Attend Baccalaureate services this Sunday at 8:00 PM.

With the silver glow of the state capitol in the background, Munday High School junior Alan Albus high jumped into second place at the Texas State Track Meet in Austin last Friday, May 12th.

Albus competed against seven other Class A athletes who represented the best in their category throughout the state.

Albus claimed the Silver Metal after six unsuccessful attempts and eight successful attempts for a total of 14 jumps at the cross bar. His best height of the day was 6 feet and 6 inches.

Albus continues a long record of state high jumpers in his family.

His cousin, Kevin Smith, competed at the state level in 1981 and claimed the bronze medal and his father, Richard, was second in the state high jump competition in 1969 where he also claimed the silver medal.

Taking the gold at this year's event was Michael Sockwell of Menard with a 6' 7" jump.

Albus reported that he was nervous but pleased with the outcome of the meet in Austin on Friday and as a junior this year he says he would "be disappointed" if he did not return to the competition during his senior year.

Bill English will Speak at Knox County Veteran's Memorial Groundbreaking

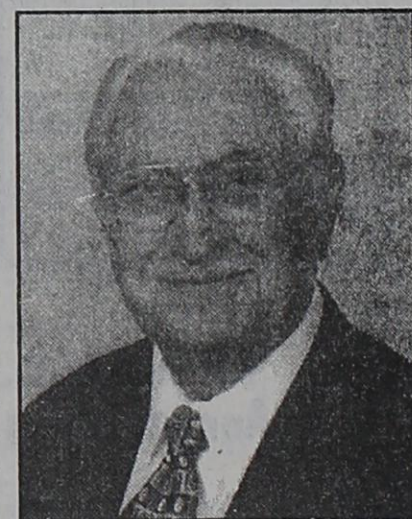
The Knox County Veterans Memorial Committee, a sub-committee of the Knox County Historical Commission, is pleased to announce the groundbreaking of the proposed Knox County Veterans Memorial on May 29, 2000 at 10:45 a.m. at the memorial site (east of the courthouse). The memorial has been in the planning stages for more than a year. Now with the current plans in hand and fund raising on-going, the memorial is moving in to the final stages towards completion. The groundbreaking ceremony has been planned to raise the awareness of the vast number of Veterans that Knox County has been home to at some point in time. Currently approximately 2000 Veterans have been identified and more are expected. Anyone with information regarding a Veteran is encouraged to contact the Knox County Historical Commission Office at (940) 454-2229; P.O. Box 77, Benjamin, TX 79505; or by e-mail at kche@nts-online.net. Names must be identified by July

31, in order for Willis Granite Products to produce and install the monument by November.

Mr. Bill English, Truscott High School Graduate and WWII and Korean Conflict Veteran, will be the guest speaker for the groundbreaking ceremony for the Knox County Veterans' Memorial. Mr. English flew 10 escort and fighter strikes over Japan with his last combat flight being August 5, 1945, the day before the first atom bomb was dropped. In 1951 Mr. English returned to active duty during the Korean Conflict as a Psychological Warfare Officer. Since his military duty, Mr. English has served as a credit management specialist, Baptist minister; and active trustee for First Baptist Church of Wichita Falls; the Tom C. White, Jr Trust Fund; Rolling Meadow Retirement Center' and member of Lone Stars - Wichita Falls Convention & Visitor's Bureau and host committee of the Iwo Jima Survivors Assoc. of Texas. Mr. English's current interests are exemplified by the Military History

Collection at the Wichita Falls Public Library in which he founded and coordinates. Mr. English's life is blessed by his wife, Mary; 2 sons, Larry and Richard; and 6 grandchildren. The KC Greyhound Band will provide the music for the ceremony.

In addition to the Groundbreaking Ceremony, and hamburger lunch will be served for \$5.00. All proceeds will go towards the Veterans Memorial Fund's goal of \$50,000. Everyone is encouraged to attend.

Historical Commission Honors Knox Veterans

Each week, until our veterans monument is erected and paid for, we continue to review a short moment in one of a Knox County Veteran's service experience.

Count the following veteran's experience as a reminder that all potential memorial candidates who have not done so, need to contact Knox County historical Commission at 940-454-2229 on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday morning or write to the Commission at P.O. Box 77, Benjamin, Texas 79505, E-mail kche@nts-online.net with pertinent veteran data. Not required, but helpful forms for such are available in Munday, Texas at First National Bank: Knox City-O'Brien CISD Administration Office 606 E Main St. Knox City, Texas. At each location, a current list of veterans on the monument list is updated every two weeks.

