Both teams clinched playoff spots last week, the Mogulettes by virtue of their won-loss record, and the Moguls with a convincing 59 to 49 win over the Windthorst Trojans last Friday here in Munday at the high school gym. The Mogul victory sends the varsity boys into a playoff to determine the District

22-A champion, which will be held at Vernon this Friday, February 12, at 8:00 P.M. The Mogulettes will compete for the Bi-District crown against the much improved Chilicothe girls this coming Tuesday, February 16, at 7:00 P.M. in the Seymour High School gym.

Both Teams finished their regular season competition with victories last night against Petrolia in their last games in Munday's High

School gym. The Munday Mogulettes led the game throughout, opening up a 22 point second quarter to take a 37 to 24 lead into the locker at the half. Both teams came out a little cold in the third, but the Mogulettes finished off the 4th with a strong 20 point quarter to blow the Lady Pirates away by the score of 71 to 44.

Leading the way in the contest for the Mogulettes was Keisha Collier who finished the night as the top scorer with 24 points followed by Laci Myers with 14, Taneka Hamilton with 9, Amanda Myers and Anna Marie Waldrup both with 8, Nicole Urbanczyk with 3, Miranda Zeissel and Erica Gray both with 2 points each, and Angela Albus with 1 point to complete the scoring for the night.

Coach Jeff Guise was pleased with the offensive effort but felt like the girls didn't play with the kind of emotion they displayed last Friday against the Windthorst Trojanettes. The Mogulettes lost the game against Windthorst, but Coach Guise was pleased with the fight and determination that the girls showed.

When asked about the upcoming Bi-District contest with Chilicothe, Coach Guise had this to offer:

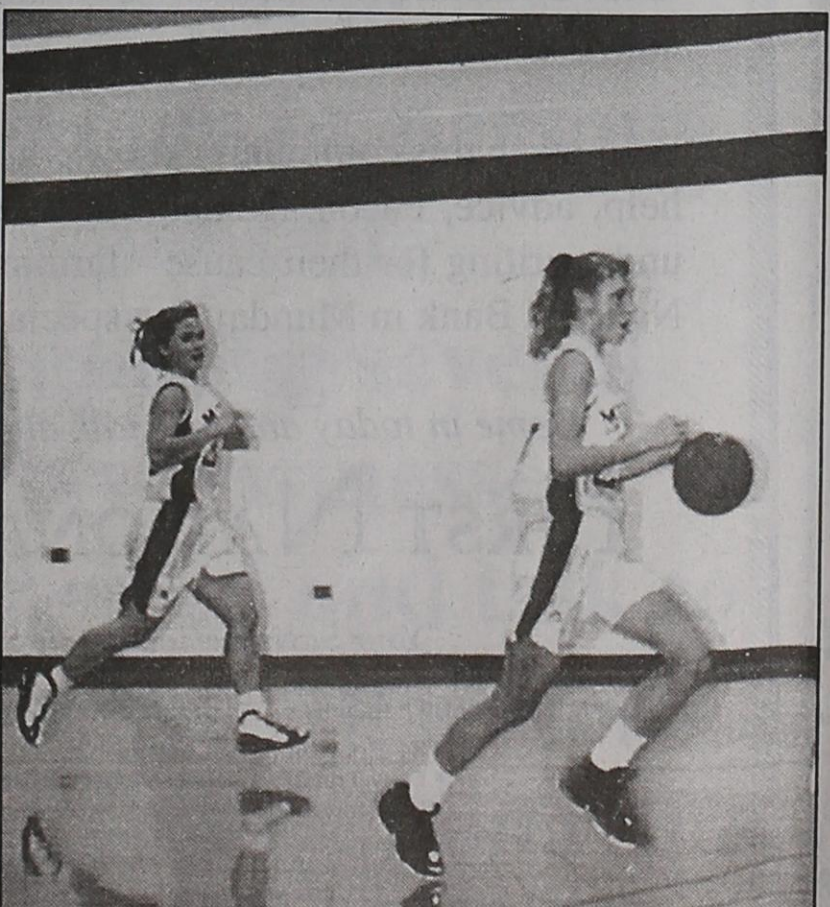
"We've played them early on in the season and from what we see, they are much improved. They are a team that likes to shoot 3 pointers and were just going to stick with our game plan, try to put a lot of pressure on them, and get in their face and make them turn the ball over. We plan to stick with what's brought us to this point."

