INDUSTRIALIST CLAIMS TEXAS CAN GROW RUBBER

William O'Neil Says Guayule Will Meet U. S. Needs.

Farmers in California, Texas, and Arizona can grow enough rubber to supply the defense and commercial needs of the United States within two years, at no greater price than is currently being paid for rubber from the far east.
This was the statement today of William O'Neil, president of the General Tire & Rubber company, in urging that immediate consideration be given by Congress to subsidizing farmers in these states and financing rubber extracting machinery.
The plant from which the rubber may be obtained is guayule, a native shrub of the high plateaus of Mexico, which has been imported to this country and raised successfully in the area around Salinas, California, in Arizona, and in Texas.

Announcement was made Monday by Grady Roberts, publisher of The Munday Times, that the Times annual bargain rate to all subscribers will expire on Saturday, January 17, 1942.

Reason given for withdrawing the bargain rate earlier than usual was that advancing price in all commodities used in publishing a newspaper makes it imperative that the rates be withdrawn. After January 17, the regular rates on the Times will again become effective. These rates are \$1.50 in the county and trade area, and \$2.00 per year outside a 50-mile radius of Munday.

"It may become necessary to discontinue sending the Times to all subscribers who have not paid up by January 17th," the publisher said, "and all are urged to renew their subscriptions while the saving of 50 cents is still in effect."
"We know there are many subscribers who wish to take advantage of the bargain rate," the publisher continued, "and for this reason we are extending the offer for two weeks longer. We trust that everyone now receiving the Munday Times will renew their subscriptions before January 17 and take advantage of the saving offered by your county newspaper."

Goree Man's Story "Believe-It-or-Not"

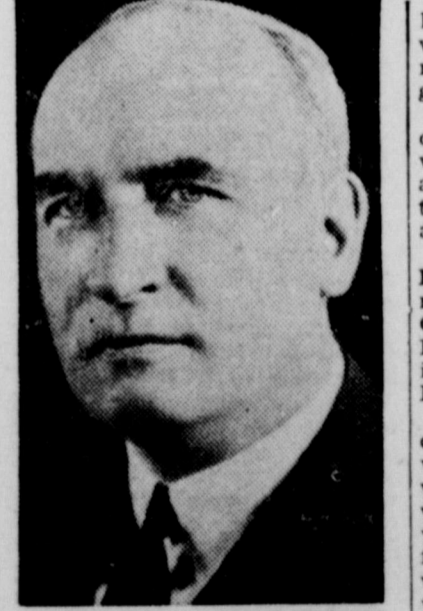
One for "Believe-It-or-Not" was related this week and concerns Amos Duncan of Goree.

Before The Dawn

Dusk is falling on the great American game of baiting the other fellow. It was a game played by politicians, labor leaders and business men. But it is not a game that can be played in the darkness of war. We are now fighting for our life in this darkness. Tolerance toward any group which hampers our effort, is a thing of the past. We must win the war if we are to see the sunlight of freedom again.

As the bombs began to fall on Honolulu, labor held the whip. Witness the final victory of the C. I. O. in the soft coal controversy—the granting of a closed shop in the captive mines. Labor should now be warned that the time for fun is over. Union leaders must remember that the great body of American workers are just that—American workers. And all Americans have two jobs to do. No one is exempt. The job of war production that we have been doing is but child's play compared to what must come. That is the first job. The second job is intangible. But it will take the labor of all of us if it is to be successful.

We must begin now to lay the groundwork of fiscal and economic policies that are as essential to our way of life as a military victory. Here again labor as an organized group may be the deciding factor. It has the power. It must have an equal

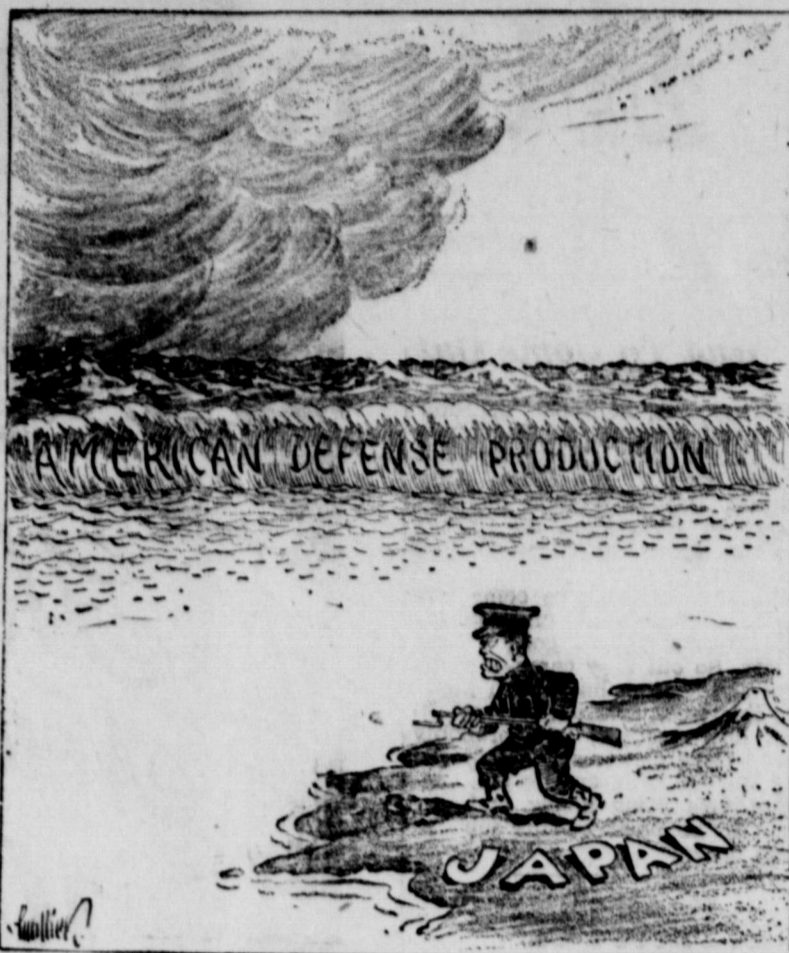
