller John Sharp to 979 Texas cities and 111 counties, a 14.4 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

"Texas cities received \$101.9 million, an impressive 14 percent increase above last year's \$89.3 million," Sharp said. "The rebates of \$11.4 million to Texas counties reflect an equally encouraging 18.1 percent increase over the \$9.6 million payments in April 1993.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

The City of Munday received \$3,521.74 down 31.08% from \$5,109.91 in April 1993. Payments to date for 1994 total \$23,513.46 down 8.76% from 1993.

**PROGRAM SIGNUP**

The final day to sign up into the 1994 ARP program is April 29, 1994. This includes all program crops - wheat, barley, oats, feed grains and cotton. If you plan to participate in the program, please call us at 817-658-3537 to schedule an appointment.

**SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICATIONS**

The deadline to certify small grain crops in Knox County is May 15, 1994. Any small grains that were planted, whether for grain or for cover on ACR, CUPAY or CUPCP, must be certified. Also, if you have any acreage that has failed, you must certify it and file an ASCS-574, Application for Disaster Credit, before putting that acreage to any other use.

**NEW IFM PROVISIONS**

Sesame and Guar can now be planted and harvested on acreage enrolled in the Integrated Farm Management Program (IFM). This must be incorporated into your IFM plan; therefore, contact SCS if you are interested in planting these crops on acreage enrolled in this program.

**NON HAYING & GRAZING PERIOD**

The 5 month Non Haying and Grazing Period of ACR and CUPAY acreage for Knox County is June 1 through October 31, 1994.

## "On A Wizer Note"

With cattle being a strong part of Knox County Agriculture, the Texas Agriculture Extension Service Ranch to Rail program may be of interest to area ranchers.

This program allows ranchers to follow their calves through the feedlot and slaughter process. This will notify the producer of how their stock compares to what the beef industry and consumers prefer.

The Ranch and Rail program is conducted in Amarillo and Kingsville. For those interested in more information on this program a field day has been scheduled for May 3 in Kingsville and May 9 and May 10 in Amarillo.

Ranchers in the Rolling Plains must be successful "Range Managers" in order to provide enough forage to produce beef cattle. There will be a Youth Range Workshop conducted June 26 - July 1 at the Texas Tech University Center in Junction.

This workshop is open to youth ages 15-17 and will cost \$150. Each county may submit one 4-H and one FFA delegate.

If interested in this workshop please notify your Ag. Science teacher or the Knox County Extension office before Friday.

There are many other youth activities that will take place in the near future. Information on two youth rodeos - one in Quanah the other in Jacksboro. More information is available if requested.

Now let's bounce the ball off a different wall and move out to the yard. Several ladies have asked if it is okay to plant flowers and gardens now. That depends on if we get another freeze. Hopefully, the last freeze has already come and gone.

If annual flowers are your concern here is some information which may prove beneficial. Now is the time to be planing annuals in most parts of the state. But before putting seeds in the ground you need to know the two distinct categories of annuals - those that do well in cooler weather and

those that enjoy hot temperatures.

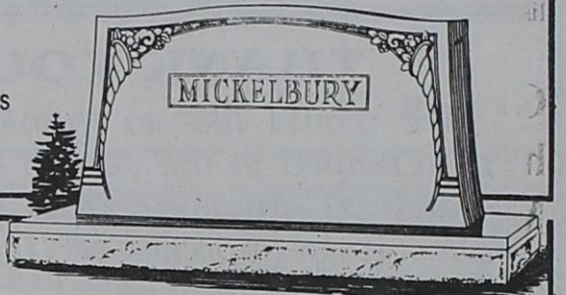
Early spring annuals, like petunias, marigolds and salvia, do very well until daytime temperatures consistently reach the 90's and 100's. But periwinkle, vinca, lantana and other summer annuals may develop root diseases if they are planted before soil temperatures reach 70 degrees.

Soil preparation is probably the most important factor in planting flowers. This may include adding one or two pounds of a completely balanced fertilizer per one hundred square feet.