Financial contributions are critically needed and appreciated and tax deductible. More than \$25 for each name will help since many of the 2000 and their families are no longer with us.

We need brief volunteer accounts of veterans experiences. These are hard to come by, as Tom Brokaw noted in THE GREATEST GENERATION because so many veterans haven't talked about these memories, ever, in many cases. When asked, some are moved to tears before they can put these happenings in to words. These moments of history (sometimes especially the will and courage to survive) shape and shade where civilization has been this last century. The Historical Commission with the help of 2000-2001 high school

computed classes, hopes to compile a computer file of such veterans' experiences. The computer history could be located across the street from the monument in the Knox County Court house. Of Knox County's 2000 veterans, those in the air force faced a certain kind of death on every flying mission. Air Force in Reserve Major William (Billy) Stewart, former Knox County veterinarian, now of Ardmore, Oklahoma, did just that in 1943 on 25 bomber missions. Volunteering in 1941, shortly af-

ter Pearl Harbor, the young 20 year old bomber pilot was sent with the 92nd Bombing Group as a part of the 325th Air Force Bombing Squadron to a base in England. In August, 1943, flying a B17, with a total crew of 10 over the North Sea, his plane took multiple hits from German anti-aircraft. The plane lost all 4 engines before hitting the water. The B17 did not immediately break up and all 10 men were able to escape the sinking plane.

