

Black Mold displaces family from home

When Sindy and Greg Oustad returned to Greg's hometown of Munday three years ago they soon found a home that suited their needs. The older home had plenty of character and enough room to accommodate visits from their grown children and their grandchildren. Soon they were happily moved in and working on remodeling projects throughout the house.

With only one room left in the house to remodel the Oustad's carried their nails and hammers to one of the bathrooms. When this chore was finished every room in the house would soon have a finished touch. Anxious to get the task behind them the Oustad's pulled out the old tub to replace it with a newer model. Under the old tub they found a black colored mold thriving in the boards below. "We didn't think anything of it," says Sindy

Oustad. "We just cleaned it up and when on about our business."

That was in early February of this year. Then on February 14th, Greg was hospitalized with pneumonia and congestive heart failure. For several days he had trouble breathing and felt "simply terrible."

Once out of the hospital Greg again joined Sindy in the remodeling process and once again began having respiratory problems.

In the meantime their six year old grandson, Shane, who is a frequent visitor to the home, was hospitalized with pneumonia. "At first we didn't even think to associate the illness with what Greg had," says Sindy. "Shane has Downe's Syndrome and also other pulmonary problems and pneumonia is something he is prone to."

However, suspicions began to come into play when Shane's sib-

ling, 6 month old Allison, was also hospitalized with pneumonia.

The Oustad's insurance company soon came into play and called in the Center of Toxicology and Environmental Health. After taking several samples from the home and confirming "high levels of Strachybotys (black mold) in every room in the house" the Oustad's were advised to move immediately.

"We were only able to go in and take two changes of clothes and our medications," said Sindy. Black molds of other origins were also found in the house.

Black Mold is the term commonly used to describe the slimy, greenish-black substance. However, it is also know as

Large hybrid striped bass at Miller Creek Reservoir

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department District Fisheries office in Wichita Falls recently completed a gill net survey at Miller Creek Reservoir, a 2,300 acre lake east of Munday.

Our recent survey found that the hybrid striped bass in the lake are plentiful and big. All hybrids that we sampled were above the 18-inch minimum size limit and were in excellent shape. The size range of the sampled hybrids was 18-27 inches with several fish over 10 pounds. The current lake record is 16.01 lbs. so the lake has excellent trophy potential. The growth of the hybrids was good taking less than 3 years to reach legal size. To catch these fish, I suggest concentrating your angling effort on creek channels associated with flats, specifically

the second cove from the dam on the southeast side of the lake. This is where we sampled many of our larger fish.

As for the other species that we sampled, white bass numbers were good with sizes ranging from 8-16 inches and the fish were chunky. White bass were located throughout the lake. Catfish numbers were good with many nice blue catfish available to the angler. The larger blue catfish were sampled toward the lower end of the reservoir.

I should mention that boat access on this lake has recently been improved thanks to Texas Parks and Wildlife boat ramp funding. The boat ramp has been extended for low water use and has reopened to the public.

Capitol Highlights

State school board set to vote on textbooks

Another election's coming up in November that most Texans haven't heard about yet: the State Board of Education will be voting on textbooks for the school children of the state.

The stakes are high: Parents and concerned citizens worry about the impact the texts will have on children (pick a heated social issue and someone likely has an opinion about it) and publishers are vying for \$570 million in textbook sales.

The battles used to get even stormier before 1995, when legislation took away the education board's power to require textual changes in books before approving them for classroom use. Now all the board can do is approve or reject a particular battle.

This year it will have more than 200 titles to consider.

Older isn't always better...

The old saying that "you're not getting older, you just getting better" isn't always the case. A good example is evident in glancing over the Department of Public Safety's Texas Ten Most Wanted Fugitives list.

Of the nine wanted persons currently on the list (No. 10, wanted killer Wayne Owen Stubblefield, was arrested in Coryell County recently and has not been replaced,) seven are Baby Boomers born between 1951 and 1960. The eighth person on the list just barely missed the Boomer generation, having been born in 1966. (Demographers say the post-World War II baby boom ended in 1964.)

