

Coach Terry Taylor proudly presented senior Brandon Urbanczyk with the Powerlifting Award.



Progressive Farmer Day Camp to teach area children basics of Farm Safety

For many children, the farm is a workplace, home and playground. Teaching them how to take some of the responsibility for their own safety on the farm is the subject of an upcoming area event. Texas Cooperative Extension - Knox & Haskell Counties in conjunction with the Progressive Farmer magazine will present a Farm Safety Day Camp on Saturday, May 31 at the Munday High School from 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Through hands-on activities, camp participants will learn how to prevent farm incidents and how to reduce the extent of injuries if incidents do occur. Scheduled speakers and interactive demonstrations will reinforce the importance of children taking responsibility for their own safety, respecting parents' safety rules and sharing safety tips with their family and friends.

Many Knox and Haskell County community members are contributing their knowledge to this learning experience. The Munday Volunteer Fire Department will be teaching Fire Safety techniques through hands on activities. Employees of Tri-County Electric Cooperative will discuss Electrical Safety as they demonstrate electrical arching and Gary Rozzell with the Texas Department of Public Safety is scheduled to present a fun session on Seatbelt Safety. Other learning sessions will round out the day with information on Firearm Safety, Weather Safety, Tractor and

Equipment Safety, Basic First Aid/911, Chemical Protection/Storage, Animal Safety, and Shop Equipment Safety.

Parents and Grandparents can register their children to participate in the camp by calling and requesting an application from the Knox County Extension Office at (940) 459-2651 or the Haskell County Extension Office at (940) 864-2546 or 2658. Completed registrations must be received by May 16. A \$10.00 registration fee for the event covers lunch, snacks, a take-home packet and a farm safety day camp T-shirt. A family discount of \$25.00 is available. On site registration will be \$15.00 per child. Only 100 campers will be accepted so submit applications as soon as possible.

School finance plan heads to special session

AUSTIN — The final bell for the 78th Legislature will ring when it concludes business on June 2, but Texas lawmakers won't have to wait two years before they get a chance to vote on another bill.

It may not be until late this year, or early in 2004, but lawmakers will be back in Austin for a special session to ponder school financing.

"Following the completion of this session," Gov. Rick Perry said in a statement last week, "Lt. Gov. (David) Dewhurst, Speaker (Tom) Craddick, and I will turn our undivided attention to the issue of school-finance reform."

Perry said that as soon as "leadership has built consensus on a plan of action, I will call a special session...to immediately enact that plan."

The first step in that direction came with the speaker naming a 21-member House committee to come up with a financing plan for consideration in the special session. Four ex-officio members of the committee were to be selected by Perry.

Better known as the Robin Hood plan, Texas' school financing system is more complicated than second year algebra, a complex mixture of state and local taxes.

Apportionment of that money is based on the wealth (or, in many cases, lack of wealth) of a particular school district.

The more well-to-do districts, many of which have been forced to cut their budgets while kicking in funding for the less well-off districts, don't like the current system.

The only thing that could head off a special session would be action this session. That's possible, but at this point not very likely.

The last special session was more than a decade ago in December 1992. The topic?

School finance.

Red-light runners get green light...

The House last week killed a bill that would have given cities the authority to photograph red-light runners and fine the registered owners of the vehicles.

House Bill 901, co-authored by Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, co-author of House Bill 901, said the defeated measure would have had an impact on the 23,000 injuries and deaths red-light runners cause each year in Texas.

The bill would have allowed cities to impose a \$75 fine for each violator. The money collected would have gone to fund hospital trauma centers and the Texas Mobility Fund.

Arguments against the bill ranged from its fostering invasion of privacy to violating due process to raising revenue in the name of safety.

What did the bill in was an amendment by Rep. Gary Elkins, R-Houston, that would have made the bill apply only to communities with fewer than 50 residents.

You've probably noticed, but...

Gasoline prices are down. After hitting an average national high of \$1.72 a gallon for regular, the national average is now down to \$1.57 per gallon.

