Moguls' season ends with loss to Whiteface Antelopes

The Munday Moguls' season came to an end Tuesday night at the hands of the Whiteface Antelopes 48 to 59 in the Regional Quarterfinal game played at Floydada.

The Moguls had a hard time get-

ting the ball to fall in the basket, shooting 34% from the field while the Antelopes shot 50%.

Munday held a 10-6 lead in the first quarter but came up dry for four minutes on a 17-2 run by Whiteface.

At the end of the first quarter the Antelopes were ahead 18-10 and gained four more on the Moguls by the end of the second. Munday was down 23-35 at the end of the half.

That dry spell in the first half was the difference in the game as the Moguls scored one more point than Whiteface in the second half.

Each team scored 11 in the third

Primary election polls to be open March 10

Polls will be open on Tuesday, March 10 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. for the general primary election for both the Republican and Democratic parties. The purpose of the general primary election is to nominate members of Congress, members of the Legislature and state, district, county and precinct officers and for the purpose of electing county and precinct chairman.

Locations of polling places for the Democratic party are as follows: Precinct 1, Memorial Build-

ing, Benjamin; Precinct 2, Community Center, Truscott; Precinct 3, Baptist Church, Gilliland; Precinct 4, Community Center, Vera; Precinct 5, Memorial Building, Goree; Precinct 6N, City Hall, Munday; Precinct 6S, Perry Patton Community Center, Munday; Precinct 7N Aging Center, Knox City; Precinct 7S, Aging Center, Knox City; Precinct 8, Gillespie Baptist Church, Gillespie.

For the Republican party the locations will be: Precincts 1,2,3,4, Community Center, Truscott,

Texas; Precincts 6N, 6S, and 8, Elementary Library, Munday; Precinct 7N, 7S, Community Center, Knox City.

Early voting may be accomplished by personal appearance at the Knox County Clerk's Office in the courthouse in Benjamin.

Voter may request a ballot by mail by requesting an application through March 6. Such requests should be mailed to Danny Speck, Courthouse, Benjamin, Texas 79505.

