

With or without these adjustments, Noodles Romanoff is a dish that can be put together quickly and easily. Only you'll need to plan for it ahead of time, since it calls for sour cream and cottage cheese which one doesn't usually have on hand.

NOODLES ROMANOFF

1 5-or 6-oz. pkg. egg noodles (2 to 3 cups uncooked)
1 cup cottage cheese (dry or creamed) (½ pt.)

cheese (1% lb.) Cook noodles until tender (about 15 minutes) in 3 qt. boiling water to which 1 tbsp. salt has been added. Drain. Mix in lightly the cottage cheese, sour cream, onion, garlic, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco sauce or red pepper, and salt. Place in buttered baking dish (8-inch round dish 3 inches deep or a 5½ by 9½-inch oblong dish 1¾ inches deep). Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven (350° F.). Serves 4 to 6. To serve 2 to 3, make ½ the recipe.

Hard crusted rolls are ideal with this dish. But any good fresh rolls will do if you cannot obtain the hard crusted kind from your baker. Here are the directions for making the filling for the Pink Rhubarb Pie which rounds out this supper menu so refreshingly—

PINK RHUBARB PIE

Pastry for Two Crust Pie 3 cups fresh rhubarb cut in 1 inch pieces (about 1 lb.)

4 tbsp, all-purpose flour 1 to 1½ cups sugar 2 tbsp, butter

sauce (according to taste)
Dash of Tabasco sauce or red

*The amount of sugar depends on the tartness of the rhubarb. The hot house rhubarb is very mild and does not require nearly as much sugar as the other.

Line a shallow 8-inch pie pan* with pastry and chill. Mix together

Line a shallow 8-inch pie pan" with pastry and chill. Mix together 2 tbsp. of the flour and 2 tbsp. of the sugar. Sprinkle this over the lower crust and heap the rhubarb on top of it. Mix the remaining sugar and flour together and sprinkle over the top of the rhubarb. Dot with butter. Wet edge of under crust. Lay top crust gently on top of filling—folding the extra rim of pastry under edge of lower crust. Press the two edges together and build up fluted edge. Bake in a hot oven, 450° F., for the first 15 minutes; then reduce to 350° F., moderate oven, for 45 minutes.