The Moguls finished their regular season with a 56 to 41 victory against the Petrolia Pirates, using this game for more of a tune up to the district championship match with the Windthorst Trojans this Friday in Vernon. According to Munday Coach Ralph Klinkerman, "When we first met Petrolia, we had our backs to the wall and had to win to stay alive and have any hope in the district competition. Now we've swept the last 5, and we're going to

Student is Local Winner in Tools for Tomorrow Awards Program

Angela Stone, a Senior studying Computer Science at Munday High School in Munday, has been named a local winner in the Tools for Tomorrow All-American Vocational Student Awards program. The first day to file an application for inclusion on the ballots of both the Munday Independent School District Board of Trustees and the Munday City Council elections is Monday, February 15, 1999. Interested candidates can file for the elections from that day until Wednesday, March 17, 1999.

The Munday Independent School District will be holding elections to fill two places on the Board of Trustees. Those places are currently held by Mark Reed and Gary Wilde. Candidates can file by appearing in person at the MISD Administration Office located next to the Munday High School campus.

The City Council will be seeking to fill three slots. The three terms are the expiring seats of Robert Bowen, Jessie Andrade and Jay White. Applicants need to file their intent to run for office at City Hall.

The local elections will be held on May 1, 1999. All interested candidates will have 30 days in which to file the necessary form from the date of February 15. Currently, the City Alderman's terms run for two years, with half of the council up for election every year. Next year Munday will elect to fill the seats occupied by Judy Lowe, Winters Matthews, and Mayor Gary Tidwell

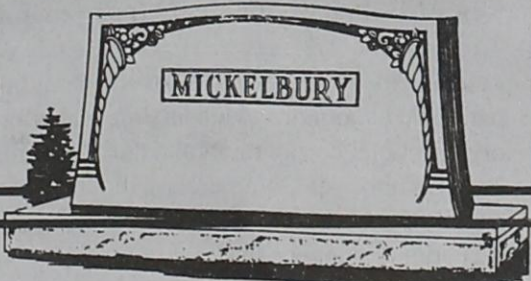

Community Center Hosts Health Clinic

The Texas Department of Health will be conducting an Immunization Clinic at the Perry Patton Community Center in Munday on Thursday, February 25 from 10:00 - 11:30 and 1:00 - 3:00. There will not be a clinic on Thursday, February 11.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Hepatitis B immunization is required for kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. This immunization series consists of three injections taking a minimum of six months to complete. The Hepatitis B immunization is also available for any child at risk or any child whose parents wish them to have for protection or prevention.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine has arrived at the office and is now being given to 12 month old through 15 year olds. If you are interested in more information on the varicella, please call the office.

Please bring immunization records and social security numbers with you to the clinic. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor. All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay. Kari Kuehler's animal place 18th in the Lambs Division.

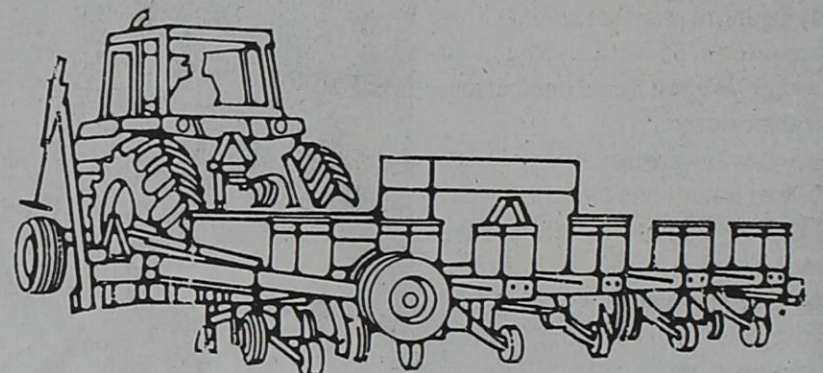
In the Swine Division Angela Albus placed 3rd, Justin Yates animal came in 16th and Kandis Brown took 21st place with her animal.