In Texas, the average is \$1.45 though some places are selling gasoline for more than a dime a gallon less than that.

The averages are from the Energy Information Administration, an arm of the U.S. Department of Energy.

Financial Focus

This Mother's Day, Give a Gift That Lasts

It's almost Mother's Day. This year, instead of giving Mom flowers or candy - or at least in addition to the flowers or candy - why not give a gift that can last? Specifically, why not help your mother - or your grandmother - improve her financial picture?

Of course, you could always just give a gift of cash, but there are many other ways to help out. You could, for example, give stocks. It isn't much more difficult than giving cash, but you do have to keep a few things in mind. Make sure you know what you originally paid for the stock (its "tax basis"), how long you've held it and its fair market value at the date of the gift. You'll also need to determine if you have to pay gift taxes. (You can give up to \$11,000 per year, free of gift taxes, to as many people as you want.) Your mother will need this information to determine gains or losses when she decides to sell the stock you've given her.

Both you and your mother can gain valuable tax advantages from your gift of stock. When you gave your mother the stock, you also gave her your "holding period" - the amount of time you've held the stock. So, even if she only owns the stock for a day or so before selling it, she'll just have to pay the long-term capital gains tax rate, which may be considerably lower than her current income tax rate. And by giving your mother the shares of stock, you will also benefit - because you'll avoid the capital gains taxes you'd have to pay if you sold the stock yourself. However, before taking any action, consult with your tax adviser to discuss these issues.

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Field Day Focuses On Wheat, Forage Production

Farmers and stockmen can update their knowledge of wheat production, weed control, and other forage crops at a May 8 wheat field day sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension and hosted by AgriPro.

Texas Cooperative Extension is a statewide education agency and a member of the Texas A&M University System's diverse Agriculture Program. Extension is linked in a unique partnership with the United States Department of Agriculture's Cooperative Extension System, working in close cooperation with the County Commissioner's Courts.

The AgriPro farm near Lockett, Texas, will host this event. The farm is west of Vernon on U.S. Highway 70. The field day begins with registration at 9:30 a.m. Field tours begin at 10 a.m.

Jackie Rudd, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station wheat breeder stationed in Amarillo, will discuss the current Texas wheat breeding program - including current, new, and up-and-coming varieties. The latest commercially-available hard white wheat varieties will be available for first-hand field plot inspection by producers.

Todd Baughman, Extension agronomist at Vernon, will discuss Clearfield wheat technology as well as proven strategies for chemical weed control. "Clearfield" wheats are varieties bred for herbicide tolerance,

much like Roundup Ready cotton. These varieties may give producers more, and possibly more effective, weed control options in their wheat crop.

Gaylon Morgan, Extension small grains specialist based at College Station, will discuss how planting dates can affect optimum forage production.

Art Klatt, Oklahoma State University plant breeder, will discuss the uses and utility of triticale as a forage crop. Klatt and other researchers are screening winter triticales for their forage production potential - for uses as graze-out and hay crops that may produce hard red winter wheats. The current farm bill includes triticale as a program crop, with production incentives similar to those for crops such as wheat and oats.

There is no charge to attend, and a lunch will be served. Donnell Brown, RA Brown Ranches, Throckmorton, will address "Quality Agriculture Programs" as the luncheon speaker.

Field day participants can qualify to earn three continuing education units (CEU's), noted Galen Chandler, Texas Cooperative Extension district agriculture director. For more information on the May 8 Wheat Field Day, call your local county Extension office or the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center here at (940) 552-9941.

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QUESTION: I can't find the word "Trimec" on any labels. Is it the same as 2,4-D? - G. T.

ANSWER: Trimec is in Ferti-Lome's Weed-Out. It will be stated on the label or a rectangular Trimec logo will be some where on the containers.

Trimec is a combination of three broad leaf hormone based post merge ingredients. 2,4-D is but one component.

Always apply according to label directions if you decide to utilize any weed control aid.

