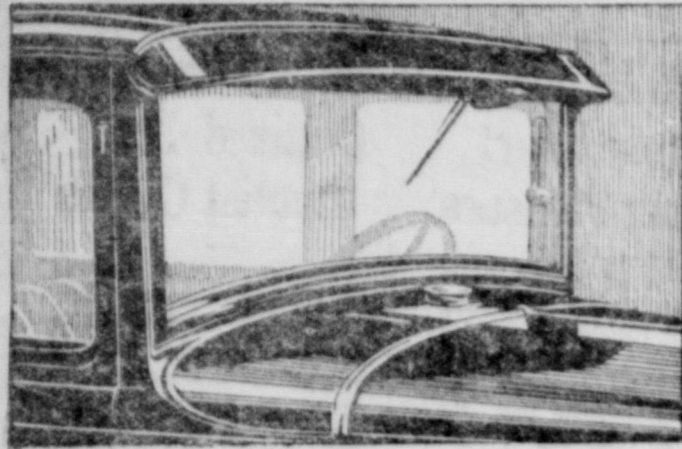

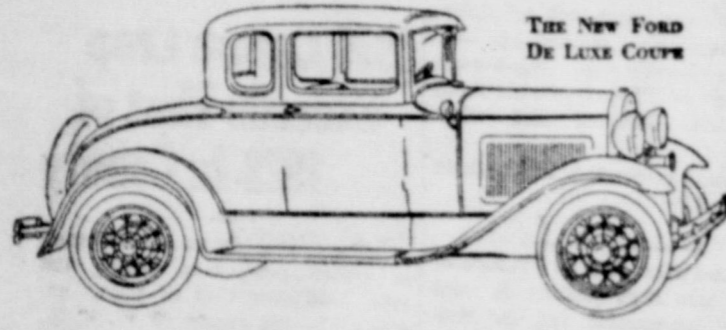

Agriculture, A Cushion
When one sits down hard and unexpectedly, a cushion to soften and break the fall is a mighty good thing.

Agriculture may be likened to this cushion and, if agriculture had not been in a ten-year slump, business people would have had a much softer cushion to fall on than they found when industrial centers experienced the same depression agriculture did and so suddenly.

Agriculture has been long recognized as the basis of constant prosperity and it is surprising to us how industry and commerce kept to the peak for as long as they did with agriculture in a slump. It was inevitable that the purchasing power of the farm people had been materially depressed for a long time and industrial centers could not live upon themselves without the aid of agricultural money.

It is true agriculture must suffer along with industrial depression because that enormous industry cannot expect prosperity living on itself and the reciprocity between the groups is necessary for stable prosperity.

People generally have recognized this as is indicated by the efforts being made now to stabilize agriculture and to increase agricultural prosperity. The cushion must be maintained as a stabilizer and as a buffer against too hard a fall.

Improve Things Now
Farmers who have money may be rather scarce but for them we think now is an opportunity very seldom experienced in a lifetime.

The materials for farm buildings and for farm improvements are at a comparatively low price level and money put into them will go twice as far as it will when prices rise as they always have done after depressed conditions.

Besides, farm buildings, one must consider seriously the comforts and pleasures of the family and we think the time is better now than ever to plan for running water, a modern bathroom, some form of refrigeration, screens for the farm

home, telephone connections, power for heavy work, effective sewerage disposal, heat in all rooms and electric or gas lighting.

You may not be able now to put them all on at one time but why not start an accumulate them as rapidly as possible? It looks to us as if now is the time to make improvements.

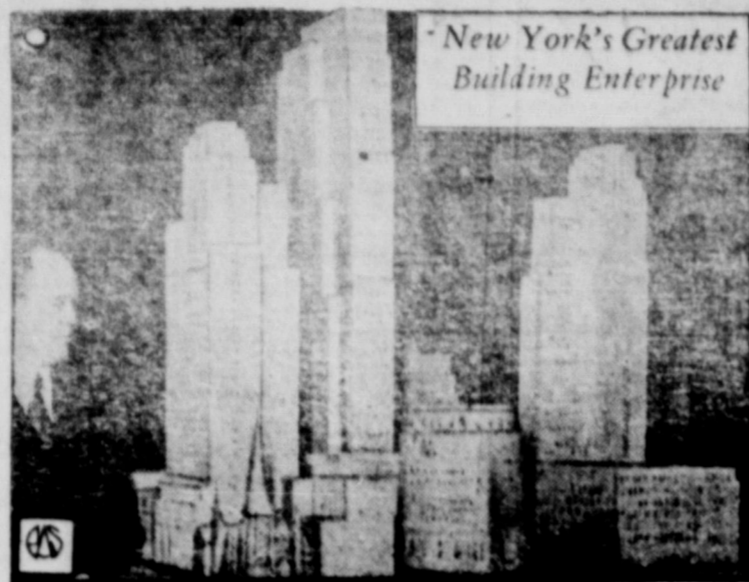

Pay Your School Taxes Before April 1st

Despite the fact that rigid economy has been exercised by the School Board, we find that approximately \$5,500 additional funds will be required to run the school for the remainder of the term, and we therefore urge everyone who possibly can do so to pay their School Taxes before April 1st, as there will be no penalties or interest charged if paid before that date.

The Shortage in funds is largely due to the fact that the school has not yet received by approximately \$6,000 all of the funds due from the State, and due to tax extensions made over the state this fund will not likely be available to help out any during the present school year. It is necessary that local taxes be collected for the maintenance of the school, as none of the funds coming from the State can be diverted to the maintenance fund.

The need is urgent, and unless sufficient taxes are collected to maintain the school during the remainder of the term it will be necessary to operate the schools on a deficiency basis, and the Board is anxious to maintain the school for the full term without the necessity of having to issue deficiency warrants.

May we have the hearty cooperation of every citizen who is interested in the school.