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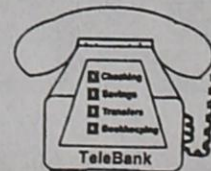
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Munday Student Jr. High Finishes Strong on Texas Tech Honor Roll in District Tournament

Although the Moguls have played the Trojans in close contests twice this year, Coach Klinkerman says,

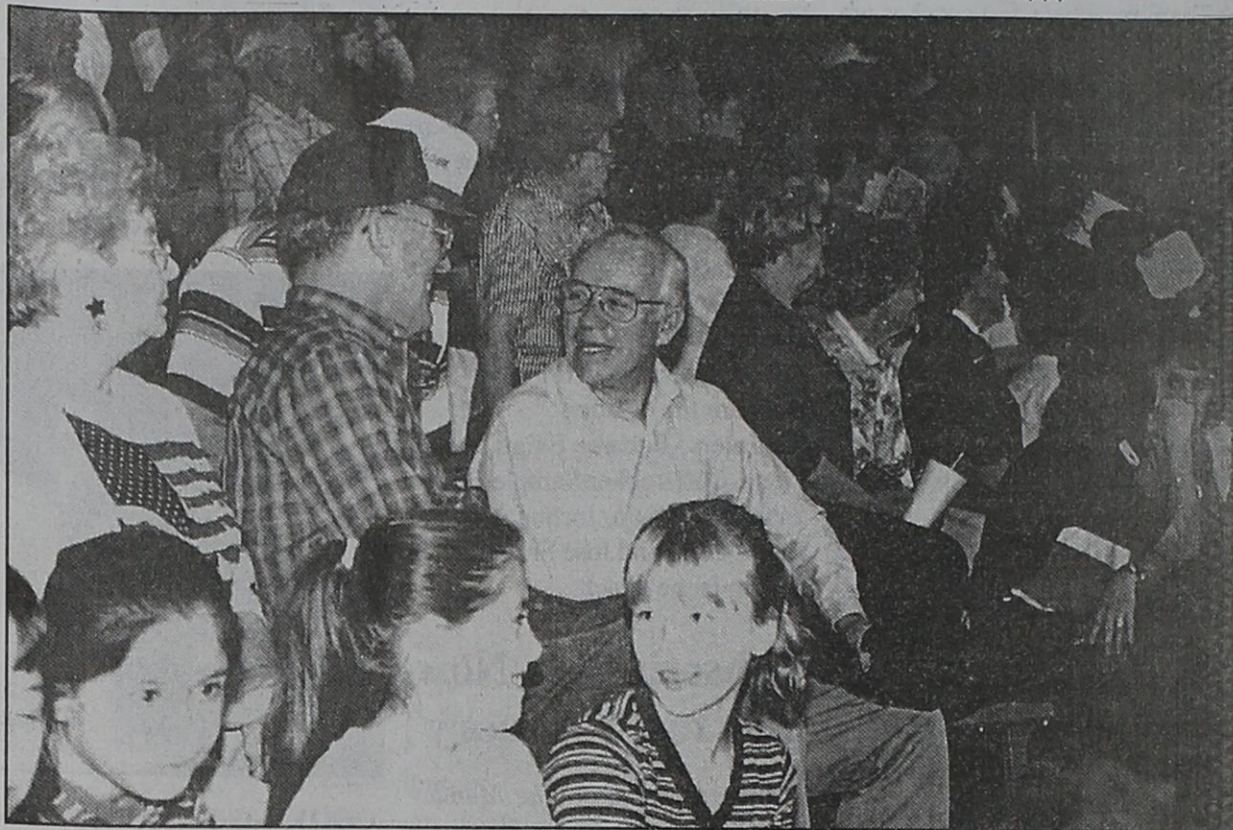
"You never know exactly what to expect from Windthorst, they like to change up a lot. We'll stick with our game plan, and do our best to win this thing."

