W-2 Forms To Be Received by Jan. 31

Employers, Internal Revenue Service has a reminder for you. Employees should receive two copies of a Withholding State-ment, Form W-2, on or before Wednesday, January 31, 1962.

Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., Adminis-trative Officer of the Internal Revenue Service at Abilene said "This statement shows the total wages paid and the income tax and social security tax withheld if any, during the calendar year 1961."

Total wages shown on an em-ployee's W-2 must include the amounts received as sick pay from his employer, even though no tax has been withheld to such sick pay. Sick pay is not required to be shown separately. If it becomes necessary to

correct a W-2 after it has been given to an employee, a revised statement must be issued and marked "corrected by employer."