QUESTION: Mr. Groom, We live in Central Texas....we planted some Mexican Heather in our flower bed last spring...they did very well, but they've 'curled up' over the winter....we are wondering if they will grow back in our part of the state, or should we pull them up and plant some new ones?

Thanks! - B. H.

ANSWER: It is hard to say. You may want to give them a "hair cur" and wait a few weeks to see if they regrow. They are not known to be 100% winter hardy in the Central Texas area.

If, they are not out by the end of April I'd plant more.

QUESTION: I can't find Carl Pools BR-61. I'm about ready to decapitate a plumeria and make some cuttings from it. I, as always, appreciate your help. - DWN

ANSWER: Carl Pool BR-61 should be available at independent retailers. You may wish to check the web at www.carlpool.com for a retailer in your area. Scott Hammer at Carl Pool should be able to answer your availability question. You may wish to send an e-mail to his attention.

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Commissioners' Court

Be it remembered on the 31st day of March 2003, there was conducted a Special Called Meeting of the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas, at the Courthouse thereof, in the City of Benjamin, Texas, for the purpose of transacting any and all business that lawfully may be brought before the same.

Knox County Judge Greg Clonts brought the Special Called meeting of the Commissioners' Court to order at the Courthouse in Benjamin, Texas. Also present were commissioners Weldon Skiles, Jerry Parker, Jimmy Urbanczyk, and Johnny Birkenfeld, Sheriff Dean Homstad, Treasurer Penny Goodwin, Tax Assessor-Collector Stanton Brown, Constable Buddy Curd, Aging Center Director Susan Cockerell, and Clerk Ronnie Verhalan. Also present was Mary Rosas, representing the auditing firm of Stovall, Grandey & Whatley.

The Court considered the following matters as posted and filed for Record in the office of the County Clerk on March 27, 2003 at 3:30 P.M.

Representing Stovall, Grandey & Whatley, Mary Rosas presented to the Court the audit report for fiscal year 2002. She said, from the outset, that everything was stated correctly in our records. The main problem the auditing firm found was that there were excessive expenditures over revenues and therefore a general decrease in the County's fund balance of \$92,606. Revenue increased over the previous fiscal year, but so did expenses. The largest variance was in employee insurance. During the hour-and-a-half presentation, there was much give and take, questions and answers. Under "advisory comments", Mrs. Rosas brought up three issues involving the Clerks' office and one involving the Sheriff's office. No action was taken at this time.

Members of the Court consid-

ered an inter-local cooperative contract between Knox County and the Texas Department of Public Safety whereby the County would put certain information into a data-base, and if a person owed fines, the offender would not be allowed to review his or her drivers license until the outstanding fines were paid. Commissioner Birkenfeld so moved, Commissioner Parker seconded, and all approved.

The Court considered approving an internet auction arrangement to sell slurped County equipment. Judge Clonts emphasized that that would be only one option, that the County would not be giving the virtual auctioneers exclusive rights to sell the equipment; a bid could be rejected, and the County could still sell locally. Commissioner Urbanczyk moved to pursue the option, Commissioner Skiles provided a second, and the motion was unanimously adopted.

Director of Aging Services Susan Cockerell gave a report on her agency, including a report of an executive meeting on March 20, 2003. (C.C. Minutes, 3-31-2003, #1) She reported that the STEP Program, because of these perilous economic times and the consequent attempts to retrench economically, is in imminent danger of losing its state funding, thus being eliminated or greatly reduced and endangering the jobs of many older people and of the programs they serve. (C.C. Minutes, 3-31-2003, #2) Ms. Cockerell answered many questions from the commissioners and told of her thoughts on how to save money within the program. Judge Clonts asked her to meet regularly with the Court (on Regular Court days) to keep the Court apprised of the situation; she affirmed that she would. Information only.

Judge Clonts gave the Court an update of his investigations into obtaining for the Courthouse DSL high-speed internet access that

would allow the elimination of seven dedicated phone lines. Other possibilities include a wireless system with an antenna on each computer to connect with a satellite; some security concerns are inherent in this system. Information only.