Reading at Munday Elementary - Practice Makes Perfect

The excitement seen in a child's eyes, beaming face, and positive body language is a joy to observe after he or she has reached that goal. They are so excited and proud of themselves. Self-esteem is a valued concept of high achievement that this program enhances.

Vocabulary growth is gigantic.

Second graders are reading words like "mischief," "Sanitation Department," "keen," "gesture," "Entomology," and "planetarium" and understanding what they mean. Wow! Did I say "second graders"?

As a teacher it is really a thrill to watch a child so involved in a book that he or she: 1. Can vividly visualize what is happening; 2. Gets tickled and enjoys a good laugh at a character or situation; 3. Catches such a satisfying experience from the book that he or she wants to buy it to read again and again; and, 4. Enthusiastically discusses with a friend the details of a book just read when checking out other books.

The enjoyment of words, pictures, ideas, thoughts, and feelings drawn in the minds of children from reading books is immeasurable.

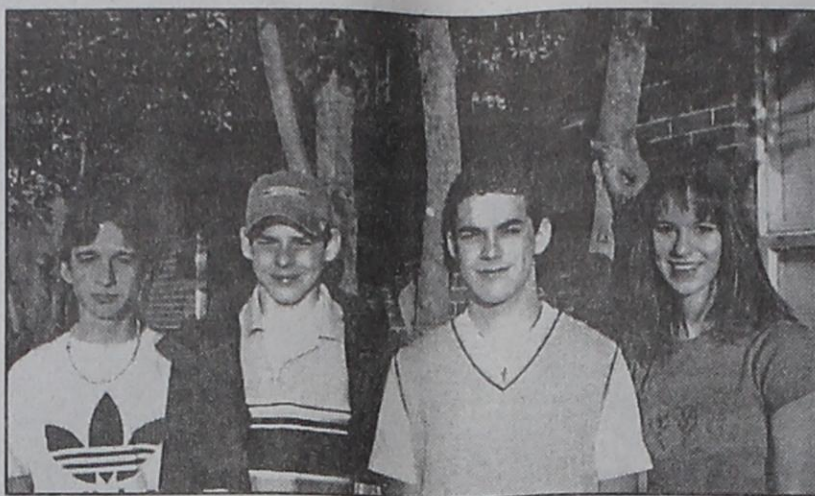

Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation Plans to Represent Area at State Level

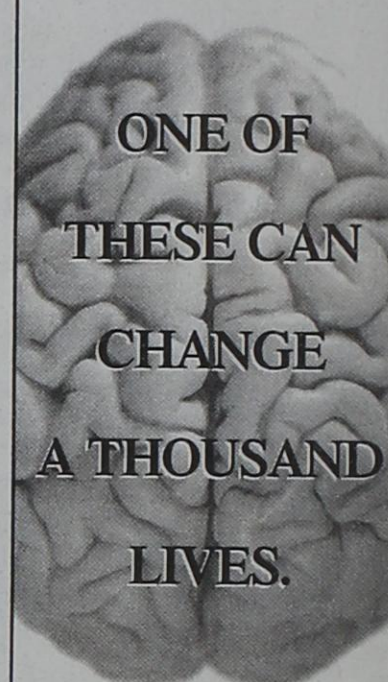
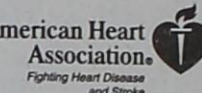
After the successful completion of forming a non-profit organization, the Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation has shifted gears to prepare for its upcoming influence in the State's capitol. Being one of the first of its kind, the Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation represents a five county effort to market the region which includes Jones, Fisher, Stonewall, Knox and Haskell counties. By forming, the Foundation is able to represent the Rolling Plains region in a unified structure which strengthens its ability to market, locate and manage business prospects too large for an individual community.