If planting flowers be prepared to protect them from cold weather should it arise. This may not be likely but is still possible.

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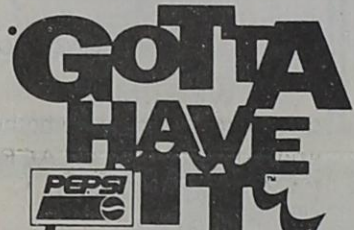
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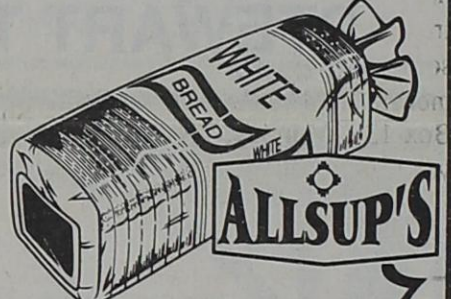
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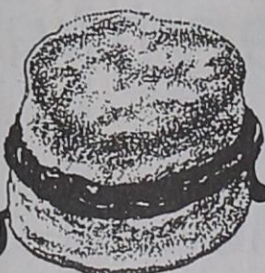
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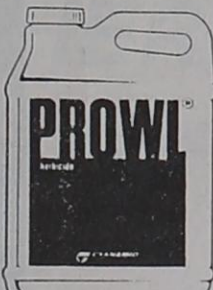

## Is it time to check your Pivot System?

As planting time for cotton and peanuts is fast approaching, remember the Seymour Aquifer Project office conducts irrigation efficiency tests on center pivot systems for producers in the area.

The first step in determining the efficiency of a center pivot is finding out the gallons per minute (gpm) being pumped through the system. This is done by using an ultrasonic flowmeter. A sensing bar is attached to the main line of the pivot and the flowmeter reads the gmp being pumped through the system using soundwaves.

Catch cups are placed along the length of the system and the average application is determined after the system passes over the catch cups.

The amount of water pumped through the system is compared to

the amount caught in the cups to calculate the application efficiency of the system.

The pattern efficiency compares the least amount of water pumped on one-fourth of the field to the average amount of water applied to the field. This determines the uniformity of water applied by the system.

The system efficiency compares the amount of water pumped to the low one-fourth of the field.

Worn or plugged nozzles, or operating at other than the designed pressure or gallonage can reduce the efficiency of an irrigation system.

Children need a healthy start

### Establish good eating habits early in life

Most parents know, it is not always easy getting toddlers and preschoolers to eat nutritious foods, especially when many of today's foods come in fun-filled packages -- all made to delight a child's taste buds.

Ensuring that young children have a healthy start is one of the most important responsibilities you have as a parent. Today's parents and other care providers face major challenges in feeding young children.

The erratic eating behaviors of toddlers and preschoolers, social changes that place increased demands on parents' time, and recent emphasis on the relationship between diet and health, all contribute to parents' anxiety about feeding young children.

What Constitutes a Good Diet? After the first year, children do not need a special diet that is different from the rest of the family. Toddlers and preschoolers can eat the same foods as other family members if they are soft, moist, and easy to chew.

It is the variety of food, not the amount that counts. Dietary variety is the key to preventing nutrient deficiencies. Nutrients of special concern include fat, iron, calcium and zinc.

Several federal and health professional organizations recommend that all children over two years of age reduce their dietary fat intake to no more than 30 percent of total daily calories.

A diet containing 30 percent of calories as fat can support normal growth and development during childhood, provided that careful food selections are made and nutrient-rich foods such as meat and dairy products are included in the diet.

Child nutrition experts agree that a sufficient diet for a child would include a variety of foods from the major food groups -- bread and cereal, vegetable, fruit, meat and dairy.

It is hard to know exactly how much food children need for normal growth. Preschool children and toddlers need the same vari-

ety of foods as older family members do, but they need smaller servings.

A good rule of thumb is one tablespoon of food for each year of a child's age. The following recommendations can be used as a guide for your meal plan:

\*Milk Group -- 2 to 4 servings daily. One serving = 1/2 to 1 cup.