At 50, wanted murderer Margie Trevino Ortez, last known to be in the Dallas area, is the senior member of the Top Ten list. She'll celebrate her 51st birthday on May 10.

ward.
The ages of the other wanted felons are 50, 49, 48 (two), 45 and 41. The only two "kids" on the wanted list are 36 and 25.

North Texas squeaker...

No one won or lost in the March 12 primary by only one vote, but District 104 state Rep. Domingo Garcia of Dallas came close.

The recount he requested showed he lost his House seat by 41 votes, not the 38 votes counted on election night.

Garcia requested the recount after the initial tally showed him losing to challenger Roberto Alonzo.

The next step, if Garcia chooses to take it, is a court challenge. If he decides to do that, he has 30 days from the election to file suit.

Assuming no judicial reversal of the election results, Alonzo will face Republican Joe Hernandez in the general election.

Remembering the Alamo...

It's been 42 years since the last blockbuster Alamo movie was shot in Texas—John Wayne's 1960 epic filmed at the late Happy Shahan's ranch near Brackettville.

But director-actor Ron Howard, who wasn't even playing Opie yet in 1960, is considering Texas as the location of a 21st century Hollywood retelling of the 1836 siege in San Antonio.

Howard and a couple of producers had lunch last week with Gov. Rick Perry and Film Commission head Tom Copeland to discuss the project and the possibility of filming in the Lone Star state

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION COMMITTEE ANNOUNCES RECOMENDATIONS

Group develops a model for fighting terrorism

Attorney General John Cornyn urged state leaders to create a clearinghouse for monitoring and protecting the state's critical assets from a potential terrorist attack. Cornyn made the request as he and members of his State Infrastructure Protection Advisory Committee (SIPAC) released their final report on strategies aimed at preserving essential government services and forms of commerce.

Cornyn first recognized the need to fight computer crime in 1999 when he created the Internet Bureau. He later began a partnership with the federal government to address threats to critical infrastructure systems, including networks that control water, utilities, energy, transportation, finance and government systems. A critical infrastructure protection conference had been scheduled for September 13, but was delayed following the terrorist attack in the Northeast.

"The group's mission certainly took on a new sense of importance and urgency," Cornyn said. "It suddenly became clearer that a cyber attack would be extremely devastating to the health, welfare, and safety of millions of Texans."

"We now recognize that our personal safety and economic vibrancy are at great risk," said Bobby Inman, a retired admiral and SIPAC chairman. "Terrorists are more vicious in their attempts to steal or sabotage critical data stored in electronic systems. These computer networks demand the same consideration as any of the other components that make up a homeland security plan."

SIPAC's proposed clearinghouse, the Texas Infrastructure Protection Center (TIPC), would address both cyber and physical threats. It would design and implement information-sharing programs and be the central point of contact for the public and private sectors. The center would operate 24 hours a day and be staffed by government personnel who represent such state agencies as the Department of Public Safety, the Department of Emergency Management, the Department of Information Resources, the Office of Attorney General, and the Texas National Guard. A majority of the funding for the TIPC would come from federal sources.

"The foundation to our success will be the ability to share information," Cornyn added. "Government entities and private companies must be prepared to work together for the common good. We must also accomplish our goals without infringing on civil liberties. There has to be a balance between public safety and the public's confidence in open government."

Cornyn sent the SIPAC report to the governor, key state elected and executive branch officials, and federal-level officials in Washington, D.C.

Investment Guidelines For All Seasons

It's finally spring — at least according to the calendar. As we move into a new season, you may adjust your lifestyle, your schedule and even your wardrobe. But no matter what time of year it is, some things shouldn't change — such as your investment guidelines.

Review your cash balance — It's always a good idea to have from six months' to one year's worth of living expenses available in a highly liquid vehicle, such as a money market account. But beyond that, if you have too much "cash" in your portfolio, you may be depriving yourself of opportunities for long-term growth or current income.