The Foundation is scheduled to have a day designated as the Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation Day in early March. During this time, the Foundation's board members plan to introduce itself to the State's representatives and other dignitaries of such in order to offer suggestions in redefining rural communities.

Currently, the State uses a "scoring system" to award state funding to areas of high unemployment and high poverty. The scoring system awards points to communities which qualify in different areas such as population, unemployment, high wage/high skill, etc. Because the Jobs and Leverage categories of the scoring system clearly favors large businesses, and larger communities, the Foundation hopes to introduce to the State's leaders new definitions. Definitions which might include possible categories such as rural populations being defined as a community with less than 50,000 population, or a community located further than 60 miles from a large population. Some have called this definition a "micro-municipalities". It is such a

population that the Foundation represents.

By integrating nine communities, the Foundation hopes to introduce the strong sense of community, lower taxes, a cleaner environment, and the need for population preservation not only to the State, but to industries unaware of the multiple characteristics of West Texas. The Foundation recognizes its needed areas of growth, and because of such, intends to market and manage economic prospects for the region. 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Wheat Board to Hold 14th Biennial Election

The Texas Wheat Producers Board engaged in wheat research, market development, and services designed to add to the value of the crop, will hold its 14th biennial mail election between March 29 and April 12, 1999, according to Billy Vinson, farmer-elected chairman of the organization. The

Board was formed in 1971 in the Panhandle-North Texas Area and expanded state wide by a producer referendum in 1985. Six year terms of five of the current fifteen board members expiring at this time include: District I: David Moore, Dumas; District II: C.L. Edwards, Panhandle; District III: W.R.

Moore, Jr., Munday; District IV: Gary Murphy, Dawson and Foy Gibson, Bend. All Board members with expiring terms are eligible for re-election.

In 1971, producers formed the Texas Wheat Producers Board as a self-help program to enhance the value of wheat in Texas. Now, as

we move into the 21st century, producers are faced with more transitions and challenges than ever before. Although 28 years have passed, the Texas Wheat Producers Board has not lost sight of its original purpose. In 1971, the 1.5 million-acre crop produced 31.4 million bushels, market price at \$1.25 per bushel, for a total value of about \$37 million. Texas' peak harvested acres of 5.8 million in 1985 produced a 187 million-bushel crop valued in excess of \$800 million. Changes in government programs and more flexibility have reduced Texas' production to 136.5 million bushels for a value still in excess of \$400 million. We are still dedicated to assisting the producers through research, market development, and education in an effort to strengthen producer income. The Texas Wheat Producers Association continues its effort to strengthen producers' income through State and National government liaison on farm policy issues.

Any farmer producing wheat in Texas is eligible to vote for a board member for that District in which he resides. Counties included are: District I: Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Moore, Hartley, Hutchinson and Gray. District II: Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, and Floyd. District III: Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Throckmorton, Haskell, Archer, Baylor, Wilbarger, Wichita, Young and Clay. District IV: All other counties in Texas.

Vinson points out that any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for a six-year membership on the Texas Wheat Producers Board by application to the organization. The application must be signed by himself and at least ten (10) other persons eligible to vote in his District in the election, at least 30 days' (February 11 - March 12) prior to the final election date (April 12), in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters 15 days prior to

the election, Vinson said. He also indicated that any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days before the election date, may obtain one at any Agricultural Extension Service office as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

In addition to the five other members with expiring terms, other TWPB members are: Billy Vinson, Abilene; David Cleavinger, Wildorado; Bob Beakley, Ennis; Fred Dwyer, Wichita Falls; Jack Norman, Howe; Scott McGarraugh, Perryton; Cagle Kendrick, Stratford; Ralph Sides, Childress; Ben Scholz, Wylie, and Tommy Womack, Tulia.

Applications for names to be placed on the ballot should be sent to the organization's headquarters office, 2201 Civic circle #803, Amarillo, Texas 79109.

