
Knox County 4-H'ers Attend District 3 Ambassador Lab





The degrees were presented at three separate ceremonies. Hall received his bachelor's degree in Agricultural Economics.



The priority issues and needs identified in all 254 counties will be shared with all of Extension's partners and used as the basis for the Extension Service's longrange outreach education plan for 2000-2003. Extension educational programs, which are available to all Texas residents, will be developed in response to community needs and in conjunction with participating partners.

All the issues identified locally will be posted on the Internet for county government, state agencies and other organizations and groups to review and use in developing their own strategic plans. The results from all counties will also be compiled and analyzed in light of trend data to create a comprehensive report. This report will be available to all partners in the Texas Community Futures Forum and to others on request. The information will help all groups to more directly focus their activities and resources; it also will reveal areas of common interest in which partnering groups can work together to solve community problems.

On May 24, 1999 twelve persons attended the Knox County Open Forum. They represented a cross-section of county residents, public agencies and businesses in the area.

The purpose of the Open Forum was to solicit and prioritize citizens' opinions about the most important needs and concerns in Knox County. Participants responded by listing Encouraging Industry, Schools I.D. I am not often surprised by the questions my clients ask. However, a few weeks ago I was caught with no ready answer when a client asked, "Do you think I could be addicted to my business?"

Frankly, the thought of being addicted to one's work had never crossed my mind. Later, after some reflection, I realized that there might very well be a fine line between being a dedicated worker and becoming addicted to your work.

Workers who are dedicated to their work are usually referred to as committed, diligent or conscientious. Employers, associates and workers usually consider these traits positive.

On the other hand, the word addicted means to give into a practice or habit, or having a habitual inclination toward any activity or behavior. You've heard the term "workaholic" used to describe those who have little focus other than their work. An addiction to work is usually considered negative. Therefore, let's look at some areas where going beyond dedication may not be

 Do the activities, accomplishments or failures of fan ily members surprise you? Do you ever find yourse asking, "When did this happen?" or, "I didn't know Johnny had a problem with math." or, "Soccer practice Who is playing soccer?" If you're behind the curve o family matters, you may be in the addiction zone.

· Do you find yourself "out of sorts" with everyone Are little things at work making you angry? Are yo snapping or shouting at those around you? Does it seen no one does anything right anymore? Does it carry ove to home, also? These may be work obsession dange signals.

• When was the last time you visited with a neighbor If you leave home early and return late, you may neve see your neighbors. If you're always at work on the weekends you may not even recognize your neighbor Remember, there should be more to life than work ever

• How many meals do you eat with your family? If you leave early and often don't return until late, you may be putting a strain on your relationships. Your family may be growing closer to your neighbors than they are to

· Are you often slowed down by nagging physical ailments or feeling depressed? Headaches, sleepless nights, digestive problems, high blood pressure and mild depression are common symptoms of both stress.

After you've considered these questions, ask your spouse or a close friend to answer these same questions for you. If his or her answers contradict yours, don't be surprised. Remember, a classic symptom of addiction

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
