The most important fire prevention measures to be adhered to in the installation of stoves and pipes are:

Is Questioned provided in the form of asbestos board sheet iron or tin guard walls. 2. The floor beneath the stove should be protected with metal at least 12 inches on each side. 3. All smokepipes should connect directly mokepipes should connect directly

into a chimney. They should not pass through walls and partitions Where they do, the pipes should be separated from the wall by means of a special kind of metal box called a "thimble," and it should be made of galvanized iron, doublewalled and ventilated. 4. Smoke-

pipes should not be permitted to pass through floors, closets or other concealed spaces. Where this faulty construction exists and cannot be altered, the pipe should be surrounded by a ventilated thimble with a radial thickness of at least inches. It must extend three

Always dispose of ashes in a metal can, never in a wooden box or barrel.