The Texas Wheat Producers board check-off program has clearly demonstrated its effectiveness through expanded wheat markets, solutions to major production challenges, and victories in the trade arena. Now the wheat industry and the TWPB are facing major changes. Producers need to build the markets of the 21st century through the 1-1/2 cent per bushel check-off program used for Market Development, Research and Education.

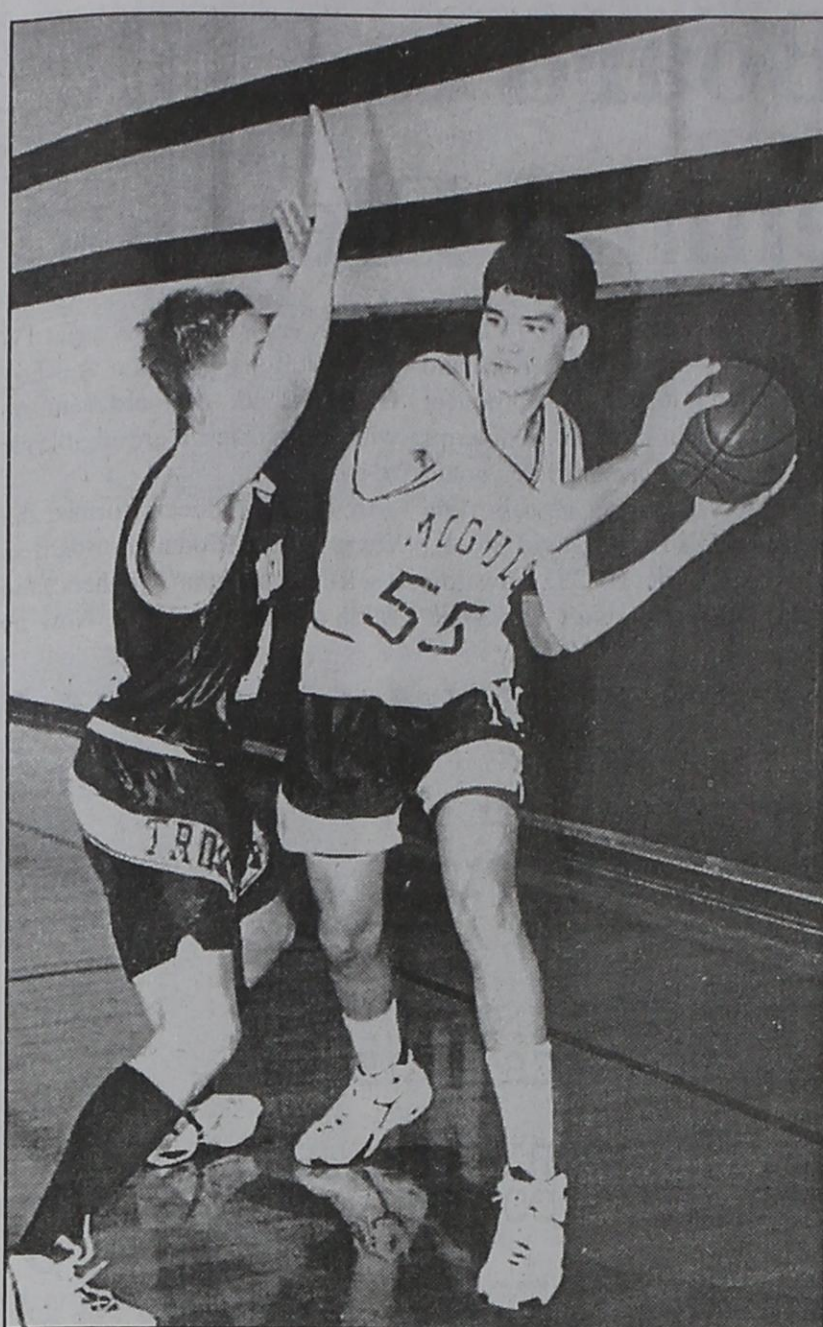