The judge also gave an update on the Texas Domestic Preparedness Assessment that should, in his estimation, be finished by the April 11 deadline. Representatives from Benjamin, Goree, Knox City, Munday, and Knox County have met several times lately after 5:00 P.M. to discuss the matter. The group has engaged Rob Harrison to coordinate the data input, and his fees will be split equally among the participants. Information only.

Among the items briefly discussed were: (1) Sheriff Homstad said that the County may be retained again to patrol the Truscott Brine Lake. (2) Regular meetings of the Commissioners' Court will normally meet from now on at 1:30 P.M. instead of at 9:30 A.M., as has lately been the practice. (3) The Court may consider the possibility of consolidating 9-1-1 services for Knox and several surrounding counties. These items were for information only.

There being no further business to come before the Court at this time, upon motion by Commissioner Parker, seconded by Commissioner Skiles, and carried unanimously, the meeting of the Court was adjourned.

Munday Elementary to Offer ESL Summer School

Enrollment in the program is optional with the parents of the student.



And so hath Col. Jack W. Williams "slipped the surly bonds of earth" and gone to meet the Pilot face to face. He will be remembered fondly as one who had "The Right Stuff."

Born in the small rural Texas town of Munday, on 1/19/1917, Jack was two months premature. He weighed only slightly over two pounds and was not expected to live. His parents, Posey and Roxy Williams made a shoe box his crib. From this inauspicious beginning he persevered. He became an all-state guard on his Munday High School football team and a Golden Glove boxer at Texas A&M where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering in 1941.

Jack received his wings in the Army Air Corps in 1942. While stationed at Wright-Patterson Field in Dayton, Ohio in 1942, he test piloted 118 different aircraft (including the XC-69, XA-32, XA-38, XC-74, XC-96, the German Focke-Wulf 190, the Japanese Zero, and the British Lancaster). He received the Air Medal for his work as a test pilot. Temporarily leaving military service in 1946, Jack test piloted for Howard Hughes Aircraft Co. (the XF-11) and Republic Aviation Corp. (the XF-12). He rejoined the United States Air Force at Bolling AFB in Washington D.C. in 1947 with the rank of Major. He then served with the 19th Bombardment Group in Guam. From 1950 to 1954, he was Operational Staff Officer with Material Command at Tinker AFB in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. While attending Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Virginia, he was promoted to Full Colonel in 1955. From there he was assigned to Ladd AFB in Fairbanks, Alaska, where he commanded the 5001st Maintenance and Supply Group and the 5060th Aircraft and Warning Group. In 1958 he assumed command of the 408th Fighter Group at Kingsley AFB in Klamath Falls, Oregon. In 1960 he became Director of Operations for the Portland Air Defense Sector at Adair AFB in Corvallis, Oregon. In 1962, he became Base Commander of the 57th Fighter Group at Paine AFB in Everett, Washington. From 1964 to 1968, Colonel Williams was Director of AFCENT for NATO in Fontainebleau, France and Brunssum, Holland. In 1968 he became Commander of the 3750th Air Base Group at Sheppard AFB in Wichita Falls, Texas. Colonel Williams retired in 1970 after 30 years of military service for which he received the Meritorious Service Medal.

Jack was a member of the Ventura County Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America, the Shriners, and the Wright Stuff Association.

Colonel Williams is survived by his wife of 60 years, Elizabeth J. Williams of Ojai, CA.; his daughter and son-in-law, Jackie and Horst Ringhof of Casitas Springs; his daughter and son-in-law, Jane and Rob Wedin of Laguna Niguel, CA and granddaughter, Roberta Wedin and grandson, Nicholas Wedin; his son, Jack Williams, Jr. of Ojai, CA; and his son and daughter-in-law Roy and Laurel Williams of Ventura, CA and granddaughters Heather Williams and Kristin Williams.
