**Prison Sentence Handed Down to Drunken Driver in Knox County**

A six-man, six woman Knox County District Court Jury last Tuesday found Jerry Edward Dugan, 32, of Clyde, Texas guilty of two felony offenses occurring in the same criminal episode, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

The jury found Dugan was guilty of Felony Driving While Intoxicated as well as Felony Theft, both offenses occurring on November 29, 1997 in Knox City.

District Judge David Hajek presided over the trial and after the jury found the defendant guilty of both offenses, Judge Hajek sentenced the defendant to a 10-year prison sentence for the felony DWI case to run concurrently with a two-year prison sentence in the felony theft case.

The evidence presented by the State indicated that the defendant and a lady companion arrived in Knox City around 10:30 p.m. on November 29, 1997 after riding around all afternoon drinking beer and tequila. Both lived in Clyde, Texas at the time. After arriving in Knox City, the evidence showed Dugan and his companion parked their car at the Dairy Queen parking lot and then stole a truck and trailer belonging to Samuel Lee Hunter of Munday, which had been parked there overnight by his

driver, Junior Montes.

After the defendant drove the truck a few blocks down Main Street, he rear-ended a pickup driven by Dwayne Chaney of Knox City. Chaney had stopped for the stoplight at the intersection of Main and Central. After attempting to flee the scene of the collision, the defendant was run down and stopped by Brandon Lewis, then of Knox City, who had witnessed the collision from the Allsup's parking lot.

Officer Harry Steen of the Knox City Police Department arrived on the scene and investigated the incident and subsequently took Dugan to the Knox City Hospital where a blood test was obtained, which indicated he was intoxicated at the time.

A search of Dugan's record revealed he had been previously convicted of DWI on numerous occasions.

In his defense of the theft charge, the defendant Dugan took the stand and denied taking Hunter's truck and trailer "with intent to steal" it. He testified that he thought he was in Munday, Texas (not Knox City)

**Counties Vote Yes To Water District**

The polls closed at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 26, in Haskell and Knox Counties and the fate of the proposed Underground Water District had been established.

Voters in Knox County voted the proposal in by a vote of 216 for and 93 against. In neighboring Haskell County voters turned in 321 "yes" votes and 174 "no" votes.

What happens next? County Commissioners in each county will come together and appoint 5 members from each county to form a Board of Directors. The board will then elect a chairman who will have voting privileges. Board members will serve alternating terms. The County Commissioners are expected to act promptly and name their designated board members within 30 to 45 days.

Once the board is established and a chairman is elected it will then be "their task to get the water management plan into place for the counties," said spokesperson Richard Albus.



The Area Agencies on Aging of West Central Texas and North Texas in collaboration with the Texas Department on Aging (TDoA) will hold a public hearing on the current and future needs of older Texans. The hearing will take place at 1:00 p.m., Friday, January 29, 1999, at the Community Center in Throckmorton, Texas.

Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) hold these meetings to collect public comment on area plans for service they intend to fund. Required services include information and referral, benefits counseling and nursing home ombudsman. The AAAs must describe how they intend to reach older people with the greatest social and economic need.

The Department on Aging reviews and approves the area plans of Texas' 28 AAAs and distributes federal and state funds to the local level. The 28 plans are

then folded into a state plan which is submitted for approval to the Governor and the federal Administration on Aging.

The federal Older Americans Act (the federal law under which TDoA and the Area Agencies operate) requires both the state and area offices on aging to solicit the public's views about needs and concerns of older people.

The best known programs funded by the Department on Aging and the area offices are probably the nutrition programs. However, depending upon local needs in each area, many other services are available: case management, transportation, homemaker, personal care, residential repair, information and assistance, adult day care, care giver education and more.

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## Munday Elementary Teachers Explain ABC's of Reading

Do you remember learning to read in first grade? Well, times have changed and now kids learn to read in kindergarten. Parents can greatly improve the chances that their kids will learn to read well and to enjoy reading.

The first and most important thing is attendance. Being at school every day possible and being at school on time help the child understand how important their "job" of learning to read is. It also sets a pattern for life that can help them get to work on time as adults. Coming in late or having unnecessary absences make children feel rushed, confused, behind and causes them to miss valuable interaction time with other children during learning centers or recess because they have to spend that time making up missed work. They may be able to make up the missed paper work, but seeing and hearing the lesson and examples from the days missed are almost impossible to make up. All children get sick at times and should not come to school, but excessive absences really hurt the child's chances at easily acquiring the skill of reading.

Early learning experiences with language and books have been discussed in previous articles and those should certainly be continued throughout childhood. Word games played out loud at home or in the car are fun and very important for the child. Parents should name a word for the child to identify the beginning, ending or vowel sound heard in that word. They can ask riddles of the child with the answer beginning with a certain sound or rhyming with a given word. Asking children to spell three-letter words having a short vowel sound gives them a chance to discover that they are able to spell and write real words. Children can write words by "sounding them out" and drawing pictures that show family members, friends, pets or experiences.

For the past two years, Munday kindergartners have been taught using the reading program by Macmillan/McGraw-Hill Beginning to Read, Write and Listen through which they are given the opportunity to learn the names of the letters of the alphabet, how to write them and what sound each letter represents. They learn to blend sounds into words, read simple sentences and stories, use capitals at the beginning of sentences and people's names, and to put a period, question mark or exclamation mark at the end of a sentence. The children learn to make each letter's sound and blend or "slide" them together to form a word. They also spell words by sounding them out and can eventually write whole sentences on their own. They have several opportunities each day to see and hear books about science and nature, classic literature such as fables and fairy tales, as well as popular modern children's literature.

It is extremely important that parents set aside a time each day for reading. Going over the papers and books the child brings home and asking them to explain their work shows the child that their work is important. Be sure to listen to the child read any word lists or stories they have brought home and sign your name each time you listen to them read. Once is not enough. As with any sport or skill, practice makes us better and more comfortable with the situation and reading is no different. "Practice makes perfect!" Parents should check those backpacks daily, because there will be homework and/or a reading list every weekday.

One of a kindergarten teacher's greatest rewards is getting to watch a child discover the thrill of reading his first word and moving on to read real stories. It is a great reward for parents too as they share in one of life's most important discoveries. By working together, we can have a part in giving your child that precious gift!

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# Vernon Social Security Office Now Open

Services provided by the Vernon office will include Social Security Card Issuance, Medicare information, and claims for Social Security Disability and SSI Benefits. The Wichita Falls Office will continue to take Retirement and Survivor claims for the Vernon area by telephone appointments.

The Vernon office, which serves Wilbarger, Foard, Hardeman, Childress, Cottle and Knox counties, will also handle the disability reviews for the entire Wichita Falls District.

Operating hours for the new office will be from 9:45 to 12:30 p.m. and 1:15 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. Monday through Friday.

## Representative Counts and Other Texas Legislators Start Session

As the 76th Texas Legislature opened for business last week, State Representative David Counts, D-Knox City, raised his right hand for the oath of office and renewed his pledge to represent the people of West Texas and their interests.

I'm also going to make sure we have enough good, clean water for cities, businesses and agriculture in West Texas."

For the last three consecutive sessions, Representative Counts has served as chairman of the influential House Committee on Natural Resources. Under his leadership, the 75th Texas Legislature passed SBI, which is a statewide water bill intended to help conserve the state's water resources and plan for adequate water supplies as the state's population continues to grow.
