City Drainage **Problem Is Now Being Studied**

Determine Cost Of Draining Town

With the problem of draining flood waters from the town of Munday still a major one for city officials, a system of surveys were ordered recently in an effort to determine the cost of constructing drainage systems.

The surveys were made with the dea of bringing water south and east of town along the railroad, to construct a ditch in town running west from the railroad to the Baptist church, and another from the railroad to the Church of Christ and have it so constructed and connected as to form several units.

The survey revealed that there s only one inch fall in the town to every 100 feet, which will make the drainage problem even more

The highway department proposes to put in a set of culverts south of town where the Pruitt road intersects the highway, another south of the Layton Lansford place, still another just north of the Lansford place and a fourth set east of town to drain the water

The costs of such drainage pro ject is now being studied by members of the city council.

His solution was interesting, but hardly practical for the average watermelon grower.
