**Munday falls to Throckmorton
In hard fought district battle**

Moguls put playoff hopes on the line against State Ranked Aspermont

The Munday Moguls lost their first and last home game of the season this past Friday night to the Throckmorton Greyhounds by a score of 37 to 28 before a disappointed home crowd hoping to see the Mighty Moguls secure a playoff spot with a victory over the talented visitors from the East. Throckmorton drew first blood on their opening drive thanks to a big pass play on third and seven to give the Greyhounds a first down at the Munday 30, where they pounded out the rest of the yardage on the ground converting on a fourth and 1 and then rambling in from the 9 with 7:43 left and kicking the extra point to make the score Throckmorton 7 Munday 0.

Brian Urbanczyk took the kickoff 70 yards on the return to set the Moguls up in great shape on the Greyhound 25, and it took only 2 plays for the Moguls to go the distance. Marcus Kimmel took the first handoff from Brandon Sosa for 6 yards up the middle, then Urbanczyk roared 19 yards to the endzone for the touchdown and Ramiro Nunez kicked the PAT to tie up the score with less than 30 seconds off the clock in the first period of play.

Munday just missed stopping the Greyhounds on big plays all night by mere inches. It was a night where Throckmorton seemed to get all the bounces and the calls going their way. Even though the Moguls put up some good numbers on the offensive side of the ball, (Urbanczyk rushed for 102 yards on 12 carries and had 110 kick return yards, Sosa was 7 out of 14 for 103 yards and 2 touchdowns, and Wesley Spells caught 5 passes for 86 yards) defensively the Moguls just couldn't get the momentum to swing their way. Even in the second quarter trailing by a score of 17 to 7 with Throckmorton threatening to score, Munday never gave up

hope. Nunez forced a fumble with his relentless defensive pursuit and then recovered the ball at the Munday 33 where the Moguls seemed to get new life as they ground out yard after yard in the drive which took them into the endzone with 3:54 left in the half. Sosa gained 15 yards on a busted run play up the middle, and Urbanczyk had a nice 23 yard run setting up first and goal at the nine. Kimmel gave it two shots and got the ball to the 1 where Nunez took it the rest of the way for the score. The kick failed to leave the Moguls trailing at the half 13 to 17.

Throckmorton scored again in the third and shut out the Moguls forcing them to take to the air in the fourth which proved to be suc-

cessful enough for 2 touchdowns, one by Eric Beaty, a 9 yarder and the other a 6 yard pass to Spells. The only problem was that the Greyhounds scored another 14 points on the Mogul defense, the most they've been scored on since the Quanah game early in the season. When the final gun sounded it was Throckmorton 37 Munday 28, a tough loss for the Moguls as now they must travel to Aspermont to meet and defeat the so-called "Swarm" from Stonewall County if they intend to advance in the State Playoffs. Aspermont is currently ranked 3rd in the state

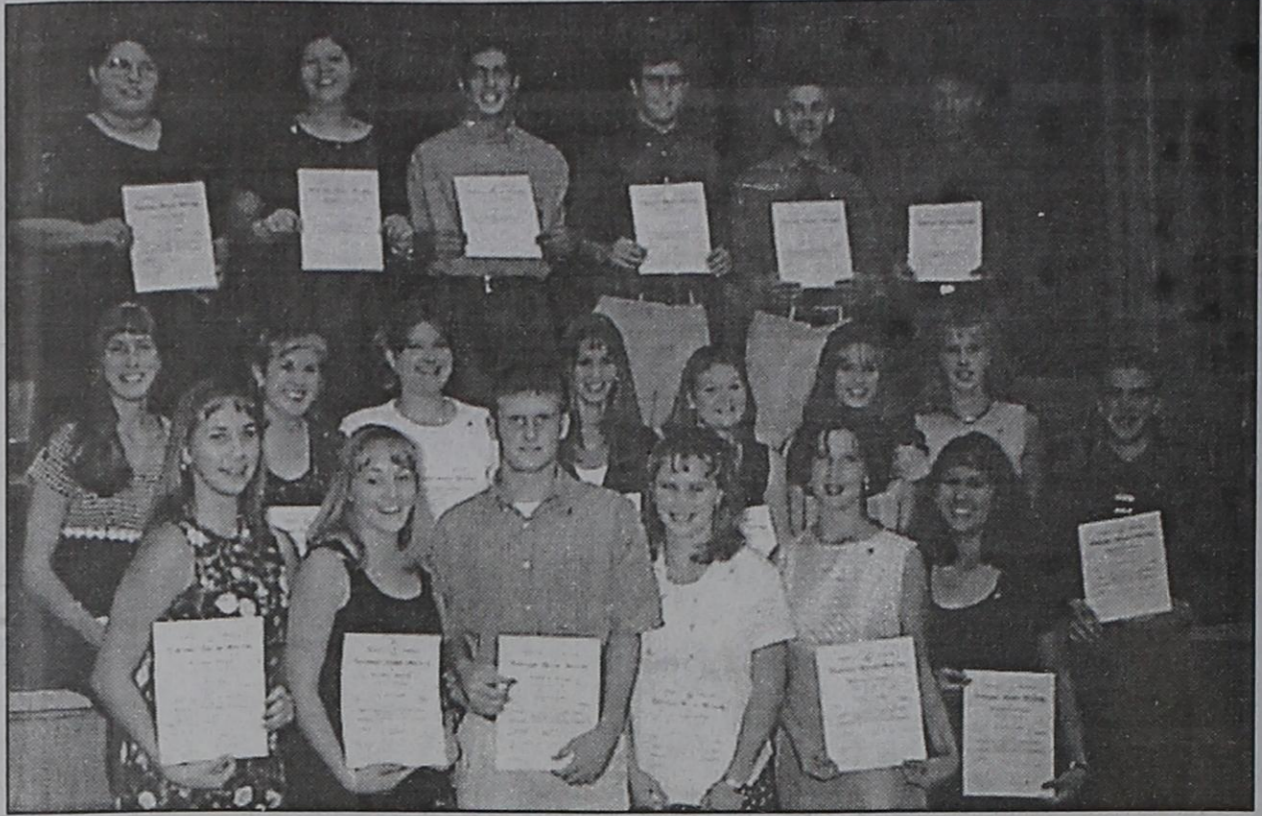
King account opened at First National Bank