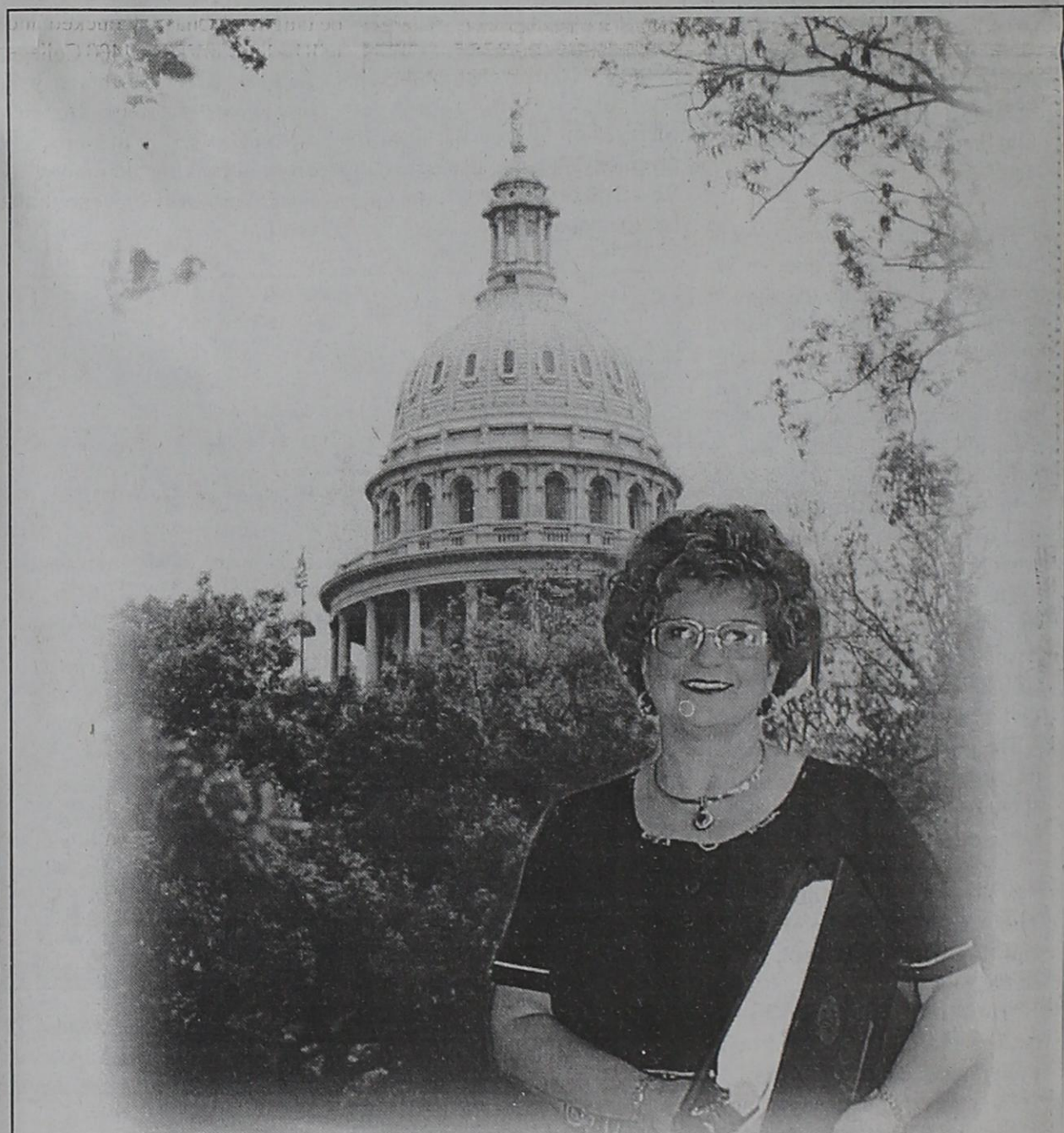

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Judicial District Court Arraigns Citizens On Drug Charges

The 50th Judicial District Court had another busy week this past week, according to District Attorney Bill Neal. On Tuesday, May 2nd, in the Baylor County District Court, the following pleaded guilty and were given probation sentences by District Judge David Hajek. Michael Dewayne Hayden, 24, of Jerry Michael Bingham, 27, of Munday, pleaded guilty to an indictment charging them with Illegal Possession of a Controlled Substance. Both Hayden and Bingham received a two-year state jail sentence, probated for two years, \$250.00 fine, plus court costs. Bingham was represented by Bret Hanes, a Wichita Falls attorney and Hayden was represented by Andrew Ottaway, a Haskell attorney. Kenny Wayne McMorris, 31, of Seymour, pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with possession of a Child. McMorris' finding of guilt was deferred and he was placed on probation for a one-year term, assessed a \$1,000.00 fine, plus court costs. McMorris was represented by Robert Rafuse, a Wichita Falls attorney. Rudy Jesse Jacques, 43, of Munday, pleaded guilty to complaint and information charging him with aggravated Assault. Jacques' finding of guilt was also deferred and was placed on probation for two years, assessed a \$500.00 fine, plus court costs. Jacques waived his right to an attorney. Billy Gene Wikel, Jr., 19, of Wichita Falls, pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with

possession of a Controlled Substance (methamphetamine). Wikel received a two-year state jail sentence, probated for five years, \$500.00 fine, \$140.00 restitution, plus court costs. Wikel was also represented by Andrew Ottaway. On Wednesday, May 3rd, in the Knox County District Court, the following individuals were arraigned: Brenda Correll, 51, of Knox City, Felony Theft over \$20,000/under \$100,000.00 by Public servant; Jimmy Ray Hearn, 53, of Rochester, Aggravated Sexual Assault; Charles Kelly Adams, 34, of Knox City, Burglary of a Habitation; Alfred Masias, Jr., 25, of Munday, Delivery of a Controlled Substance Under One Gram and Possessing Cocaine over Four Grams, under 200 Grams/Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity; Lee Edward Shields, 44, of Munday, Possessing Cocaine over Four Grams, under 200 Grams/Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity; Michael Venard Toney, 32, Possessing Cocaine over Four Grams, under 200 Grams/Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity; and Yvonne Gulick, 35, from Munday, Possessing Cocaine over Four Grams, under 200 Grams/Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity. Those waiving arraignment were: Mary Alice Masias and Dennis Masias. Joann Saucedo Flye, 31, of Knox City, pleaded guilty to an indictment charging her with Injury to a Child. Pursuant to a plea bargain agreement with the State, Flye's finding of guilt was deferred and she was placed on probation for

three years, assessed a \$500.00 fine, plus court costs. Flye was represented by Kyle Allen, a Childress attorney. A bond reduction hearing was also held for Lee Edward Shields and Yvonne Gulick. The Court denied bond reduction for Lee Edward Shields and no action was taken on Yvonne Gulick's bond reduction. Bonds in the amount of \$75,000.00 are currently set on both Shields and Gulick. On Thursday, May 4th, in the Cottle County District Court, the State's motion to revoke the probation of Daniel Ybarra, 39, of Lubbock was heard. After hearing the evidence, District Judge David Hajek continued Ybarra on probation with the special condition of confinement in a substance abuse felony punishment facility. Ybarra was originally placed on probation on March 11, 1999 after being charged and pleading guilty to felony DWI. Ybarra violated the conditions of his probation by failing to abstain from the use of alcohol and drugs, failing to complete the DWI Repeat Offender Program, and failing to pay his fine and community supervision fees. Ybarra was represented by Andrew Ottaway. A pretrial was also held on Danny Garrett, 42, of Paducah. Garrett is charged by indictment with Theft by Check. He is also represented by Andrew Ottaway. ***

