Keep Texas **Beautiful** license plates available

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) announces the availability of Keep Texas Beautiful specialty license plates for passenger vehicles and light trucks.

The license plates cost \$50 annually in addition to the regular registration fee. (Personalizing the specialty plates costs an additional \$40 annually.)


These specialty plates feature the "Don't Mess With Texas" slogan and the words, "Keep Texas Beautiful."

House Bill 2681, passed by the 75th Legislature, created the Keep Texas Beautiful license plate. TxDOT will deposit \$5 from the sale of each set to the State Highway Fund to cover administrative costs. The department will use the remaining \$45 for the purpose of supporting TxDOT's litter prevention and community beautification programs.

Applications are available at county tax assessor collector offices statewide.

The 75th Legislature created 12 new specialty plates. There are now 79 specialty license plates available to the general pubic. In some cases, applicants for special plates must meet certain qualifications as specified by law.

License plate issuance is administered by TxDOT's Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. There are 15.3 million vehicles registered in Texas.

A special management seminar for beef cattle producers in northern Texas and southern Oklahoma is slated for April 30, 1998 at the Multi-Purpose Events Center in Wichita Falls, Texas. Titled "Managing Pasture Cattle for Maximum Profit," the program will begin at 11:00 a.m. and should conclude by 4:30 p.m.

The multi-faceted seminar which is sponsored by Roche Animal Nutrition and Health focuses on subjects of particular interest to stocker growers and cow-calf producers. Norman receives award for best technical paper

Gregg Norman, petroleum geologist with Gunn Oil Company in Wichita Falls, has been named recipient of the A.I. Levorsen Award for the best technical paper presented at the recent Southwest Section of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists held here.
