# Some Facts Concerning the Road Bond Issue to Be Voted On August 15

An election has been ordered by the Commissioners Court of Knox County to be held on August 15th to determine whether or not bonds in the sum of \$135,-000 shall be issued for the building of a hard surfaced road from the Baylor county line to the Haskell county line, through the towns of Munday and Goree.

All property tax paying voters residing within Commissioners Precinct No. 4 will be entitled to a vote in said election. All of Commissioners Precinct No. 4 has been included in Knox County Independent Road District No. 2-A formed by a special act of the Texas Legislature.

Knox County Independent Road District No. 2-A was created by the State Legislature upon the request of a large number of citizens of Commissioners Precinct No. 4 who were unfavorable to the voting of a county-wide bond issue of approximately \$8,000,000, as was agitated in various sections of the county prior to the creation of this district, and was created for the protection of the taxpayers of this precinct, as is evidenced by the fact that this precinct will receive identically the same amount of hard-surfaced road by the precinct bond issue as it would by a county issue, and at a cost to the voters of approximately one-third of that which would be paid by the tax payers of this precinct in a county-wide

Highway No. 30, running through Goree and Munday is the only State and Federal Highway treversing this commissioners precinct, and approximately thirteen miles of Highway No. 30 lies within this district. The Texas Highway Commission and representatives of the Federal Government have agreed to extend State and Federal aid in the construction of a concrete highway over that portion of Highway No. 30 lying within Knox county provided that the precinct votes bonds to the amount of one-third of the cost of such a highway.

According to the agreement with the State and Federal Governments, if the precinct votes bonds to the extent of \$135,000 State and Federal aid to the amount of \$270,000 will be granted, making a total of \$405,000 for the construction of this highway through Knox county.

This \$405,000 will provide \$30,000 per mile for the construction of this high-way, and according to the best engineers, will build the highest type of concrete road.

Highway No. 30 is not only one of the most important highways in Texas but is a most important Federal highway, and extends from Canada to the Mexican border, and is regarded by the Federal road engineers as the most logical military highway from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Fort Levenworth, Kansas to the Mexican border, and because of the importance of this highway as an interstate and military road the Federal Government has made known its plans to reroute this highway in such a way as to miss Knox county entirely, in case we do not provide one-third the cost of building the highway through the county.

The Federal engineers are favorable to another route for this highway, which

would shorten the distance between Wichita Falls and Abilene by about fifteen miles, but, have pledged to build the highway through this precinct if we will provide one-third the cost of building same.

If these bonds are voted and the highway built through the cooperation of the State and Federal Governments there will be no more costs to the tax-payers of this precinct or county for maintenance, as it will be maintained permanently by the State and Federal Governments, and the commissioner of this precinct will be relieved of all responsibility and will thereby be enabled to devote all of his funds and efforts toward the building and maintenance of lateral roads.

Samming up the facts as they are, it is up to the tax-payers of this precinct to protect themselves by voting for this bond issue, which will cost them from 30 to 35 cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, or have voted upon them a county-wide bond issue that will cost them approximately one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation, and the benefits to accrue to this precinct will be no more than that received in this precinct project.

This Good Roads Committee has for its purpose the presentation of facts concerning the pending bond issue, and with a desire to be of service we shall be glad to answer any questions that anyone may wish to ask concerning this bond issue. Address all communications to this committee at Munday and answers will be published in the order in which they are received.

With the building of this highway the citizens of this community will have a direct connection with the great net-work of highways traversing every section of the state and will give us direct connection with all the leading cities of Texas and other states in all kinds of weather, thereby providing better local markets for all products and placing our community in close touch with the outside world rather than being isolated, as we will be if this great highway should be diverted to miss us.

#### THE ROAD BOND ISSUE

On more than one occasion this paper has voiced its opposition to road bond issues, our opposition being based upon observations that in a great majority of instances the roads built with, money derived from bond issues had worn out long before the bonds had been matured, and our belief that the continuation of such a policy would lead to the bankrupcy of the people thus training service. The objection above referred to is removed by the fact that when the highway involved in this bond issue is built] it will forever thereafter be maintained by the State and Federal Governments and the people of this county will be relieved for all time to come from responsibilities as to maintenance.

And there are a number of other good reasons why the citizens of this community should support the bond issue now pending, and we shall try to present a few of them.

Since Highway No. 30 represents all of the designated highway lying within this precinct, we would receive only the thirteen miles of this highway in such an issue, and a tax levy of approximately \$1.00 on the one hundred dollar valuation would be re- wonderful hour with us on the Southwest to select from. quired to take care of such a project, while conservative figures | reveal that this same thirteen miles of highway can be cared for in this precinct issue with a tax levy of approximately 30 cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, or at a cost less than onethird of that which would be required in a county-wide issue.

The above paragraph in a large measure explans the reasons To Be Missionaries." for the creation of the independent road district embracing this commissioners precinct, and clearly shows that it was created as a matter of protection to the people of this precinct, who would be called upon to bear approximately 38 per cent of the burden should a county-wide issue be voted upon them.

And, we might add here, that should the county-wide issue be voted it would be necessary under the lews of the state to assume the indebtedness of road districts that have previously issued bonds, and this cost would be placed upon the county as a whole, of which this precinct would be forced to bear 38 per cent, er With Him-Ozella Brock. and of which we have not and will not receive any benefits. And it doesn't require much reasoning to readily see the advantages that would accrue to a portion of the county thus bonded in giv ng the county-wide issue their undivided suppo linked with other sections of the county where valuations are far less than in this precinct, and where great benefts would accrue, would insure the county-wide issue receiving much support in all sections of the county, and would almost insure its success.

It has further been pointed out that unless that portion of Highway No. 30 traversing Knox county is improved that this important thoroughfare will be re-routed in such a way as to miss Knox county, which would mean that the people of this section would be left entirely without a designated highway and would be served only by lateral roads to be maintained for all time to come by the meager funds that are alloted to our commissioner for that purpose, while the retention of this highway will relieve him of this burden and will allow him to devote his entire time and all of his funds to the building and maintenance of our lateral road system.

In the building of this highway through our county we will receive two dollars for each dollar that is voted in bonds, twothirds of the burden being borne by the State and Federal Governments, and should we fail to bear our portion of this cost and the highway is diverted it would be necessary for us to bear at least half the burden of the building at any future date.

We believe that few of our people really realize the importance of this highway through our county. We doubt if many are aware that it is the only No. 1 highway running north and south between Fort Worth and Lubbock. We doubt if many realize that the United States Government is looking forward to the completion of this great highway as a military highway between Fort Sill and other Government posts and the Mexcian border as a matter of quick transportation of troops in case trouble should arise with Mexico. We doubt if the people of this community realize that the Highway Commission of Texas look with greater favor on this road project than any other project in West