Former Munday Student Receives Honor Degree

Jacob David Tidwell, former Munday graduate, received his degree from The College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A & M University on Friday, May 12, 2000. The ceremony was conducted at J. Earl Rudder Auditorium in College Station, Texas. Tidwell graduated Summa Cum Laude and held the highest grade point average for his class. Speaking at the ceremonies was world renowned medical doctor, Michael E. DeBakey. DeBakey has earned a reputation as a medical statesman, having served as an advisor to almost every president in the past fifty years and to heads of state throughout the world. He has performed over 60,000 cardiovascular surgeries and has been named honorary member of many foreign medical societies, including the Royal Societies of England, Ireland, Scotland and Australia. In 1992, he was inducted into the Academy of Athens, a society of scholars founded by the Greek philosopher Plato. Among his many prestigious awards are the Merit Order of the Republic of Egypt (1980), the International Platform Association George Crile Award as the Trailblazer in Open Heart Surgery (1988) and the Boris Petrovsky International Surgeons' Award (1997). Tidwell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Tidwell of Munday, the grandson of Vera (Bill) Tidwell of Munday Nursing Center and husband to Jennifer. Tidwell will be employed at the Texoma Veterinary Clinic in Sherman, Texas. ***

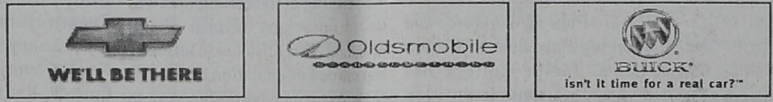

In My Mailbox: "Something Else to Smile About"

Zig Ziglar is my friend. We've never met, but he's my friend anyway. Webster defines friend as: "a person on the same side of a struggle, an ally." So, Ziglar is my friend in that sense.

In my early years, Ziglar's writing was a positive influence on my life. Like many young people, I had equal amounts of potential and self-doubt. I desperately desired to live the good life. I wanted to acquire wealth, do meaningful work, experience happiness and be an example to others. But, I didn't know where to start.

In Ziglar's books and tapes I found direction. My career advanced as my focus changed from acquiring money and material goods to helping others and building lasting relationships. Using Ziglar's moral compass, I tried to prioritize my life by putting God first, my family second, and my work third. Fascinatingly, my work, my wealth and my relationships improved.

If you are struggling with your life or career, there are many sources of help. I'd start with the Bible for spiritual guidance and then anything by Zig Ziglar would be high on my list.

A Pleasant Surprise

My column mailbox often contains some real surprises. I get letters from business leaders, politicians and readers just like you. I read them all.

Once in a great while I get something really special in the mailbox. That was the case a few weeks ago when crammed in among the letters was a padded container from the Zig Ziglar Corporation.

I felt like a little-league player who happens to be a big Mark McGwire fan who gets a baseball sized box from the St. Louis Cardinals. I hurried out to the car to open my treasure in private.

Inside, I found an autographed copy of Ziglar's new book, "Something Else to Smile About." The sub-title is: "More Encouragement and Inspiration for Life's Ups and Downs."

It is a treasure. It contains more than 100 inspirational stories from Ziglar's own experience and the lives of other men and women. I not only found something to smile about, I found new lessons on developing character and overcoming adversity. It's a good read for those times when your spirit needs a little "pick-me-up."

A Small Sample

Rather than trying to distill the essence of the book into this column, let me give you two little tastes of the book.

Here's an excerpt from the segment titled "Try It-Maybe You Can." Nearly everybody recognizes the name Nat "King" Cole. He was universally admired for his beautiful, silky-smooth voice. He could sing ballads as few have ever done. What many people do not realize is that he started his career as a piano player. One night in a West Coast club, the featured singer was ill and the owner demanded to know where he was. When Cole responded that he was sick, the club owner said, "If we don't have a singer there'll be no check." That night Nat "King" Cole became a singer. The rest is history.

Here's a segment from a narrative titled, "Handling Criticism." Col. George Washington Goethals, the man who completed the Panama Canal, handled criticism effectively. During the construction, he had numerous problems with the geography, climate and mosquitoes. Like all mammoth projects, he had his critics back home who constantly harped on what he was doing and predicted that he would never complete the project. However, he stuck to the task and said nothing. One day an associate asked him, "Aren't you going to answer the critics?" "Yes," Goethals responded. "How" he was asked. "With the canal," Goethals replied.

