



## **Livestock Sale Held in Vernon** Vernon, Texas, Oct. 5 .- Supplies of both stockers and butchers were plentiful Thursday at the weekly auction of the Vernon Livestock

Sales Commission. Rates on all good quality stock held fully steady to unevenly stronger, while medium good and plain cattle moved from level to somewhat lower. Wellfinished, long-fed steers and heifers of the stocker sorts found immed iate outlets to shippers at \$1.75 to \$2.50 per head upward. Medium good cows, both killers and stockers, moved just about steady, and culls took a sharp trend of \$3.50 to \$5 per head downward. Inbetween grades of calves and yearlings were down 1.75 to \$3.59 per head. Total receipts for the 538 head of stock sold amounted to \$14,875.

Weekly Health Letter! Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox.

M.D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin, Texas .- The State could appropriate and spend one million dollars annually on a health program without cost to the State, de clares the Texas State Department of Health. This can be demonstrated in connection with our chools alone, without regard to the saving effected in the general ecoomic life of the State.

If the State Department of Health had such a sum for the naintenance of a comprehensive health program in all public schools, more than that amount could be shifted back to the general fund by the schools, through savings to their fund effected by the elimination of repeaters and other costs incident to health conditions.

At least 25 per cent of the pupils in our public schools do not make a grade per year and have to be taught a second year in the same grade. White quail are the result of the lack of pigments in the feathers of the birds, but white quail, or any other species of birds or animals is not considered albino, the term most commonly applied to them, unless they have pink eyes.
