





The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the new Community Authority Center/Housing Building in Knox City on Thursday, November 12 from 10:00 - 11:30 and 1:00 - 3:00.

The influenza immunization will be offered to those still in need of receiving it as well as the pneumococcal and Td. Other immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Td immunization is available for all adults not having one in 10 years.



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# Waldrip runs toward state meet


Munday High School senior Anna Marie Waldrip will be competing at her third State Cross Country Meet following her bronze metal finish at the Regional level.

glides effortlessly through the water while the other eats hamburgers, wears Reeboks and drives a car to work every morning, humans and dolphins may have more in common than people think, especially when it genetics. comes to

Texas A&M University veterinarians are comparing human chromosomes to those of dolphins and are finding that the two share many similarities. The scientists hope to use these similarities to identify and map the genes of dolphins.

Dr. David Busbee and his team applied human "paints," fluorescently labeled pieces of human chromosomes, to dolphin chromosomes on microscope slides. When scientists examined the photos taken with a fluorescence microscope, they found dolphin chromosomes fluorescently tagged with the labeled, or "painted," pieces of human chromosomes and concluded that dolphins hold many of the same chromosomes as humans.

"We started looking at these and it became very obvious to us that every human chromosome had a corollary chromosome in the dolphin," Busbee said. "We've found that the dolphin genome and the human genome basically are the same. It's just that there's a few chromosomal rearrangements that have changed the way the genetic material is put together."


threatened. Also, once provoked the AHB remains agitated for a longer period of time than does the EHB. It has been estimated that when provoked an AHB colony may result in six to ten times as many stings as a similar disturbance of a EHB colony.

The AHB swarms much more an EHB colony swarms once every year or two. An AHB colony may swarm four to eight times in one year. Generally, an AHB swarm is much smaller than an EHB swarm, some being not much bigger than a coffee cup.

While absconding (fleeing and hiding) is rare in the EHB, it is rather common with the AHB Absconding not only results in the loss of a managed colony but adds to the feral population competing with managed colonies for nectar and pollen.

EHB's are very particular in selecting nesting sites. They prefer hollow trees, wall voids or other cavities about ten gallons in size, well above the ground, clean and dry. The AHB will nest almost any place it is protected from the weather.