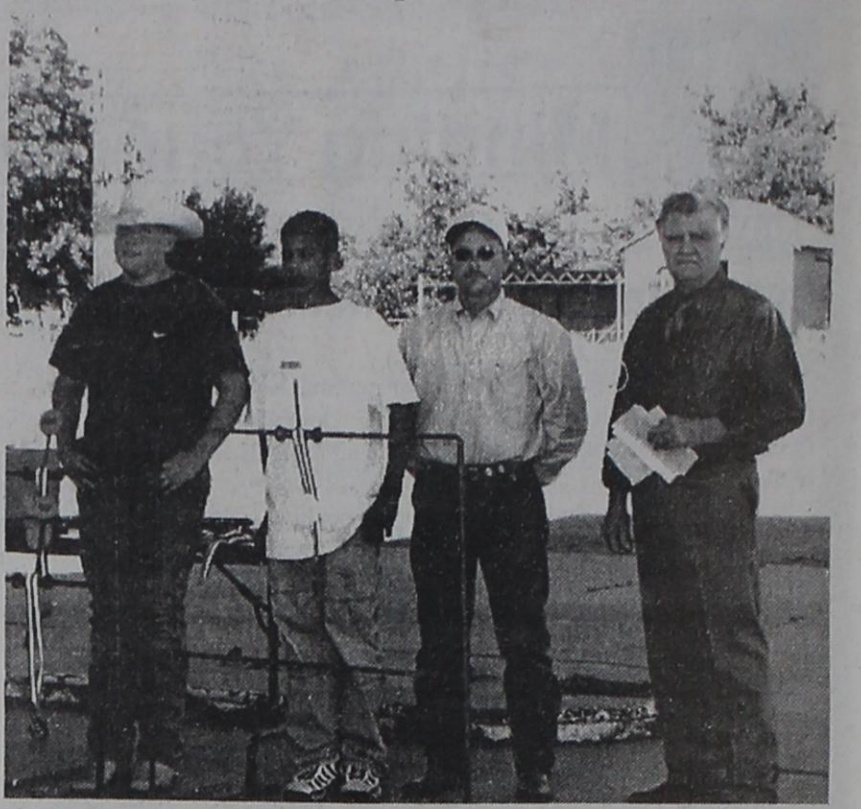

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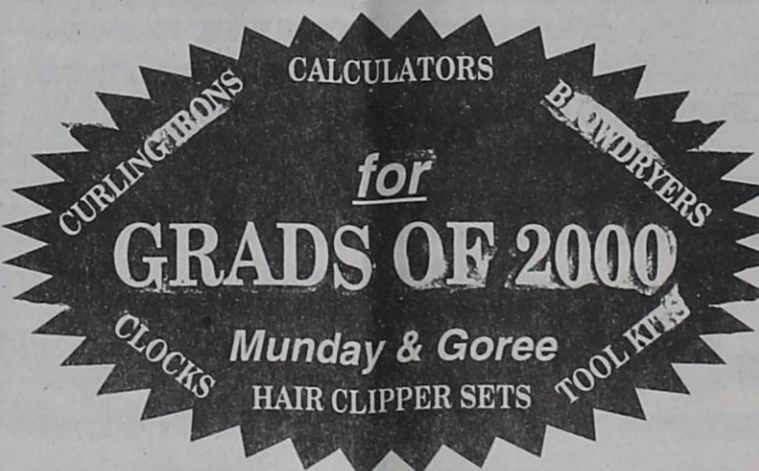
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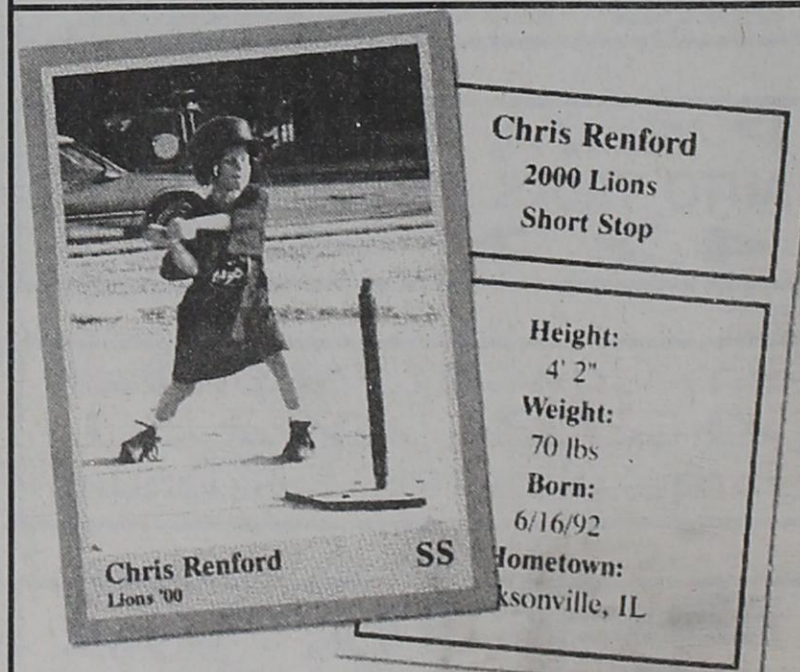