Once you're sure you have cash set aside for emergencies, put the rest to work for you.

Never stop investing — When is the best time to invest? Today. No matter what's happening in the market at any given point, you will always have goals you want to meet — college for your kids, a comfortable retirement, etc. If you are going to meet these goals, you must invest consistently. And the sooner you start investing, the more time you will have for your money to potentially grow.

Diversify — At any given time, you'll find different classes of investments moving in different directions. Stocks may be up, while bonds are down. Or growth stocks may be up, while international stocks are down. Or municipal bonds may be up, while government-sponsored, mortgage-backed securities are down. You simply can't afford to put all your dollars in any one type of investment. By spreading your money around a variety of vehicles — stocks, bonds, Treasuries, etc. — you'll take advantage of the asset classes that are prospering, while cushioning the impact of the ones that are slumping.

By following these few basic guidelines, you'll help position yourself for investment success — winter, spring, summer and fall.

THE HAPPENINGS AT MUNDAY ELEMENTARY

On Wednesday, March 20, Joe Lowe honored the fourth grade students at Munday Elementary with his presentation of carrying the Olympic Torch for the 2002 Winter Olympics. He carried the torch in Dallas for one-fourth mile for the Olympic relay.

He had been nominated by an essay written by his wife and daughter. Our fourth graders learned the true value of writing and history in the real world!

The Olympic torch had traveled to Atlanta, Georgia, by ship and airplane from Greece. From there the relay carried the torch through the states to Salt Lake City, Utah, in time for the winter Olympics to begin.

Joe Lowe is our hero!

Double the fun, double the consonant was the rule in third grade spelling. Math classes are focusing on reviewing the 13 TAAS objectives as this test nears! Reading classes enjoyed discovering the author's purpose and learning about fact and opinion, and expository writing, outlines, and homophones kept English students on their toes. Spelling like a shining star were Andrea Angerer, Diandra Avalos, Kelly Bejar, and Rian Dillard. Way to sparkle and shine, girls!

Second graders explored the steps from "field to table" in social studies as students learned how planting corn could turn up as cornflakes in one's breakfast bowl. Math really multiplied as students multiplied by 100, counting quarters, and found the area of an object. What kind of jelly fish are you? The class figured out by a story in their basal readers. Students enjoyed painting Easter buckets to use at the approaching egg hunt.

Being a good citizen and following the rules was studied in first grade Social Studies. Students learned that rules and laws were made to protect us. Oooh, was phonics Oooverly exciting for first graders as they were overwhelmed with the various ways to spell the long "o" sound! "Ing" added to words was also checked out, and adjectives "described" English class. Subtracting by 2 was fun in math, and the nickel started to add up in math, and science class was "hot" as students studied heat.

Mrs. Murphy's kindergartners continued to type stories in the computer lab, and studied the short "e" sound. Machines at work were a working topic as the class explored how small and large machines help us work. Raising cows and cowpokes (cowboys and cowgirls) was the theme as the class checked out working on a ranch and riding in rodeos. The class also "branded"

their own brand as they looked into cowpokes clothing and heating gear. Then there was singing around the campfire as these cowpokes ate biscuits and drank coffee (watered down to water!) before settling down for a nice nap in front of the fire. Digital pictures were taken of each student sitting on a saddle in cowboy clothes to be used in the next writing assignment. This unit really left its "mark" on these guys.

Target skills in Mrs. Pankhurst's class was classifying in reading, completing sentences, and contributing to problem solving. Bunches of Munsch books were read. The math class is really adding up as students counting money to twenty cents, and cover designs for tangrams really strained brains as spatial problems are getting more difficult. The thematic unit was great as it covered the great state of Texas. Students make booklets over the state symbols and studied the six flags that have flown over Texas. In language the class read a poem titled "Little Robot". Then using the computer, the class designed three robots to do different tasks: 1 - search a ship for sunken gold, 2 - explore Mars, and 3 - explore a volcano. The students also designed robots and wrote stories about them. Trey Tidwell brought a really cool robot to share with the class.

