

An phan at eight years of age, he came to Knox county in 1899 upon the sug-gestion and advice of a country school eacher in Johnson county who had inspired his ambition to become a lawyer. Up to that time no one had ever told him he could do anything but manual labor and he has ever regarded her as his benefactor. He read the books with the idea of learning law and had some knowledge gained in this way by reading nights after his day's work.
