Baby needs a Social **Security number**

Babies are a lot of fun, but they bring with them a lot of responsibility. One of the first things you probably want to do is get a Social Security number for your baby so that you can include him or her as a dependent on your tax return. The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 changes what you have to do to get your baby a Social Security number.

Effective immediately, the new law requires the Social Security Administration (SSA) to obtain the Social Security numbers of parents when an application is made for a Social Security number for a child who is under age 18. Because of the new law, SSA will also forward the parents' Social Security numbers to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for use sion Agent Paul Weiser. in administering tax benefits based on support or residence of children. Therefore, you should be prepared to provide the Social Security numbers of both your baby's mother and father as part of the application process for a Social Security number for your baby. This change in the law applies only to first-time applications for a child's Hosea; Charles & Debbie Social Security number. The new Pankhurst. regulation does not apply to requests for replacement cards.

Once you receive your child's Pankhurst. Social Security card, keep it in a safe place, as you would any important document. If you should W.Gulley, Jessica Herring, Micah lose the card, Social Security will replace it at no charge.
