It is difficult to realize what a crushing economic burden war and preparations for war are placing on the peoples of the world, to say nothing of the terrible sacrifices of human lives which war

We think and rightly, that the expenditures Harvey Lee being made for national defense by our own country are enormous, but relatively they are small compared with those of other great powers. This is illustrated by an estimate given in the United States News, which compares military expenditures of various nations with their national income. It says:

"Where the United States devotes less than 3 per cent of national income to defense, Britain isdevoting 30 per cent, Japan 30 per cent, France 40 he Munday Times office. per cent, and Germany as much as 50 per cent."

No estimates are given for Russia, Italy or other nations, but it is known that all are making expenditures for armaments far greater than ever before. And in every one still heavier burdens will be laid on the peoples as the theatres of war are extended, as now seems inevitable.