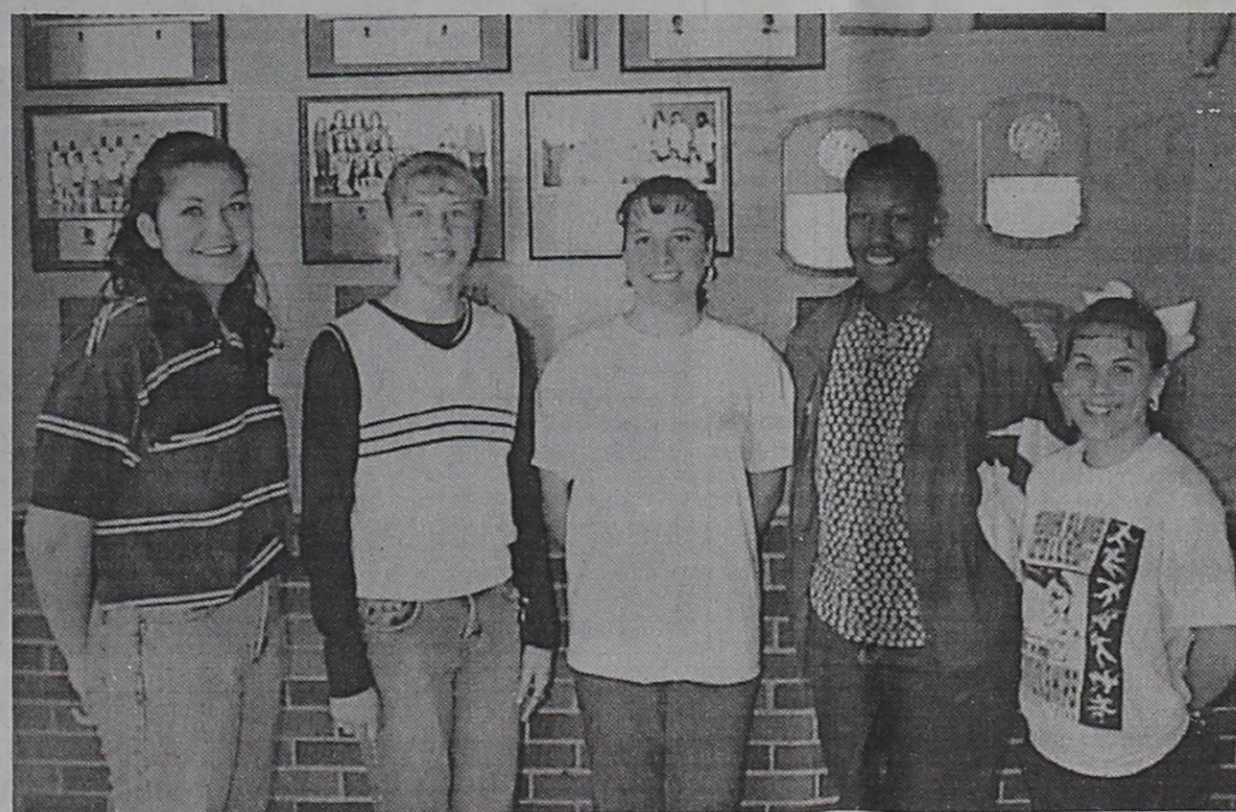

Robert Harrison seeks election to Justice of the Peace office

I am seeking the elected office of Justice of the Peace, Knox County Precinct Number 1 and 2, through the Democratic Party Primary on March 10, 1998. The decision to seek this office has not been taken lightly and was reached after several citizens of the County contacted me and encouraged me to seek the office. I believe, as others have stated, that I am well qualified to hold the office and perform the duties thereof. Included herein are my biography and qualifications in seeking this office.

My wife, Dorethy, and I have three daughters Ashley who is a 7th grader in Knox City Schools, Jennifer DeVillie of Knox City, and Melissa Brown of Albany and one granddaughter. We presently reside in Knox City and are members of Foursquare Church in Weinert, where I serve on the Church Council. I have been fairly active in civic affairs and am currently a member of, or have served in the past on, The City Council of Knox City; Knox City Jaycees; Knox City Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors; Knox City Fire Department; Chairman of the Knox County 9-1-1 Advisory Board; The Knox County Appraisal District Board of Directors; Cross Country Emmaus Community Board of Directors; Knox County Child Welfare Board of Directors; Texas Municipal Courts Association; The Texas Lodge of Research and a 32nd degree Mason.

After moving to Knox County in 1962, and except for a period of five years during which I attended college and worked elsewhere, Knox City has been my home. After returning home in 1978, I entered business with my father, which included the operation of the grocery store and other related

businesses. From 1983 to 1996, my family owned an interest in Rolling Plains Well Service, Inc., During that time I managed the accounting and data processing department. Those duties included the day to day general and payroll accounting, along with the management of fleet vehicle records, filing all state and federal tax reports and the reports to the several governing agencies in the oil industry. In 1996 we sold our interest and I continued the operation of other family businesses.

In 1997 the City of Knox City asked me to serve as Magistrate and Municipal Court Judge for the city, a position I previously held. Having attended the mandatory judicial training, as of the end of 1997, I have presided over approximately 200 cases, including a trial by jury. To the best of my knowledge, I have a good report with the citizens and have an excellent working relationship with other members of the judiciary in the county and district, as well as the various law enforcement agencies.

Along with my business and judicial experience, following my graduation from Knox City High School, I attended and graduated from Dallas Institute of Funeral Service and have been licensed by the Texas Funeral Service Commission in those areas of practice for the past 22 years. I hold a National Board Certificate through the Funeral Service Examining Board of the United States, Inc.

Part of my education and training in Funeral Science was in the area of Forensic Pathology, the scientific techniques used to determine cause of death. While in school and working in a large city in West Texas, I had the opportunity to observe and/or assisted with an estimated 150 forensic examinations in matters of questionable death. Such education and experience should prove to be invaluable as a Justice of the Peace when called upon to determine cause of death during an inquest.

As Justice of the Peace, I will carefully weigh all evidence presented before the Court and apply the law, without prejudice or bias, in order to see that justice is served to those involved. I will maintain the highest integrity the office deserves, the law demands and the citizens expect. There is a great deal of computer technology available to the Courts in Texas and to be up to date with the State of Texas in judicial matters of the JP Court, it's time for Knox County Justice of the Peace Court's to take advantage of these resources and move into the 21st century. I plan to maintain an office in the Courthouse, with scheduled and posted hours. And because being a Justice of the Peace is a full time responsibility, someone in County government to know where I am or how to reach me twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

I have enjoyed serving in the capacity as Magistrate and Municipal Court Judge for Knox City. Due to my education and experience in business and related management, funeral science and Municipal Court Judge, I feel that I am well qualified to hold the office of Justice of the Peace and look forward to serving in that capacity.

I sincerely ask for and would appreciate your vote and influence with others, to elect me as the Democratic candidate in the Primary Election on Tuesday, March 10, 1998 and then elect me to Office of Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1 and 2, in the November 3rd, General Election.

Knox City to host Health Department clinic

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center in Knox City on Thursday, March 12 from 10:00 - 11:30 and 1:00 - 3:00.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Td immunization is available for all adults not having one in ten years.