\*Meat Group -- 2 to 3 servings daily. One serving = 1 tablespoon for each year of a child's age.

\*Vegetable Group -- 3 to 5 servings daily. One serving = 1 tablespoon for each year of a child's age.

\*Fruit Group -- 2 to 4 servings daily. One serving = 1 tablespoon for each year of a child's age.

\*Bread and Cereal Group -- 6 or more servings daily. One serving = 1/4 slice of bread for each year of age until age four. One serving of cereal = 1 tablespoon for each year of life.

These amounts are only guidelines to go by. Some very active children may need slightly larger servings.

Sweets and fats should be limited. These foods provide calories and little else nutritionally.

The easiest way to establish good eating habits in children is to set a good example yourself, and to provide a variety of healthful food choices. For additional information regarding children and nutrition, contact the Knox County Extension office at 454-2651.

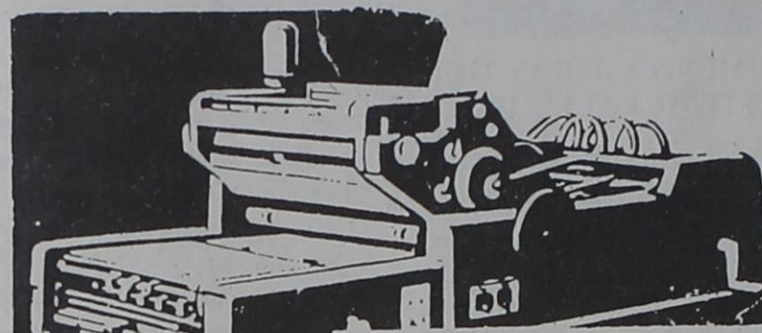

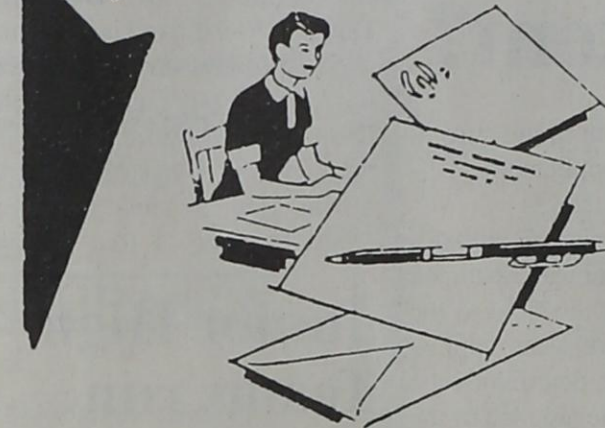

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## Solid Waste Management for cities and agriculture addressed

Agriculture's role in solving problems related to solid waste management will be the topic of a meeting on April 20 at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in Vernon.

"Municipalities generate organic residuals through the processing of wastewater, commonly referred to as biosolids, and collection of recyclable paper," said Harold Wiedemann, agricultural engineer at the Vernon Center.

"These materials have the potential to benefit agricultural producers by providing nutrients as an organic fertilizer and by adding needed organic matter to our Rolling Plains soil," he said.

The program begins at 9 a.m. with registration.

Anyone interested in solid waste management - whether they are a city manager, county commissioner, agricultural producer, or concerned citizen - is invited to the meeting.

Speakers will address the benefits and concerns related to the land application of biosolids; processing of biosolids utilizing composting and methods of land application of biosolids; regulations affecting the municipalities generating and the receiver of the biosolids; utilizing paper to increase organic matter and for dust control; and using a chain dicer

to incorporate the organic material and boost rainfall retention on the solid surface.

Ranch Manager George Fore will give an overview of MERCO, a company presently applying biosolids to rangeland east of El Paso.

Participants also will be able to watch a demonstration of a spreader applying compost that afternoon and take a tour of the research facilities at the Vernon Center.

There is a \$10 pre-registration fee. Registration at the door is \$12.50. This includes a meal and related publications. Five hours of continuing education units will be available for county commissioners and judges.