Guess who LLeaped on the cocunut tree in Pre-K? L made a MMMagnificent leap with M right behind him! MMMust have been a MMMighty LLeap! St. Patrick's Day was celebrated with the construction of leprechan hats and windsocks, and shamrock was the shape!

The first day of spring sprung into the class with the class making season books, and the Weekly Reader was blooming with information about spring. The students also were shown fruit trees that were beautifully blooming. For snacks to go with L and M, the class had lemonade, chocolate and vanilla milkshakes, monkey bread, and muffins. Helping to furnish some snacks were Llittle MMonkeys Bryant Booe and Raci Dillard. Parker Finley was the first Pre-K student to reach the BOOK IT! Beginners goal for March. Parker read Llots and Llots and Mmany and Mmany books (50!). Way to go, Parker!

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Test is quickly approaching. Test dates for students in grades 3 through 6th are as follows: Tuesday, April 16 Math, Wednesday, April 17 Reading. Teachers and students have been busy all year working on mastering the TAAS objectives that cor-

relate with the TEKS for each grade. Now comes the time of fin tuning to get everyone as prepared as possible. Let's knock the top out of the TAAS!

The third RIF book distribution is set for Tuesday, April 9, 2002. The end of the six weeks AR Party will also be held in conjunction with the RIF book give away. It will really be something

to cheer about as more details will come.

NAP Federal Regulations published for 2001 and future years

Non-Insured Assistance Program (NAP) regulations were published on March 19, 2002. NAP regulations have been amended to remove area requirements, announce new requirements regarding the filing of applications, payment of service fees and reporting of crop acreage, yield and production. These regulatory amendments are designed to improve the overall operation of the program and to conform the regulations with changes to the program made in recent legislation.

Producers have 30 calendar days after March 19, 2001, to do the following:

Submit a 2001 and/or 2002 crop CCC-471 (Application for Coverage) by April 18, 2002 and pay the applicable service fee(s) at that time.

Report 2001 crop year production for crops, if available. Application closing dates for all 2002 crops in Texas have passed. According to Paragraph 323A of Handbook 1-NAP (Rev 1), for each crop for which an acreage report is filed, the producer must report all production for that acreage not later than the immediately subsequent crop year application closing date for the crop.



Elementary receives grant from State Technology Fund

Strachybotys Chartarum and Strachybotys Atra. Areas and substances where black mold can be found include water soaked wood, ceiling tiles, wall paneling, cardboard, even items made of cotton. It can grow on drywall and insulation and can infest areas in the floors, walls and ceilings.


Black Mold is not necessarily dangerous to humans while it is growing. When the mold is disturbed the spores become air born and that is when health problems may occur. Black Mold can cause respiratory bleeding and is a contributing factor to asthma and bronchitis among other problems.

Black mold can be found in almost every location on the map and is not confined to one area. It has been a health problem across the nation for several years and has forced insurance companies to raise rates throughout the United States. The mold is not caused by humans and the increase in insurance is not exclusive to the Munday area.

The Oustad's are now waiting to find out the fate of their home. Since they originally moved out of the location Sindy has been

able to go in only one more time to retrieve a few more sets of clothing. "When I went in I had to wear a gas mask and rubber gloves. I put clothing into a paper bag and then had to immediately wash the clothing in hot water with a special detergent," she says. "Since the exact extent of the mold is not known (at present time) we are not sure if we will be able to return to the house or even if we will be able to retrieve some more of our belongings," says Oustad. "Many of the household items may not be able to be thoroughly cleaned. The hardest part of this whole thing is not knowing what's going to happen," she says. "We don't know if we'll have a house and belongings."

But the Oustad's are looking forward and realize that they have been blessed to find out rather early on about the mold conditions of their home. "It's been a nightmare but we are going forward," says Greg Oustad. "We don't have any reason to do otherwise. What we really hope is that this doesn't happen to anyone else."