For Samantha to advance to this level, she had to make it through the church drill held at First Baptist Church in Olney, TX, the Bi-Fork Association drill also held in Olney, and on the State Semi-Final Bible drill in Abilene where she had to finish in the top four to advance as a State finalist.

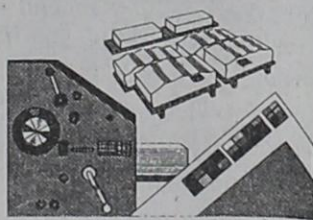
in the cafeteria. Congratulations to all of the graduates; and remember, you'd better be ready to swim fast, because, "fresh fish," you are high school students now.

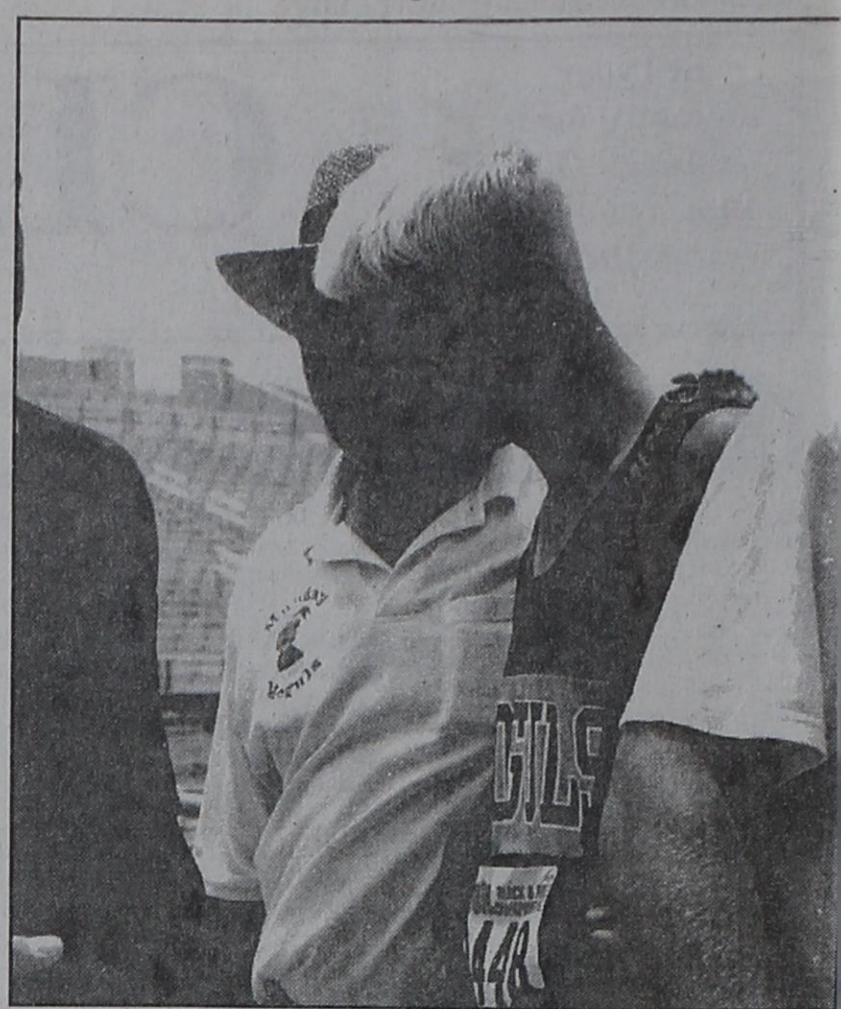
