At the same time, it can be said that, because Mr. In first zone, per year Morrisss holds this office he is in better position than anyone else to give an unbiased opinion if he wishes to do so. Those who know Mr. Morriss will give him credit for being entirely honest in any statement that he makes.

Careful analysis of this or any other generally inflationary tendency, however, will make unnecessary anybody's personal word to disprove that individual retailers, or other distributors or manufacturers, are generally guilty of causing price increases. General price inflation, except in the instances where speculative frenzy has been the principal cause, is much more deeply rooted. There is usually much mouthing by politicians against profiteering because this is good politics, yet the politicians themselves, rather than the manufacturers or distributors of goods, have been responsible for most of this world's price inflation. The public will, and ought to, keep a careful eye on individual attempts to profiteer. It will serve a good purpose, but prices are going up primarily because the individual retailer and manufacturer have no alternative but to raise prices or go into bankruptcy. During the last year the net increase in the prices of raw materials, farm products and minerals, and labor have been sufficient to account for the entire rise on the cost of living.-Dallas Morning News.

WHEN WILL THE BRITISH ATTACK

The record shows that industry has already finshed and delivered a dollar volume of defense goods greater than the government specified as necessary for our defense as late as March 10 of this year. Nearly ten billions of dollars of equipment has been turned over to the government-more than had even been ordered seven months ago.

Before the passage of the lease-lend bill American industry was asked to produce \$9,329,000,000 worth of defense equipment of all kinds some of it equipment that had never been made here in quanity before. Factories that had been turning out civilian goods had to be changed over to defense production, and new factories had to be built.

All this was done and done quickly on the basis of the total appropriation of \$9,329,000,000.

Today, with the pending lease-lend additions, appropriations total \$66,000,000,000 an increase of 607 per cent since March-and the end is not in sight. Donald M. 

The chief difficulty, according to Mr. Epperson, has been that many people have not had a clear idea of what partial unemployment is and when benefits are payable for the Texas Unemployment Compendescribe it," he said, "is to point out that a worker is partial unemployed when he continues to but suffers a loss of earnings because his working hours are reduced below normal full-time. A man does not have to lose his job to be eligible for partial benefits. In other words, the employer-employee relationship is maintained, available for full-time work if his employer needs him."

Mr. Epperson made it clear that partial benefits are payable only when the worker's reduced earnings are due to lack of work on his regular job. They are not intended to compensate workers who, for personal reasons, choose to work less than full-time.

Mr. Roy Epperson urged both employers and workers to familiarize themselves with the new procedure and asked them to cooperate with their local State Emplyoment Office in initiating the payment of claims for partial unemployment benefits to all who are entitled to



Details For Farm Program Are Under Way

Speeding up work to get 1942 AAA allotments to farmers by November 1 is the gigantic task facing county officers now, August Schumacher, chairman of the Knox county AAA committee, announced

Allotments are being issued about six months before the usual time since all decks must be cleared for the house-to-house canvass in the national defense program, the AAA official said. The farm plan ers plant crops for maximum payments under the AAA program, will be used by committeemen in the feed and food compaign.

Since greater production of milk, eggs, and other foodstuffs, are being asked of Texas farmers, county goals will be announced in a few weeks, Mr. Schumacher said. Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard outlined details of the defense program to southern agricultural workers in Memphis, Tenn., September 29 and 30.

Flexibility of the AAA program to curtail production of surplus commodities and at the same time increase production of commodities essential to defense needs is evidenced by the 1942 AAA program which has been designed to

meet a national emergency, Mr. Schumacher said.

Cotton, wheat, rice and peanut allotments will be established as in former years but no general allotments will be made because of the increased emphasis on feed and food. Allotments will also be established for commercial Irish po-

It is soluble in about 9000 parts of water, less soluble in alcohol, sparingly soluble in amyl acetate, very soluble in sodium hydroxide, insoluble in chloroform og ether. It's aqua solution is of a greenish color, which disappears on addition of an alkali. When in solution and exposed to light it rapidly deteriorates, but in the solid form the deterioration is very slight. Dosage is 1 mg., for infants and 3 mg. for adults daily. During pregnancy the dosage may be from 5 to 10 mg. daily. Mann has ruled that under a recent act passed by the Legislature, the penalty and interest on all delinquent state and county taxes, up to the year of 1939 on both real and personal property, has been eliminated until Nov. 1, 1941, provided the taxpayer pays all of his delinquent taxes at one time.

If the taxpayer owes delinquent taxes on more than one piece of property and only pays taxes on one, however, he must pay a flat six per cent penalty.



Is Classified as a "National Defense Utility"

This Company is serving Camp Barkeley, Abilene; Goodfellow Field, San Angelo; Bruce Field, Ballinger; Arledge Field, Stamford; Victory Field, Vernon; and other associated and cooperative projects, all of which are defined as National Defense Premises.

The Company, therefore, is classified as a National Defense Utility, and its property is protected by an Act of the Congress of the United States (Chapter 926-3D, Session 76 Congress) approved April 20, 1918; and Texas Labor-Violence Law (H. B. 800) passed by the Legislature on April 4, 1941.

Section 5 of the Federal Law reads as follows:

"That whoever, with intent to injure, interfere with, or obstruct the national defense of the United States, shall wilfully injure or destroy, or shall attempt to so injure or destroy, any national-defense material, national-defense premises, or national-defense utilities, as herein defined, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment not more than ten years, or both."

Section 1 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person by the use of force or violence, or threat of the use of force or violence, to prevent or to attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation within this state. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof, shall be pun-

ished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year nor more than two (2) years.'

Section 2 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person acting in concert with one or more other persons to assemble at or near any place where a 'labor dispute' exists and by force or violence prevent or attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation, or for any person, acting either by himself or as a member of any group or organization, or acting in concert with one or more other persons, to promote, encourage, or aid any such unlawful assemblage. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year, nor more than (2) years."