The Hepatitis series will be required for Kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. The Hepatitis B series (three immunizations) takes a minimum of six months to complete. Please check your child's immunization record for this series. Even though it is a requirement, the Hepatitis B series is available for all school age children through the age of 19, if they or their parents want it for prevention or the child is at risk. For more information on the immunization or the disease, please call the Texas Department of Health or talk to your health care provider.

Please bring immunization records with you to the clinic. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor. All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay. For more information on any of the immunizations, please call 940 - 574 - 2159.

Baby needs a Social Security number

Babies are a lot of fun, but they bring with them a lot of responsibility. One of the first things you probably want to do is get a Social Security number for your baby so that you can include him or her as a dependent on your tax return. The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 changes what you have to do to get your baby a Social Security number.

Effective immediately, the new law requires the Social Security Administration (SSA) to obtain the Social Security numbers of parents when an application is made for a Social Security number for a child who is under age 18. Because of the new law, SSA will also forward the parents' Social Security numbers to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for use in administering tax benefits based on support or residence of children. Therefore, you should be prepared to provide the Social Security numbers of both your baby's mother and father as part of the application process for a Social Security number for your baby. This change in the law applies only to first-time applications for a child's Social Security number. The new regulation does not apply to requests for replacement cards.

Once you receive your child's Social Security card, keep it in a safe place, as you would any important document. If you should lose the card, Social Security will replace it at no charge.

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.
Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.
Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
(3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.
As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.
All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

natural resources, and clothing. Other categories that may be of interest to Knox County 4-H'ers are rabbit, beef, companion animals and focus on health. These contests are broken into three age groups -- Junior (ages 8 - 11), Intermediate (12 - 13) and Senior (14 - 19). These ages are as of January 1, 1998.

This year, due to financial strain, there will be a \$2.00 per participant entry fee. This fee is payable at the time of registration (March 27). This is a very small price to pay to teach youth how to get up in front of a crowd and give a presentation.

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Munday Elementary students push pedal on Accelerated Reader

Walking the halls of Munday Elementary are somewhat different than they were this time last year. Now, rather than seeing students rush from place to place and chatting with friends and teachers, you will see them walking down the halls and reading, thanks to a computerized program called Accelerated Reader.

According to teacher Tena Myers, "The students love this program. They get their books out to read without being told to do so."

Yes, reading has always been a priority at Munday Elementary but Accelerated Reader offers many advantages to all the students who participate in grades one through six.

Students are tested when beginning the program in order to determine just what grade level they are capable of reading. Once their level is established students pick their books out of the 1127 library books that are included in the program. Books are coded with colored dots so that students are able to distinguish between the levels. Students then test out on computerized exams after finishing the material.

"The testing makes each student accountable for what they have read. Each test consists of five to ten questions that are designed to determine just what they have retained and what they were able to comprehend," states sixth grade teacher, Kristi Bufkin.

Upon passing the test each student then is awarded a point value or accomplishing the latest feat. The point value for each book is predetermined by the Accelerated Reader program. Students have individual point goals and each class also has a class point goal. Goals are expected to be met during each six weeks grading period. The student's individual goal will represent a percentage of their six weeks reading grade and each class will be awarded should they

meet their class goal. Some classes have elected to have a Sundae Party while others have decided to have a popcorn and movie party as their class reward.

"This program is wonderful because it allows students to read and move at their own pace. If a fifth grade student can only read on a third grade level they are still rewarded for doing a good job and they are encouraged to continue to work towards a higher level," explains Myers. "They are all successful on their own levels."

"Students are anxious to read now and they love going to the computers to test," says Bufkin. "We've had this program for almost six weeks now and we are expecting to see improvement in the lower skilled students. We will retest all of the students at the end of the program to determine if they are reading on a higher level."

Myers continued by saying, "It's a challenge for them to get their points and they are excited about meeting their goals."

Parents are also able to encourage their students through the Accelerated Reader program. Test results are sent home with the students on a continuing basis. The test report names the books that the student has completed and lists their test results. It also will show just how many points the student has accumulated. Along with that there is a reminder to the parents called TOPS which stands for Three Opportunities to Praise a Student. Students receive praise from the computer when they have successfully tested on a book, they receive praise from the teachers and the reports allow them to re-

ceive praise from the parents. "I believe this program is one of the best things we've ever done for the students," says teacher Tena Myers.

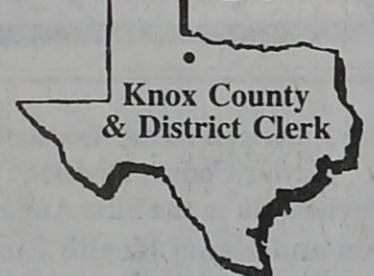

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Taking the "die" out of "diet"
